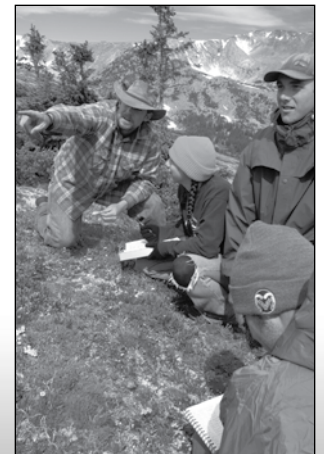

As Colorado's land-grant university, Colorado State was founded in 1870 to fulfill the vision of President Abraham Lincoln and others – to create access and opportunity for people in Colorado and around the world who can benefit from hands-on, engaged learning.

With more than 150 programs of study and 78 undergraduate degree programs in eight colleges – and a faculty-to-student ratio of 16.5:1 – students have access to a wealth of educational possibilities. Colorado State leads the world in disciplines such as human and animal health, clean energy and the environment, global and sustainable business, engineering, and climate research. Along with outstanding programs in the liberal and performing arts, humanities and social sciences, Colorado State offers some of the top professional programs in the country in construction management, occupational therapy, psychology, communications, and agriculture—and is home to the top-ranked public business school in the state.

Challenging academic programs and world-changing research are hallmarks of Colorado State, and it is our special commitment to service, outreach, and transforming our world through innovation that sets this university apart. Colorado State University takes very seriously its role in educating student-athletes. Excellence is expected on the field and in the classroom.

The most recent NCAA academic statistics reveal that Colorado State leads the Mountain West Conference in graduation rate for student-athletes at 66 percent – well ahead of the conference’s overall student-athlete graduation rate of 57 percent. In football, Colorado State is second in the MWC, graduating 68 percent of its student-athletes – again, well ahead of the conference average of 49 percent.

Colorado State, however, is not resting on its reputation for graduating its student-athletes. The state-of-the-art Anderson Academic Center, which will greatly enhance the academic facilities available for student-athletes, opened in August 2009.

While the athletic department takes its role in the educational process very seriously, Colorado State’s mission to provide a world-class education is at the core of academic success. U.S. News and World Report ranked Colorado State in its top tier in its annual “America’s Best Colleges” report. The university offers 79 majors and 27 minors, and many of its programs are ranked among the best in the country.

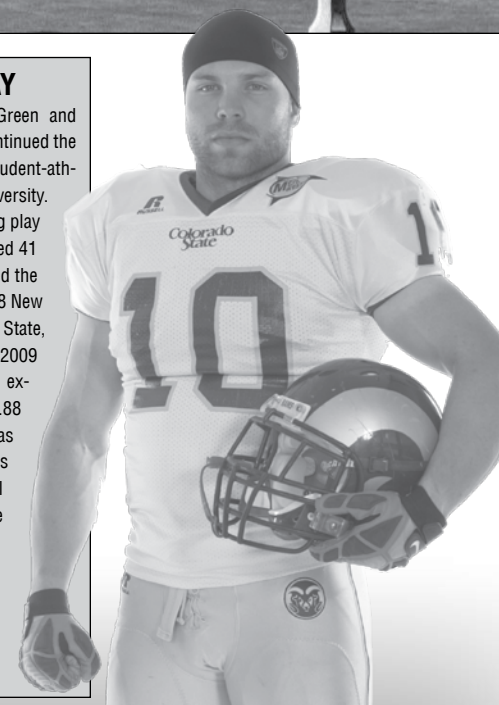
Colorado State continues to push forward in its mission to provide the best possible education. Construction recently was completed on the state-of-the-art University Center for the Arts and Computer Science buildings, along with the indoor practice facility, academic and training center, and the Rockwell Hall expansion at the College of Business.

- CSU’s Veterinary Medicine program ranks second in the country and is the national leader in federal research dollars.
- *BusinessWeek* ranked CSU’s undergraduate College of Business program 67th (up from 73rd in 2008). The program ranks 30th among all public schools and 14th among all colleges and universities in the West and Southwest. The marketing and business law programs were ranked in the nation’s Top 10 by the magazine.
- In December 2008, CSU conferred its 150,000th bachelor’s degree and 200,000th overall degree.
- According to NCAA statistics, CSU’s graduation rate for student-athletes is higher than the graduation rate for the overall student body.



LEADING THE WAY

During his career in the Green and Gold, Jeff Horinek (right) continued the tradition of excellence by student-athletes at Colorado State University. In addition to his outstanding play at linebacker, where he logged 41 consecutive starts and helped the Rams to a victory in the 2008 New Mexico Bowl against Fresno State, Horinek graduated in May 2009 with a degree in health and exercise science, carrying a 3.88 grade-point average. He was one of 15 national finalists for the William V. Campbell Trophy - often known as the Academic Heisman - and earned an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship from the national football foundation and College Hall of Fame.

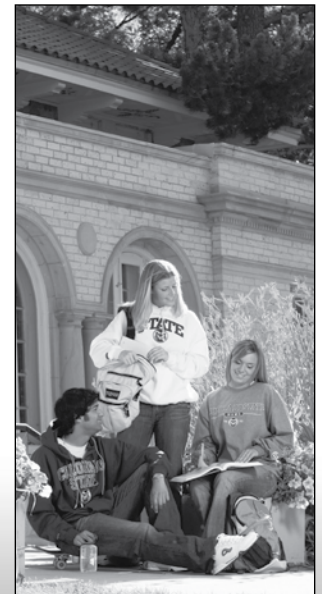

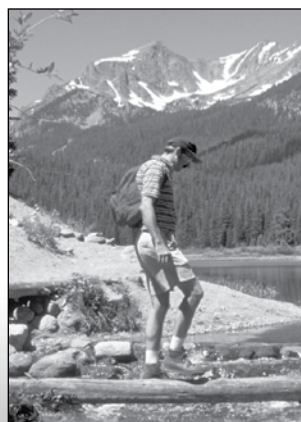


This is Fort Collins & Colorado



Since its founding as a military fort in 1864, Fort Collins has anchored northern Colorado's rich heritage of academic, business and recreational pursuits. Hiking, mountain biking, kayaking, river rafting and rock climbing are just a few popular outdoor pursuits for students and residents.

The city maintains more than 600 acres of parks, 5,000 acres of natural areas, 20 miles of off-street trails for hiking and biking, and three golf courses. The Lincoln Center and the University Center for the Arts, anchored in Fort Collins, are northern Colorado's cultural arts centers.

Q&A with Wade Troxell

Wade Troxell is associate dean for research and economic development in CSU's College of Engineering, and a former Colorado State football letterman (1975-78) and team captain (1978)

What do you tell visiting high-school athletes who are thinking about coming to Colorado State?

One thing I try to tell prospective football players is that CSU is a great place, not only to play football in a great conference, but also to get a terrific education. Take my field for example, engineering. Colorado State is the best place to balance the demands of your studies with the time commitment required by football, because CSU offers outstanding support for its student-athletes. Plus, CSU expects them to graduate. CSU's faculty meshes well with its football staff. Both sides work together to help an individual student-athlete reach the zenith of his potential.

Describe the bulk of student-athletes at CSU. What makes them different? What characterizes them academically?

First of all, students in general at CSU have a lot of varying interests, and excel in many different ways. The student-athlete here is no different in that they're elite athletes and are pursuing their academic interests. CSU gives them an opportunity not only to be the best in their sport, but also a chance to be the best in their chosen careers. In engineering, for example, I had CSU teammates when I was a student-athlete who now are leaders in their chosen profession. They not only were successful here in college, but they went on to be successful after graduation, too.

What kind of relationship does the athletic department have with the faculty?

The faculty and staff have an excellent connection with the athletic department. Both the faculty and staff recognizes that we're all here to serve as mentors and educate student-athletes, in giving them a high-quality education. The football staff engages faculty so they're involved in all processes of recruiting and the development of the student-athlete from the time they're still in high school until they graduate here at Moby Arena.

According to the NFL, the average professional playing career is 3.5 years. Knowing that, what does CSU offer for the long-term future of a prospective football player, beyond the NFL?

There's always the possibility of injury in this game. Everyone wants to get drafted, and CSU has a great history of players in the NFL, but the stark reality is that your chances to continue your playing career really diminish after college. In that context, CSU wants student-athletes to succeed academically. That's why they're not admitted into a particular major unless we believe that they have the aptitude and capacity to complete their degree. And the result of getting that degree at CSU is long-term dividends that pay throughout one's life, whether he plays in the NFL or not. At CSU, you get an outstanding education in a very personal way, with individual mentoring, coaching and advising. We want you to compete at the highest level of Division I football, but we also want you to become gainfully employed and qualified to launch a successful career in a chosen field. You cannot find a better opportunity to do both than what we offer at Colorado State.

What makes CSU different?

We get feedback from students and student-athletes alike about personal attention they receive from everyone on campus, from staff members, administrators and faculty members. This is something you just don't seem to find at other places. We offer personalized attention to help a student meet his/her particular needs. It provides a framework for success, a launching pad for a successful future, whatever that future may hold.

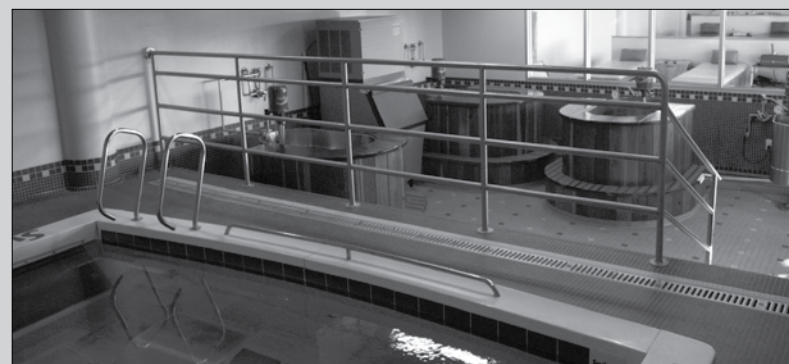

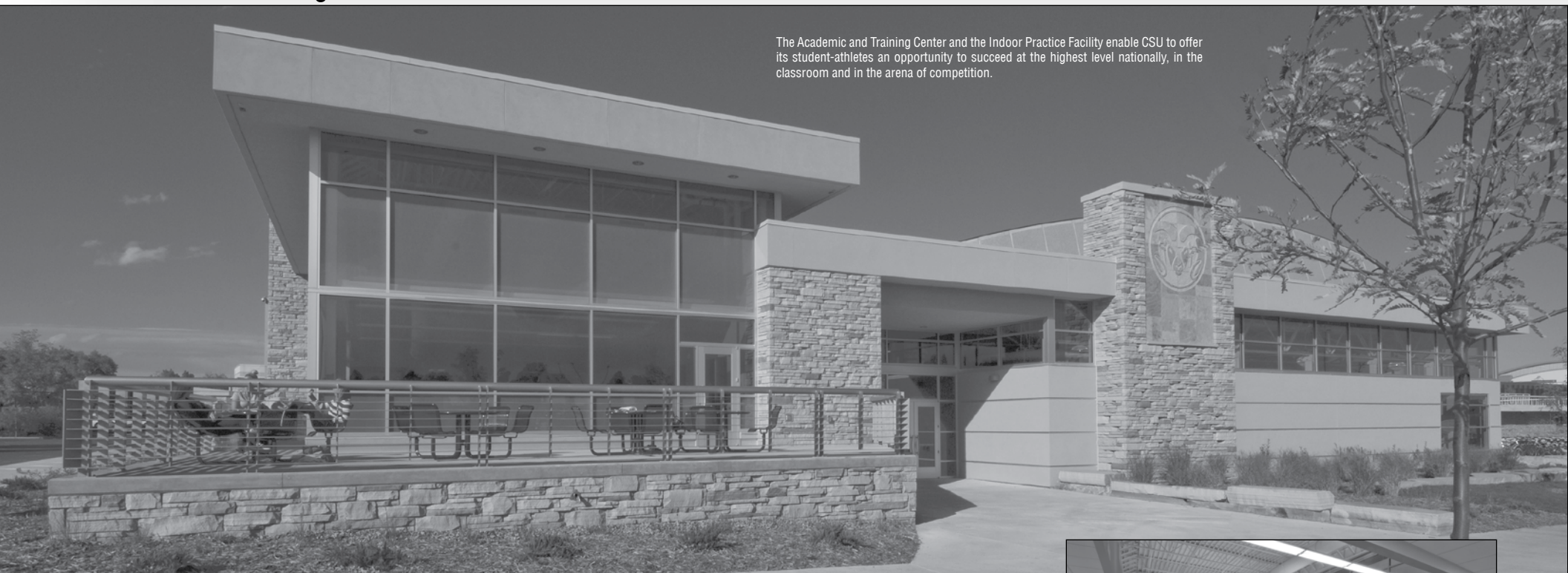
Training Room

The Colorado State athletic training room features a multitude of taping (left) and treatment tables as well as top-tier equipment for rehabilitation (right), allowing the CSU training staff all the necessary tools to make sure that student-athletes are healthy enough to perform at their peak levels.



Academic & Training Center

The Academic and Training Center and the Indoor Practice Facility enable CSU to offer its student-athletes an opportunity to succeed at the highest level nationally, in the classroom and in the arena of competition.



Cost: \$7 million
Size: 16,000 square feet,
Location: South of the McGraw Athletic Center

Features:

- Training portion includes a state-of-the-art weight room, strength and conditioning offices, a nutrition center and restrooms.
- Academic center features five private tutorial rooms and large study areas
- Includes a computer lab with 30 workstations, more workspace and offices for CSU's academic staff.

In 1998, Colorado State enhanced its weight room and built an academic center as part of the McGraw Athletic Center project, but these facilities no longer meet the needs of its expanded student-athlete base, nor do they allow the Rams to compete for top-quality recruits.

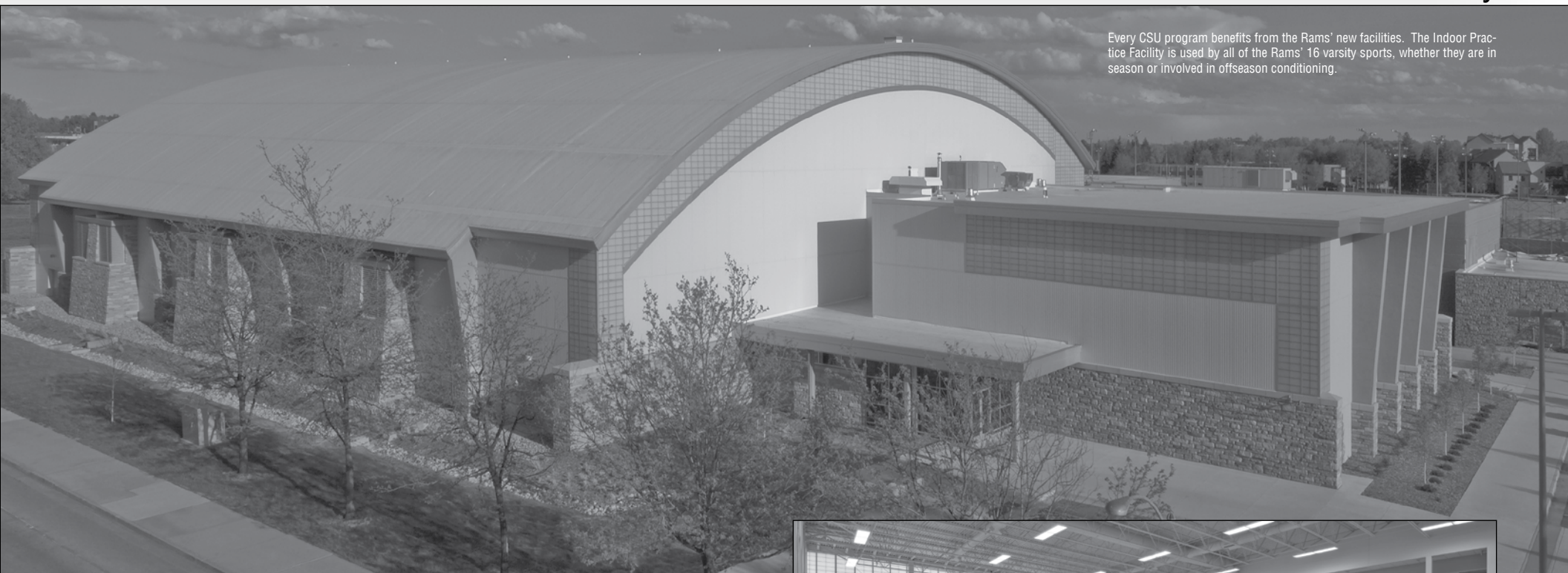
Because of the heavy time constraints placed on CSU student-athletes through practice, travel, strength and conditioning, and community service, a quality learning environment is essential for the university's student-athletes to achieve the high standards of academic success expected of them.

The Academic and Training Center is the latest centerpiece for CSU's athletic program and support its mission to recruit, educate, develop, and graduate Rams student-athletes within an environment that prusues excellence, values integrity and ethical conduct, promotes respect for all individuals, teaches sportsmanship, entertains our constituents and emphasizes championship performance.



Indoor Practice Facility

Every CSU program benefits from the Rams' new facilities. The Indoor Practice Facility is used by all of the Rams' 16 varsity sports, whether they are in season or involved in offseason conditioning.



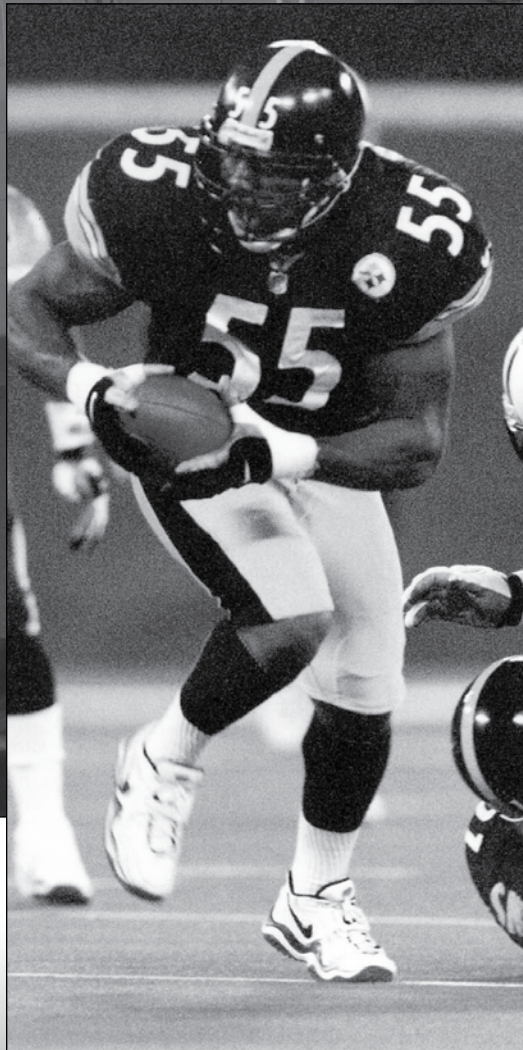
Cost: \$13 million
Size: 66,267 square feet, including 48,125 dedicated to the football portion and 8,827 to the basketball and volleyball areas
Height: 65 feet at its tallest point
Location: East of Moby Pool and north of the Student Recreation Center

Features:

- Gymnasium easily encloses a regulation basketball court and two half courts.
- Volleyball configuration can accommodate two full-length courts.
- Contains a 70-yard synthetic-turf football field (including one end zone).
- Features a four-lane, 70-meter track and a unique shoe-changing room adjacent to the football field.
- Has flexibility to allow the softball team to set up batting cages on the football field.
- Provide shelter for any student-athlete in each of the Rams' 16 varsity sports.
- Includes training room, equipment storage, lobby and trophy display case, and rest-rooms.
- Uses an innovative air circulation system.

Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium



Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium, the home of the Colorado State football program, lies at the base of the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. Located approximately two miles west of the main campus, the stadium offers one of the most scenic settings in college football. Opened in 1968, the venerable stadium has undergone several upgrades over the decades, including a major renovation between 2003 and 2006.

21st-Century Renovations

In 2003, the Bohemian Foundation contributed \$15.2 million to the Colorado State athletic department. The majority of that gift was focused on improving Hughes Stadium. Over a three-year period, the facility received a spectacular new west tower, containing club seating, luxury suites and a new press box. CSU also enclosed the north end zone, increasing capacity to 32,500.

The foundation insisted that the venue's playing surface receive a new name - Sonny Lubick Field, after the legendary head coach that spurred the most successful run of bowl games and conference championships in program history.

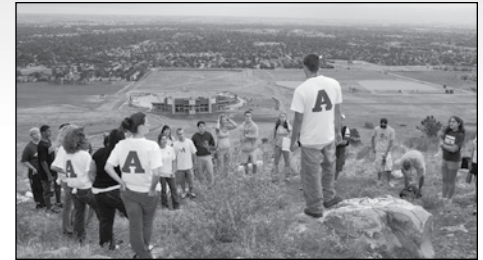
The final phase of the renovations focused on that surface itself. The field underwent a \$1.33 million makeover prior to the 2006 season, when Colorado State installed FieldTurf, the revolutionary, rubberized surface used by several NFL and major-college football venues across the country.

THE AGGIE “A”

The prominent white “A” displayed on the foothills overlooking Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium (left) turns 89 years old in 2012, making it the second oldest ongoing tradition associated with Colorado State University.

The “A” evolved after World War I when a trend began among colleges to display the school insignia on a hill near campus. At a special assembly on Dec. 4, 1923, the students of State Agricultural College agreed it was time to erect such an emblem. A group of military volunteers formed the “A” Club and donated vehicles for transporting supplies, and female students provided food for the workers.

The college declared Dec. 12 a special holiday, and students worked from that morning until mid-afternoon to form the “A.” One small detail was missing: The school didn’t own the land on which the insignia sat. The College and Ag Board members met with landowner R.G. Maxwell and negotiated a long-term lease for the sum of \$1.

The following September, students lengthened and widened the “A” to its present size of 450 feet from top to bottom, and 210 feet across at the bottom. For many years the freshman class carried out the annual tradition of whitewashing the “A.”

Today, the “A” is an official landmark. Early each fall, freshman football players join forces with several other campus organizations to give the “A” a fresh coat of white paint.



CAM THE RAM

The official mascot of Colorado State is CAM the Ram, whose name symbolizes CSU history — an acronym for Colorado Agricultural and Mechanical College, the institution’s former name.

All told, 18 live rams have served proudly on the Hughes Stadium sidelines. The mascot has its own corps of student ‘Ram Handlers,’ as well as a traveling trailer.



THE CANNON

Since 1920, military members from the institution have fired the deafening cannon — an intimidating exclamation point to opponents that just allowed a Rams touchdown, field goal or PAT. Fired today by CSU’s Army ROTC, the cannon is the oldest continuous tradition associated with CSU athletics.



RAM WALK

Before every game at Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium, Colorado State’s players and coaches exit the team buses and proceed through Ram Town and a tunnel created by the Rams’ fans, cheerleaders and band, which plays the fight song.



FIGHT SONG

After every win, the Colorado State players and coaches sing the fight song with intense pride in their locker room.

When the Rams win in the friendly confines of Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium, the team, band and the student section sing the fight song in unison.

FUM MCGRAW

The most recognized name in CSU annals is Thurman "Fum" McGraw (right). The university's first consensus football All-American (1948-49), he went on to an illustrious career in the NFL, where he helped the Detroit Lions to two world championships. McGraw devoted more than 40 years to the university he loved, including a decade as director of athletics (1976-86).

His retired No. 48 jersey hangs in the locker room during every game, home and road.

A passionate competitor, during his days as a Colorado A&M student and fraternity member, he sang a song directed at regional rivals. The ballad later became known as "Fum's Song."

Fum's Song

I'll sing you a song of college days, and tell you where to go.
 Aggies, where your knowledge is, and Boulder to spend your dough.
 C.C. for your sissy boys, and Utah for your times,
 D.U. for your ministers, and drunkards School of Mines.

Colorado State football enjoys fierce rivalries with three front-range schools. The Rams and their foes battle each year for a trio of traveling trophies: The Centennial Cup (top left, Colorado), the Bronze Boot (top right, Wyoming) and the Ram-Falcon Trophy (bottom, Air Force).



CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Colorado State football program owns 15 conference championships. The 1915 team (pictured below) captured its first Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference title.

The Rams' most recent conference title came in 2002 (left), when the team posted a 10-4 overall record, and a 6-2 mark in Mountain West play.

Legendary coaches Harry Hughes (above) and Sonny Lubick each claimed six league championships.



Bowl Games



GOING BOWLING

The Colorado State football program has earned 12 bowl berths in its history, dating back to the team's first postseason appearance, a physical matchup against Occidental College in the 1949 Raisin Bowl (right). The Rams were led to their first bowl game by second-year head coach Bob Davis.



Earle Bruce guided the Rams back to the postseason in 1990, when he coached the team to a resounding 32-31 victory over the Oregon Ducks in the Freedom Bowl (below, right).

Sonny Lubick led the Rams to their most successful bowl run in program history. The Rams competed in nine bowl games under Lubick's guidance, including wins in the 1997 Holiday Bowl vs. Missouri (trophy below), the 2000 Liberty Bowl (below, near left) and the 2001 New Orleans Bowl (below, far left).

Steve Fairchild led Colorado State to its last bowl appearance in 2008, a 40-35 victory over the Fresno State Bulldogs.

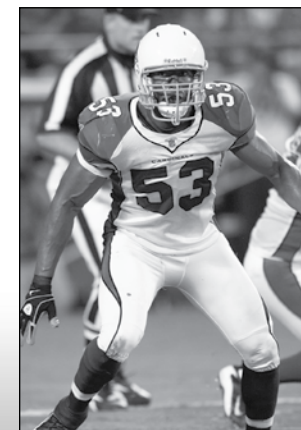

DAILY COVERAGE

Colorado State is a nationally prominent brand, due in large part to the success of its athletic teams and the media coverage they receive.

The Rams are covered by five newspapers in addition to the *Associated Press*. What's more, eight area television stations, mostly from Denver (the nation's No. 17 television market), and several radio outlets along the Front Range come to campus to interview and feature CSU's student-athletes and coaches.

GAMEDAY COVERAGE

Colorado State football plays regularly on regional and national television. Overall, since the program's first telecast game in 1956, the Rams have played 224 such contests, including eight or more televised games in each of the past 17 seasons.

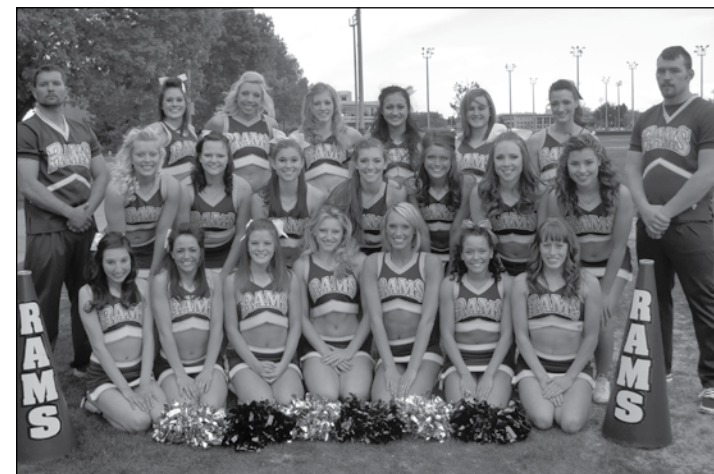
During games, the CSU cheer team and Golden Poms keep fans on their feet while cheering the Rams to victory.

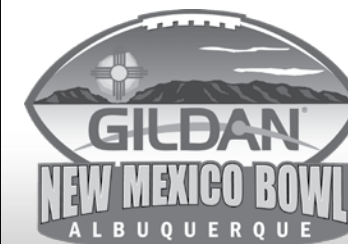

MOUNTAIN WEST HISTORY

The Mountain West was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference. The split from a former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Three of the MW's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV and TCU entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MW in 1999. TCU re-joined the group with its first year of competition in the Mountain West in 2005-06. With conference realignment sweeping the nation in recent years, the MW has been proactive in addressing membership changes. Boise State University joined the Mountain West in 2011-12, followed by Fresno State and the University of Nevada on July 1, 2012. Also on July 1, 2012, the University of Hawai'i became a football-only member of the Conference. On May 4, 2012, the Mountain West announced the additions of San Jose State University and Utah State University as full-time members effective July 1, 2013.

When the Mountain West officially began operations on July 1, 1999, the new league had in place a seven-year contract with ESPN, giving the broadcaster exclusive national television rights to MW football and men's basketball, and three-year agreements to send the league's football champion to the Liberty Bowl and a second team to the Las Vegas Bowl. Commissioner Craig Thompson also arranged a third bowl tie-in each of the first three seasons (1999 Motor City, 2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans) before securing a four-year deal with the Emerald Bowl in San Francisco in 2002. Entering the 2012 season, the MW has four contracted bowl affiliations — the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas, San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl and Gildan New Mexico Bowl.

An innovator in the postseason bowl structure, the MW engineered many "firsts," as league teams have participated in five inaugural bowl games (2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans, 2002 San Francisco (Emerald), 2005 Poinsettia, 2006 New Mexico), as well as placing the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS team into a BCS bowl game with Utah's appearance in the 2005 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.



MOUNTAIN WEST NOTEBOOK

WELCOME TO THE MOUNTAIN WEST

Fresno State and Nevada officially became members of the Mountain West on July 1, 2012. In addition, Hawai'i became a football-only member of the Mountain West on July 1. While Fresno State, Hawai'i and Nevada are official newcomers to the Mountain West, all three squads are certainly not strangers to the league. The Warriors have faced six MW opponents at least 20 times in their history, including Fresno State (44), San Diego State (26), New Mexico (21), UNLV (21), Colorado State (20) and Wyoming (20). The Bulldogs have competed against San Diego State in 51 contests and against Nevada in 43 games. The Wolf Pack has squared off against Boise State 38 times and has met instate rival UNLV on 37 occasions to battle for the Fremont Cannon.

COMING SOON

San Jose State and Utah State will become official members of the Mountain West, effective with the 2013-14 academic year. The addition of the Spartans and Aggies on July 1, 2013 will bring the full-time membership of the Mountain West to nine institutions and 10 football-playing members.

FOUR NEW HEAD COACHES JOIN MW IN 2012

The Mountain West welcomes four new head football coaches in 2012, including three who will be taking charge of a program for the first time in their coaching careers. Colorado State will be under the direction of first-year head coach Jim McElwain, who recently completed a four-year stint as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Alabama. McElwain, a 27-year veteran of the coaching ranks, helped lead Alabama to national championships in two of the previous three seasons. Prior to overseeing the Alabama offense, McElwain served on the staffs of Fresno State (2007), Oakland Raiders (2006), Michigan State (2003-05), Louisville (2000-02), Montana State (1995-99) and Eastern Washington (1985-94). Bob Davie, who had worked as a college football analyst for ABC and ESPN since 2002, returns to the sideline at New Mexico. Prior to his television career, Davie served as defensive coordinator at Notre Dame for three years (1994-96) before taking over the program from 1997-2001. Davie went 35-25 during his five years as the Fighting Irish's head coach, leading Notre Dame to three bowl games, including the program's first-ever BCS bowl (2001 Fiesta Bowl).

Two of the MW's three incoming members will also be under the guidance of first-year head coaches in Fresno State's Tim DeRuyter and Hawai'i's Norm Chow. DeRuyter comes to Fresno State with 22 years of experience, including 16 seasons as a defensive coordinator. He takes over the Bulldogs after serving the past two seasons as the assistant head coach/defensive coordinator at Texas A&M. Before coaching the Aggie defense, DeRuyter spent three years as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at his alma mater, the Air Force Academy, and from 2005-06 was the co-defensive coordinator at Nevada.

Chow brings 39 years of coaching experience to Hawai'i. Among his 36 years at the collegiate level, Chow spent 27 seasons at BYU, four at USC, three at UCLA, one at North Carolina State and one at his alma mater, Utah. He also spent three years at the professional level as offensive coordinator for the Tennessee Titans.

MOUNTAIN WEST IN THE POSTSEASON

For the fifth consecutive year, the Mountain West sent five teams into postseason bowl games. The Mountain West has earned 51 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 31-20 all-time record in those contests. The MW finished with a 2-3 (.400) mark in postseason play in 2011, marking the first time since 2005 the league did not post a winning bowl record.

Boise State (12-1), TCU (11-2), Wyoming (8-5), San Diego State (8-5) and Air Force (7-6) each reached bowl eligibility, marking the seventh year in a row, and eighth overall, the MW has boasted five bowl-eligible teams.

Over the past eight seasons, the MW owns the best win percentage in bowl games among the 11 FBS conferences with a 24-12 mark (.667). The SEC is second with a 42-22 (.656) record, followed by the Big East at 24-16 (.600) and the Big 12 at 34-28 (.548).

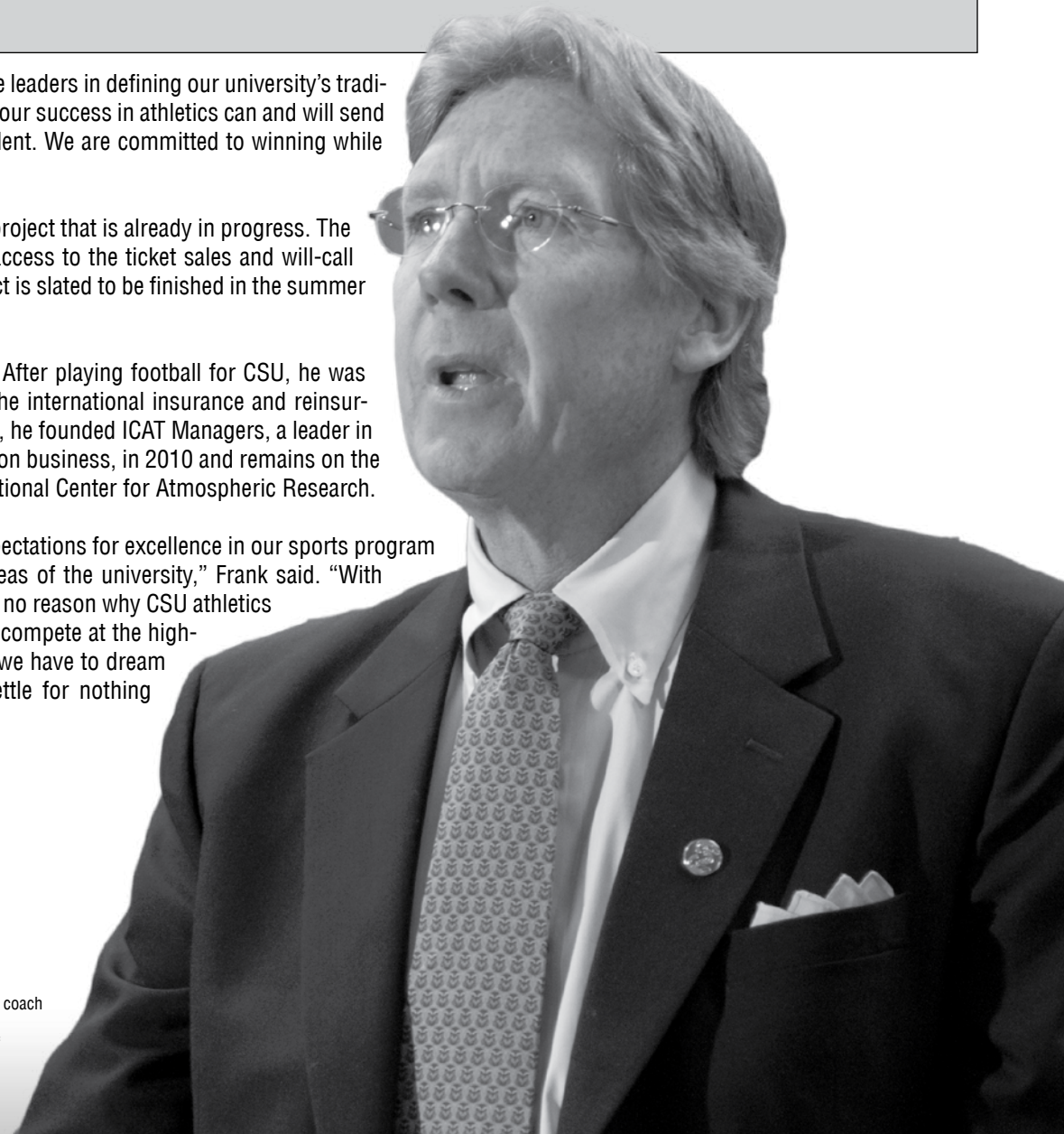
With numerous ideas for improvement and expansion, Graham is overseeing a project that is already in progress. The Moby renovation will expand the north and south concourses, improving fan access to the ticket sales and will-call areas, as well as create a more logical setup of the concession stands. The project is slated to be finished in the summer of 2013.

Graham graduated from CSU in 1975 with a bachelor’s degree in U.S. history. After playing football for CSU, he was drafted by the Miami Dolphins. He went on to a successful 30-year career in the international insurance and reinsurance markets, where he was known as an innovator and effective leader. In 1998, he founded ICAT Managers, a leader in catastrophic risk insurance products. He sold ICAT, including its Lloyd’s of London business, in 2010 and remains on the company’s board of directors. Graham also sits on the advisory board of the National Center for Atmospheric Research.



“We have the same expectations for excellence in our sports program that we have for all areas of the university,” Frank said. “With Jack’s leadership, I see no reason why CSU athletics cannot and should not compete at the highest level. To get there, we have to dream big, work hard and settle for nothing less than excellence.”

JIM McELWAIN | EASTERN WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY (1984) FIRST SEASON AT CSU, 27TH SEASON IN COACHING

Jim McElwain became the 20th head football coach in Colorado State program history on Dec. 13, 2011, prior to Alabama's appearance in the BCS national championship game.

McElwain, 49, came to Fort Collins from the Crimson Tide, where he had served as Nick Saban's offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach from 2008-11. McElwain played a key role in navigating the team to two national championship victories in the last three seasons. Alabama defeated No. 1 LSU in January 2012 and topped Texas to claim the 2009 championship.

In addition, McElwain's offenses at Alabama:

- Led the nation by committing only 57 turnovers since he took the reins of the unit to begin the 2008 season. Ohio State ranks second with 59.
- Sent two players to the Heisman Trophy ceremony in New York, the 2009 winner Mark Ingram and 2011 finalist Trent Richardson.
- Played a chief role in the Tide's 47-6 record since 2008.
- Ranked among the top units in the Southeastern Conference. Last season, 'Bama led the league with 219.8 rushing yards per game, and finished second with 433.4 total yards per contest, and third in scoring (36 points per game). In 2010, the team was third in both total yards and scoring.

The veteran coach tutored first-year quarterbacks in two of his four seasons at Alabama, Greg McElroy in 2009 and A.J. McCarron in 2011. Saban brought McElwain to Tuscaloosa from Fresno State, to

replace Major Applewhite at the reins of the Tide offense.

The offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Fresno State in 2007, McElwain improved the Bulldogs' output from 338.2 total yards per game the year before his arrival to 419.5 (No. 38 in the nation), and from 23.0 points per contest to 32.9 (No. 32). Fresno State went 9-4 in his only season, including a 40-28 triumph over Georgia Tech in the Humanitarian Bowl.

In 2006, he coached the quarterbacks of the NFL's Oakland Raiders, under Pro Football Hall of Famer Art Shell, after a three-year stint (2003-05) as assistant head coach, receivers coach and special-teams coach at Michigan State.

ing season on special teams, he coached an All-American, punter Brandon Fields, and the Big Ten's scoring leader, kicker Dave Rayner. And prior to his departure for the NFL, Michigan State set a school mark with 24 touchdown receptions in 2005, when five of his wideouts had at least 28 catches.

McElwain coached against Colorado State in the 2000 Liberty Bowl, culminating his first season with Louisville. He spent three years (2000-02) with the Cardinals, in charge of wide receivers and special teams, helping the program to three consecutive bowls. Four of his players earned first-team all-conference honors. Three of his pupils ranked among Louisville's all-time leading receivers, including future Super Bowl MVP Deion Branch.

The offensive coordinator, quarterbacks and receivers coach at Montana State, McElwain coached in his home state with the Bobcats from 1995-99. In Bozeman, he helped QB Rob Compson compile almost 7,000 career passing yards as well as 54 touchdowns, a program record, and also tutored Chip Hobbs, the Bobcats' all-time leading career receiver (144 receptions, 2,060 yards, 18 touchdowns). No other Big Sky offense in 1998 was more prolific than Montana State, which scored 31.6 points per contest.

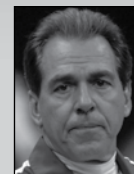
He broke into the coaching profession at his alma mater, Eastern Washington, where from 1985-94 he held a host of positions. He launched his career as a graduate assistant and finished his tenure with the Eagles as quarterbacks and receivers coach. During his time there, Eastern Washington earned a berth in both the 1992 and 1995 Division I-AA playoffs, and a share of the 1992 Big Sky crown. In addition, in 1993 he coached a third-team All-American, Tony Brooks, who concluded his career as the school's all-time leading receiver, with 2,969 career yards.

A 1984 graduate of Eastern Washington, where he played quarterback from 1980-83, he owns a degree in education.

An all-state field general at Sentinel High School in Missoula, Mont., McElwain grew up 119 miles up Interstate 90 from Butte, which produced former CSU head coach Sonny Lubick. McElwain joins Lubick, Jim Sweeney and Bobby Petrino among the most prominent coaches produced by the state.

Jim and his wife, Karen, have three children, Jo-Hanna, Elizabeth and Jerret.

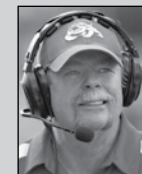

Dave Baldwin in 2012 kicks off his 33rd season as a coach, his first at CSU. The former head coach at San Jose State and Cal State Northridge officially joined the Rams' staff on Jan. 4, 2012, hired by Jim McElwain.

Baldwin, 56, came to Fort Collins from Utah State, where he served as offensive coordinator for three seasons (2009-11), helping the Aggies to the top two offensive seasons in program annals. The Aggies posted a pair of top-20 finishes, 14th in 2009 and 20th in 2011, with respective school records of 5,272 and 5,504 yards of total offense. His rushing offense ranked sixth in the country in 2011, and No. 22 in 2009. Baldwin took over control of USU's tight ends in 2011, in addition to his offensive coordinator duties, after coaching quarterbacks in 2010 and wide receivers in 2009.

The Rivals.com WAC Offensive Coordinator of the Year in 2011, he helped Utah State to its first winning season since 1996 and first bowl game in 14 years, calling plays for a unit that produced the conference Offensive Player of the Year, RB Robert Turbin, who finished the regular season ranked 10th in the country with 118 yards per game.

Turbin, one of the top 10 running backs entering the 2012 NFL Draft, was one of three first-team all-conference selections, including offensive linemen Philip Gapelu and Tyler Larsen. Baldwin's balanced offense also produced a second-team all-conference performer, TE Tarren Lloyd. With true-freshman quarterback Chuckie Keaton in his first college game, Baldwin's offense led the Aggies to what fell just short of a stunning upset, a 42-38 loss at defending national champion Auburn, after the Tigers scored two touchdowns in the final 2:07, including an onside-kick recovery. Baldwin also scripted the Aggies' 63-19 win over Wyoming.

Baldwin helped USU quarterback Diondre Borel to single-season school records in total offense (3,343 yards in 2009) and fewest interceptions (four in 2009). Turbin in 2009 also became USU's first 1,000-yard back in eight years and the school's single-season record holder with 18 total TDs.

Baldwin shifted to Utah State from New Mexico, where he spent two seasons (2007-08) as offensive coordinator. His Lobos offense in 2008 ranked third in the Mountain West and 16th in the NCAA in with 208.3 rushing yards per game, led by Rodney Ferguson, who finished second to CSU's Gartrell Johnson in the conference rushing race, but led the league with 13 rushing TDs.

The year before, 2007, Baldwin's offense was one of only three FBS programs to produce a 3,000-yard passer (Donovan Porterie 3,006), a 1,000-yard rusher (Ferguson 1,177) and two 1,000-yard receivers (Marcus Smith 1,125, and Travis Brown 1,031). Smith led the MW in receptions and receiving yards, while setting a school record with 91 receptions. The Lobos piled up an impressive five first-team all-conference selections (Ferguson, Brown, Smith, and linemen Devin Clark and Vince Natali). Porterie threw for 354 yards to lead Baldwin's offense in a 23-0 triumph over Nevada in the New Mexico Bowl, its first bowl win since 1961.

Before his time in Albuquerque, Baldwin handled the offense for John L. Smith at Michigan State from 2003-06. Over his first three years in East Lansing, his wide receivers coach was Jim McElwain.

In 2006, Baldwin orchestrated the largest comeback in NCAA history, on Oct. 21 at Northwestern. Down 38-3 with 9:54 left in the third quarter, the Spartans put up 38 unanswered points in a 41-38 triumph. That season, future NFL QB Drew Stanton, a Unitas Award finalist, set a school record with a .642 completion percentage and finished second in school history in career completions, passing yards and total offense. WR Mike Trannon, including a single-game MSU record 14 catches, left the Spartans as the program's all-time receptions leader (148).

In 2005, Michigan State finished among national offensive leaders in four categories: No. 5 in total offense (497.3 yards per game), No. 11 in passing (295.5 yards per game), No. 18 in scoring (33.8 points per game), and No. 20 in rushing (201.8 yards per game). The total offense and passing marks established program records. That year, five Spartans had at least 28 receptions and two TDs. Michigan State was the only FBS team with five players to register at least 400 receiving yards.

Baldwin's offenses produced the first two 3,000-yard passers in MSU history: Stanton in 2004 and Jeff Smoker in 2003. Smoker, in Baldwin's first Spartans season, threw for a school-record 3,395 yards. In 2004, Stanton became the first QB in MSU annals to throw for 300 yards and rush for 100 in the same game.

Before moving to Michigan State, Baldwin guided the offense and coached quarterbacks at Baylor for one season (2002). His top Bears receiver, Reggie Newhouse, was a second-team all-Big 12 performer after establishing single-season school records with 75 receptions and 1,140 receiving yards. With Baldwin on staff, Baylor posted its first conference win in more than four years.

He served the 2001 campaign as offensive coordinator at Cincinnati, helping the 7-5 Bearcats to the Motor City Bowl. Baldwin tutored Conference USA's second-leading passer, Gino Guidugli, the league's Freshman of the Year. He threw to the conference's leading receiver, LaDaris Vann (6.64 receptions/game).

Baldwin's résumé includes 10 years of head coaching experience, at San Jose State (1997-2000) and Cal State Northridge (1996), plus five years as a head coach at the junior-college level. His 58-60 career record includes a 31-21 JC mark, an 18-27 record at SJSU and a 9-12 ledger at Northridge.

A 1978 graduate of Northridge, Baldwin owns a bachelor's degree in physical education and health recreation. He also earned a master's in physical education administration from St. Mary's College in 1986.

Born March 22, 1955, in Denver, Colo., Baldwin and his wife Kathleen have three children. Their son, Sean, married his wife Lindsay in 2008. They also have a son, Ryan, and a daughter, Keiley.

Marty English kicks off his 28th season in the coaching profession, his first at Colorado State. Jim McElwain made English part of the head coach's inaugural staff on Feb. 7, 2012. With the exception of one season, English has spent his entire football life on the Front Range between Denver and Laramie.

A Colorado product, English makes the move back across the border after nine seasons at Wyoming, where he had served as the Cowboys' defensive coordinator, linebackers and special teams coach from 2009-11. The senior member of the Wyoming staff when he joined the Rams, he spent his first six years (2003-08) in Laramie as Joe Glenn's linebackers coach.

English helped the Cowboys to two bowl appearances in his three seasons at the reins of the defense, including 2011, when Wyoming led the Mountain West and tied for 10th in the nation with 31 takeaways. DB Blair Burns, a Freshman All-American, was one of six all-conference players on English's 2011 defense.

In his first season as the Wyoming defensive coordinator, 2009, the Cowboys stuffed Fresno State after the Bulldogs began with first-and-goal at the 1-yard line, to preserve an overtime victory in the New Mexico Bowl. English had recruited four seniors on that team, and coached three of them, that went on to sign a contract with an NFL team: DT John Fletcher (Baltimore Ravens), LB Weston Johnson (Atlanta Falcons), DE Mitch Unrein (Houston Texans) and OT Ryan Otterson (San Diego Chargers). Fletcher earned first-team All-Mountain West honors after concluding his career third in conference history with 24 sacks. Meanwhile, English's 2009 unit stood as the only defense in the country with three players (DB Chris Prosinski, LB Brian Hendricks and LB Gabe Knapton ranked in the top 25 nationally in total tackles.

As the Cowboys' linebackers coach, English helped Wyoming finish ninth nationally in 2006 in total defense, and No. 8 against the pass. In 2004, the Pokes ranked 13th in the country with 28 takeaways, a key part of a season that concluded with a win over UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl. All told, English has served on coaching staffs that led their teams to the postseason on 12 occasions.

Before moving a short distance to Laramie, Wyo., English spent 16 seasons (1987-2002) at his alma mater, Northern Colorado, in Greeley. His time at UNC was divided into three roles, most recently as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach (2000-02), as special teams, linebackers, strength and conditioning coach and recruiting coordinator (1990-99), and as a graduate assistant (1987-89).

At UNC, English and the Bears won a pair of NCAA Division II national championships (1996-97) and went to the national playoffs eight times, including the 2002 national semifinals.

His 2002 Bears defense ranked in the nation's top 10 in five categories: No. 8 in total defense, No. 5 in pass-defense efficiency, No. 9 in scoring defense, No. 9 in rushing defense and No. 9 in turnover margin.

As a player, English was part of another national championship, when his Idaho State team won the 1981 NCAA Division I-AA title. English then transferred to Northern Colorado, lettering three years as a linebacker. As a 1985 senior captain, he garnered all-North Central Conference recognition.

Following his playing career, English spent three years (1985-87) with the Jefferson County (Colo.) school system, coaching defense and special teams in the district.

A 1986 and 1989 graduate of Northern Colorado, English owns a bachelor's degree in recreation management, and a master's in physical education in 1989.

He grew up in Lakewood, Colo., and earned all-state honors at Alameda High School.

He and his wife, Suzie, have one daughter, Kelsey, and one son, Tyler. Kelsey is a student at the University of Wyoming, while Tyler is a sophomore linebacker at Mesa State College in Grand Junction, Colo.

Al Simmons enters his 27th season in the coaching profession, his first campaign at Colorado State. Head Coach Jim McElwain made Simmons part of his inaugural Rams staff on Feb. 16, 2012.

Simmons came to Fort Collins from UTEP, where he'd served under Mike Price for one season (2011) as safeties coach. While still in the Mountain Time Zone, El Paso represented the Eastern-most stop in his impressive college coaching career.

For all or parts of six seasons, has coached at the NFL level, including two years (2003-04) as a full-time assistant coach with the San Francisco 49ers. Simmons also has assisted NFL staffs during training camp on four occasions, with the Los Angeles Raiders (1993), Arizona Cardinals (1996), San Diego Chargers (1999) and Dallas Cowboys (2000).



Prior to his year in Conference USA, Simmons spent three seasons (2008-10) on Jeff Tedford's staff at Cal, coaching the Golden Bears' defensive backs. During that period, his second stint at Cal, Simmons helped Syd'Quan Thompson, Denver's seventh-round selection in the 2010 NFL Draft, to All-America recognition in both 2008 and '09. The Bears, who picked off just 10 passes the year before Simmons' arrival, improved their interception total to 24, which led the Pac-10 and ranked third in the nation. Cal in the season after adding Simmons also improved its total defense from 378.8 yards/game in 2007 to 315.2, and its pass defense from 214.4 in 2007 to 193.0 in 2008. And in his last season on staff, 2010, Simmons helped Cal lead the conference in total defense, thanks in large part to the play of S Chris Conte, the Chicago Bears' third-round selection in the 2011 NFL Draft.

In two seasons at Arizona State (2006-07), Simmons worked under two head coaches, Dirk Koetter and Dennis Erickson. His Sun Devil pupils included Justin Tryon, a first-team all-Pac-10 selection and fourth-round draft selection that played for the Super Bowl-champion New York Giants in 2011, and Freshman All-American Omar Bolden, a 2012 NFL Draft prospect. And as co-special teams coordinator, Simmons developed 2007 Lou Groza Award winner Thomas Weber.

Simmons spent one season (2005) as Dick Tomey's cornerbacks coach at

San Jose State, after two years on Erickson's 49ers staff in San Francisco, where Simmons coached the cornerbacks in 2003 and the overall secondary in 2004.

He got back into the NFL after two years (2001-02) as Oregon State's defensive backs coach, where he coached All-American Dennis Weathersby, the victim of a random act of violence days before the 2003 NFL Draft, but still selected by Cincinnati in the fourth round. Weathersby left the Beavers as the program's all-time leader in passes defended.

Simmons' first term with Cal, and first experience in the Pac-10, was 1998-2000, when he served as the Golden Bears' cornerbacks coach. His top protégé at Cal was Deltha O'Neal, the No. 1 cornerback selected in the 2000 NFL Draft, 15th overall in 2000, by the Denver Broncos. He also tutored All-American punter Nick Harris, Denver's fourth-round choice in the 2001 draft, and a longtime NFL veteran.

He earned the jump to Cal after serving as defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at Idaho State in 1997.

Before that, Simmons coached for two years (1995-96) under Cliff Hysell at Montana State, as defensive backs coach. With the Bobcats, he first coached with McElwain, at the time the offensive coordinator, and coached a pair of all-conference players, Omar

Turner and Jared Lucero.

Including one campaign (1994) as the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at San Francisco State, Simmons launched his coaching career where he grew up, in the Bay Area. Tim Tierney gave Simmons his first job, at Cal State Hayward as the defensive backs coach, a role he held for two seasons (1986-87). He earned additional duties as Hayward's defensive coordinator, and held the reins of the defense from 1988-93.

An all-conference linebacker at Laney College (1981-82) and an all-league safety at Cal State Hayward (1983-84), Simons grew up about 10 miles from the Oakland Coliseum, and graduated from Oakland High School.

Simmons owns two degrees, a bachelor's in business ('87) and a master's in athletic administration and sensory motor skills ('91), both from Cal State Hayward. He is single.

After nine seasons as an assistant coach and a playing career in the south, Billy Napier heads west to begin his first season as an assistant coach at CSU. He was officially hired to the Rams' staff on Jan. 11, 2012.

Napier, 32, who spent this past season on the Alabama staff, will have some sort of role on the offensive side of the ball at CSU. With the defending BCS national champions, Napier was the offensive quality control assistant. The Tide ranked 16th in scoring offense, 30th in total offense and 17th in rushing offense in 2011.

Prior to Alabama, Napier spent seven of the last eight years at Clemson.

During Napier's final two seasons at Clemson, he earned an elevated position as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. At the age of 29, he became the youngest coordinator in Clemson history. He may have been young, but in no way was he inexperienced. In his first season as Clemson's OC (2009), the Tigers scored a school-record 436 points. Additionally, Clemson scored 54 touchdowns (third-most in school annals), averaged 5.73 yards per play (fourth-best) and finished the year as the ACC Atlantic Division champions. Quarterback Kyle Parker was named a Freshman All-American, and six players Napier coached from 2009-10 went on to careers in the NFL.

From 2006-08, the assistant coach split his time as the team's recruiting coordinator. In those three seasons, he compiled two top-25 recruiting classes, according to Rivals.com, and in 2008, his class was tabbed as the second-best in the nation by ESPN.com. Known to his peers as a top recruiter, Napier has signed several players that went on to the NFL, including Kavell Conner, Crezdon Butler and Marcus Gilchrist. Fourteen players from Clemson's 2011 two-deep were signed by Napier, including five who earned all-ACC honors.

Napier was the tight ends coach at Clemson for two seasons, helping lead the Tigers to two bowl games and a prolific offense. The 2007 season featured a 9-4 record and the ACC's highest scoring offense. In his first year back with Clemson, 2006, Napier worked primarily with the Tigers' tight ends, but was also responsible for the punt team, and assisted in several special-teams capacities. The Tigers led the ACC in total offense, rushing and scoring offense in 2006, advancing to the Music City Bowl. Clemson averaged 410.9 yards per game, in addition to 32.7 points, more than doubling its opponents totals. Tight end Hunter Thomas started all 11 games for the Tigers, averaging 19.1 yards per reception, and Michael Palmer, who Napier coached for three seasons, went on to the NFL. Also working with the special teams, he helped to develop one of the most talented players in Clemson history, C.J. Spiller.

In 2005, Napier spent one season as the quarterbacks coach at South Carolina State. The Bulldogs finished the year 9-2, and ranked among the nation's best in several offensive categories, including: rushing (12th), passing efficiency (15th) and scoring offense (17th). S.C. State also had the country's fourth-best turnover margin, committing just 11 turnovers, roughly one-third of the total from the previous season (32). Napier developed Cleve McCoy, S.C. State's first-year quarterback, and molded him into the MEAC Player of the Year. He also recruited OT Johnny Culbreath, who became a unanimous All-America selection, and was drafted by the Detroit Lions. Napier was offered the position of offensive coordinator after the 2005 season, but declined, instead taking over as the tight ends coach at Clemson.

Napier began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Clemson, from 2003-04. In 2003, the new coach worked with video coordinating. The Tigers won nine games, including the Peach Bowl against Tennessee. The following season, Napier was the on-field graduate assistant on defense, and off the field, got his first experience with recruiting.

As a player, Napier was a four-year letterwinner and two-time all-Southern Conference selection as the starting quarterback at Furman. The Paladins won two conference championships and in 2001, Napier's junior year, advanced to the Division I-AA national championship, where they lost to Montana, 13-6.

The gunslinger completed 64.8 percent of his career passes, which still stands as a school record. As the team captain during a

record-setting senior season, Napier recorded 2,475 passing yards, also a Furman record, and was a finalist for the Walter Payton Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding offensive player.

He earned his bachelor's degree in health & exercise science from Furman in 2002.

Born July 21, 1979, in Cookeville, Tenn., Napier grew up in Chatsworth, Ga., and graduated from Murray County High School in 1998. His father, Bill, and two brothers, Matt and Kurt, are high-school coaches in Georgia. Napier is married to the former Ali Gunn. The couple's first child was born in June.

Derek Frazier returns to his hometown to begin his 14th season in coaching, his first at CSU. He joined Jim McElwain's staff officially on Feb. 7, 2012.

Frazier spent the previous six seasons (2006-11) as offensive line coach at Fresno State, including three years (2009-11) as run-game coordinator.

In 2011, his senior left tackle Bryce Harris was named first-team all-WAC (second-team selection in 2010), in addition Capital One CoSIDA Academic All-District 8 first-team honors. Harris started in 39 straight games to close out his career at Fresno State. Senior Leslie Cooper was named second-team All-WAC by Phil Steele, helping Fresno State's offense average 411.8 yards per game. Additionally, running back Robbie Rouse had 1,549 yards rushing, a total that led the WAC and was the third most in a year in school history. Rouse's 2,678 yards from 2010-11 are the most ever by a Bulldog running back in back-to-back seasons. Fresno State averaged 4.1 yards per rush, 12.7 yards per completion and 6.0 yards per play on the year behind the offensive line.



In 2010, Frazier coached Andrew Jackson, who was selected by the Atlanta Falcons in the 2011 NFL Draft. Under Frazier's guidance Rouse became the first true sophomore in program history to rush for over a 1,000 yards in a single season.

He also directed one of the nation's top running attacks in 2009, led by All-American and NCAA rushing leader Ryan Mathews, who went on to be the No. 12 pick by the San Diego Chargers in the 2010 NFL Draft. Fresno State was eighth

in the NCAA in rushing and 17th in total offense in 2009.

Frazier has developed six players that have earned first-team all-WAC honors, all in consecutive seasons (Kenny Wiggins, Andrew Jackson, Bobby Lepori, Ryan Wendell, Chris Denman and Harris). Jackson became Fresno State's first-ever first-team Academic All-American. In 2007, Frazier juggled an offensive line hit hard by injuries, but saw the improvement of several young players including center Joe Bernardi and guard Jackson, both redshirt-freshman starters. And because of the blocking of the offensive line in the 2007 Humanitarian Bowl, the Bulldog offense was able to rack up 571 yards of total offense against ACC foe Georgia Tech.

In 2006 under Frazier, offensive lineman Chris Denman was selected first-team all-WAC and drafted by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, one of four Fresno State players drafted that year, helping the 'Dogs dominate the line of scrimmage in consecutive bowl game victories, over UCLA and No. 18 Virginia. In 2006, the offensive line set a school record by allowing only 12 quarterback sacks, and was also part of a group that opened holes for Dwayne Wright, the nation's sixth-best rusher and a fourth-round draft pick by

Buffalo. That year, the Fresno State rushing offense was ranked No. 16 (180.0 ypg.) in the nation, while the offense ranked No. 5 in the NCAA in scoring and was one of the nation's most efficient in third-down conversions and red-zone efficiency. Plus, Fresno State ranked No. 15 in the NCAA in rushing offense with 228.0 yards per game.

While at Fresno State, he helped develop All-American Logan Mankins and Freshman All-Americans Ryan Wendell, Kyle Young and Cole Popovich.

Frazier returned to Fresno State on Feb. 21, 2006, after one season as the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Northern Arizona.

From 2003-2004, he spent time as a graduate assistant at Fresno State, where he worked with the offensive line. The Bulldog line paved the way to a single-game record 503 rushing yards vs. Hawaii in 2004.

Before moving to Fresno State, he was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Adams State College for two seasons (2001-02). Off the gridiron, he served as the weight throws coach on the Adams State track & field team.

During the 2000 season, he was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Nichols College (Dudley, Mass.) and led his team to a 7-3 record and first-ever postseason appearance. Prior to that, he spent one season as an assistant offensive line coach at Juneau (Alaska) Douglas High School.

Frazier was a center at Northern Colorado, where he lettered for four years, helping the Bears win their first national championship in 1996. He was selected the team's most inspirational player as a senior.

Frazier earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Northern Colorado in 1997 and an MBA from Nichols College in 2000. A native of Fort Collins, Colo., he is a 1992 Rocky Mountain High School graduate. His father, Tom Frazier, was a standout football player at the University of Wyoming.

He and his wife, Taryn, recently celebrated the birth of their first child, Katelyn.

Jeff Hammerschmidt enters his first season on the CSU coaching staff. Hired by Jim McElwain Feb. 7, 2012, he begins his 21st season in the profession.

Hammerschmidt comes to Colorado State from Arizona, where he'd served as special teams coordinator and defensive ends coach for four seasons (2008-11), helping the

Wildcats to the Las Vegas, Holiday and Alamo bowls. A standout defensive back for the Wildcats in his playing days, his players during his second stint at Arizona totaled eight all-conference selections: PK John Bonano in 2011, DE Brooks Reed and DE Ricky Elmore in 2010, Elmore in 2009, PK Jason Bondzio and P Keenyn Crier in 2009, and Reed and PR Mike Thomas in 2008.

Two of his defensive ends, Reed and Elmore, were selected in the 2011 NFL Draft. Elmore led the Pac-10 with 11 sacks in 2010, while Reed compiled 8½ to help the Wildcats finish third in the league. Hammerschmidt also coached the Pac-12's leading punter in 2011, Kyle Dugandzic.

Hammerschmidt had returned to Arizona after a trio of one-year stops, at San Jose State (linebackers in 2007), Stanford (special teams/outside LBs in 2006) and Cal Poly (linebackers in 2005). At SJSU, he coached first-team all-WAC selection Matt Castelo.

The San Diego-area product caught the attention of many observers during a two-year term (2003-04) at Montana, where he guided the Grizzlies to a berth in the 2004 Division I-AA national championship on the strength of 38 takeaways, tied for second in the country. The year before, Montana owned the nation's fifth-best rushing defense.

Hammerschmidt made the jump to Montana after three seasons (2000-03) as defensive coordinator at St. Mary's, which disbanded football in 2003.

Prior to that, he served two seasons (1998-99) in the Big Ten, as Cam Cameron's special team coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Indiana. With the Hoosiers, he coached three future NFL starters, Adewale Ogunleye, Kris Dielman and, on special teams, Antwaan Randle El.

Hammerschmidt had left his alma mater to become a first-time coordinator, taking the defensive reins at Southern Utah from 1996-97, while also coaching the Thunderbirds' defensive line and linebackers.

Recruited to Arizona by Tomey in the mid-1980s, Hammerschmidt launched his coaching career under his mentor at Arizona as a graduate assistant in 1992. Promoted to safeties coach the following season, he helped the Desert Swarm defense vault to No. 9 in the final 1993 rankings after a 29-0 Fiesta Bowl triumph over Miami (Fla.). He coached the team's entire secondary from 1994-95.

During his first stint as an Arizona coach, his star pupil was consensus All-America safety Tony Bouie. Another safety, Brandon Sanders, was a two-time all-Pac-10 performer.

A four-year letterman, three-year starting safety and first-team all-Pac-10 selection at Arizona, Hammerschmidt was semifinalist for the 1989 Jim Thorpe Award. After beginning his career as an occasional option quarterback in 1987, he garnered Pac-10 Player of the Week honors in 1989 after helping the Wildcats to a 6-3 victory over No. 6 Oklahoma. Signed as a free agent by the Los Angeles Rams in 1991, he played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of the World League in 1992 before kicking off his coaching career.

A product of San Diego's Helix High School, which later produced both the No. 1 and No. 2 overall selections in the NFL Draft, he followed in the footsteps of Chuck Cecil in signing with Arizona.

The brother of former CSU safety and longtime assistant coach Dan Hammerschmidt, Jeff and his wife, Felicity, have two children, Bryn and Bode. He owns a bachelor's degree in sociology from Arizona ('91).

Greg Lupfer enters his first season at Colorado State, hired by Jim McElwain on March 20, 2012.

Now in his 18th season as a coach, Lupfer has 11 years of experience as a defensive coordinator, including the previous three seasons (2009-11) at Division I FCS Cal Poly, in San Luis Obispo, Calif., where he also coached the linebackers and secondary.

At Cal-Poly, Lupfer coached a pair of standout defenders. CB Asa Jackson, a first-team all-conference selection for three straight years, was an FCS All-American who is eligible for the 2012 NFL Draft. He also coached 2010 Great West Defensive Player of the Year Marty Mohamed, who signed with the CFL's Hamilton TigerCats during the NFL lockout of 2011.

Lupfer spent one season in the Mid-American Conference, coaching the safeties and outside linebackers at Toledo, in 2008.



Before that stop, he coached for 12 seasons (1995-2006) at Portland State, his alma mater, finishing his long stint there as the Vikings' interim head coach during the winter of 2006-07. At the reins of some of the top-rated defenses in the Big Sky Conference, his units produced a pair of NFL players. Colorado State transfer Adam Hayward was the conference player of the year and a finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award as the top defender in the country. Lupfer also tutored future Carolina Panthers starting linebacker Jordan Senn.

Portland State in 2006 allowed only 12.4 points per game in conference games, easily the top mark in the league, and the team's 18.4 overall points per game marked the program's lowest mark since it joined the Division I-AA level in 1996. What's more, only one other team in the country had more than Portland State's 31 takeaways. Lupfer's unit also excelled in 2004, when the Vikings led the league in every significant category, including scoring defense (20.3), rushing defense (110.1) and total defense (346.3). And in 2000, the Vikings knocked off No. 23-ranked Hawaii, a Division I-A team.

From 1995-99, prior to his appointment as Portland State defensive coordinator, Lupfer coached the program's outside linebackers (1995) and secondary (1996-99), while coordinating special teams from 1996-99. He got his start in coaching as a graduate assistant, working with outside linebackers, for one season at Boise State in 1994. That year, the Broncos advanced to the Division I-AA national championship.

A standout linebacker at Portland State, Lupfer earned All-Western League honors in 1991, leading the team in tackles and helping the Vikings (11-3) to the NCAA Division II semifinals. An injury sidelined him during the 1992 campaign, but he rebounded in 1993 to lead the Vikings back to the postseason. Lupfer finished with 177 career tackles at PSU, after beginning his playing days at Walla Walla Community College, near his hometown of Dayton, Wash.

A 1994 graduate of Portland State, Lupfer owns a degree in social science. He and his wife, Tina, have three children, Taylor (11), Colby (9) and Demi (1).

Tim Skipper begins his first season on the Colorado State coaching staff. He joined the Rams on Jan. 5, 2012.

A versatile teacher, Skipper has coached on both sides of the ball and has served for all or parts of four seasons as a defensive coordinator.

Skipper, 33, comes to Fort Collins from Fresno State, where he spent six seasons. His first three years (2006-08) on Pat Hill's staff were as running backs coach; he served his final three campaigns (2009-11) as linebackers coach. Skipper was the team's interim defensive coordinator for the final three games in 2011, and also coordinated the Bulldogs' run defense from 2009-11.

With Skipper at the reins of the defense during that three-game stretch in 2011, the Bulldogs allowed 9.7 fewer points per game than they had over the first 10 games, 70.1 fewer rushing yards, and 25.3 fewer total yards. The Bulldogs advanced to four bowl games in Skipper's six seasons, largely due to his development of all-conference linebackers Ben Jacobs and Travis Brown, and explosive running backs Ryan Matthews, Dwayne Wright, Lonyae Miller and Clifton Smith.

Jacobs, after garnering first-team all-WAC honors in consecutive seasons, signed as a free agent with the Cleveland Browns in 2011. Likely a 2013 draft selection, Brown earned all-league accolades in both 2010 and '11 in only his sophomore and junior years, respectively.

In 2008, Skipper's final season as the Bulldogs' running backs coach, three of his players turned in games of 150-plus yards, including Matthews, who had ranked 10th in the country at the time of his October injury. The year before, Skipper molded Matthews into a freshman All-American in the player's first collegiate season, when he paced his class nationally in touchdowns (14). Matthews went on to garner All-America honors as a junior in 2009 before declaring himself eligible for the 2010 NFL Draft, in which the Chargers selected him in the first round, 12th overall. He topped the 1,000-yard barrier in 2011.

Including Matthews, an impressive five of Skipper's Fresno State backs advanced to the NFL, Lonyae Miller (Dallas Cowboys free agent, 2010), Dwayne Wright (fourth-round selection, Buffalo, 2007), Clifton Smith (Tampa Bay Buccaneers free agent, 2008) and FB Roshon Vercher (Arizona Cardinals free agent, 2008). Smith used his exceptional return skills to earn second-team All-Pro honors and a trip to the Pro Bowl as a rookie in 2008.

With McElwain as offensive coordinator in 2007, Skipper's players averaged 4.7 yards per carry and, with 204.67 rushing yards per game, ranked No. 16 in the nation, helping the Bulldogs advance to the Humanitarian Bowl opposite Georgia Tech. During the stretch run, over the season's final four contests, Fresno State averaged 227.0 rushing yards, including 286 in a decisive 40-28 triumph over the ACC's Yellow Jackets. Four of his players that year, Miller, Smith, Matthews and Anthony Harding, had 100-yard games.

In his first season on Fresno State's staff, his top player in 2006 was Wright, who finished as the nation's sixth-best rusher, with 1,462 yards and 11 touchdowns. Vercher paved the way.

Before returning to his alma mater, Skipper spent the previous three seasons (2003-05) at Sacramento State. The Hornets' defensive coordinator in 2004 and '05, he also guided the team's secondary all three seasons. In 2004, his initial campaign at the reins of the defense, Sac State produced the Big Sky Conference leaders in tackles (Jimmy Ellingson), sacks (Jacob Houston) and interceptions (Ramon Payne), as well as Matt Logue, an All-American who finished his career as the school's career leader with 47 tackles for loss.

Skipper followed his father's footsteps and entered the coaching profession in 2001, as the secondary coach at Division II Western New Mexico. After his first year with the Mustangs, he earned defensive-coordinator responsibilities prior to the 2002 campaign.

A four-year starter for Hill and Fresno State at middle linebacker from 1997-2000, he excelled despite playing as one of the smallest at his position, earning an appearance on both the 1999 and 2000 watch lists of the Butkus Award, presented annually to

the nation's top linebacker. A two-year defensive captain and three-time all-WAC selection, he still ranks second in school annals with 418 career tackles, including 117 in his first campaign, when he earned freshman All-America recognition. Voted the team's most inspirational player as a senior in 2000, he guided the Bulldogs to a dramatic Silicon Valley Football Classic, where they barely lost to Air Force. In 1999, he helped Fresno State to a share of the WAC championship and a berth in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Born April 15, 1978, in New Orleans, La., Skipper graduated from Bonnabel High School in Kenner, La. He comes from a family of coaches. His father, Jim, has coached for four decades, including several NFL years with current Broncos head coach John Fox and time in the USFL, AFL and NCAA; he currently serves as the Tennessee Titans running backs coach. Tim's brother, Kelly, has been in the profession since 1989 and currently coaches running backs for the Oakland Raiders. Kelly was an All-America RB at Fresno State.

A Dean's List student and WAC Scholar Athlete, Tim graduated from Fresno State in 2001 with a degree in communications. He is single.

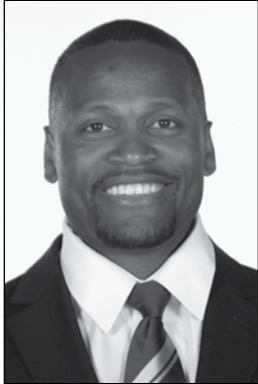

Alvis Whitted, a nine-year NFL veteran, enters his first season as a Division I FBS position coach. Hired by Jim McElwain to serve as part of his inaugural CSU staff, Whitted officially joined the Rams on Feb. 7, 2012.

Whitted (pronounced WHITT-id) came to Fort Collins after a brief stay at Appalachian State in early 2012, after spending the 2011 season on Rick Neuheisel's staff at UCLA, as offensive quality-control assistant.

At UCLA, Whitted worked with wide receivers and special teams, and helped prepare the offense for games by heading the defensive scout team.

Before moving to Pasadena, Whitted spent the 2010 season at Division III Millsaps College in Jackson, Miss., as wide receivers coach. There, he began to launch recruiting ties throughout the Southeastern U.S., and coached senior Michael Galatas, a first-team all-conference selection and the league Special Teams Player of the Year.

Following an impressive NFL playing tenure, Whitted began his coaching career as a high-school assistant at his alma

mater, Orange High School in Hillsborough, N.C., from 2008-09.

Selected by Tom Coughlin and the Jacksonville Jaguars in the seventh round (192nd overall) of the 1998 NFL Draft, Whitted played for three teams, including the Atlanta Falcons (2001) and Oakland Raiders (2002-06). In addition to Coughlin, who would go on to win two Super Bowls, Whitted's NFL head coaches were Dan Reeves, Norv Turner and Art Shell, among others. He played under coaching staffs that included Dom Capers, Wade Phillips, Jim Harbaugh, Bobby Petrino, Frank Gansz and Dick Jauron.

Over a nine-year NFL career, he played in 122 games with 24 starts, and caught 74 passes for 1,030 yards and six touchdowns. He also picked up 118 yards on 14 rushing attempts. As an occasional kickoff returner, he had 388 yards on 21 returns, including a 98-yard touchdown in 1999. A special-teams standout, he recorded 20 career coverage tackles.

Whitted played in a pair of AFC championship games, with Jacksonville in 2000 and Oakland in 2002, and helped the Raiders to a berth in Super Bowl XXXVII following the '02 season. His finest season was his last, 2006, when he started 13 games and established career highs with 27 receptions and 299 receiving yards.

A dominant return specialist at N.C. State (1994-97), he totaled 1,929 kickoff-return yards, No. 2 in school history at the time of his graduation, and currently third all-time. He owns two of the top 10 kickoff returns in Wolfpack annals, a 97-yard TD vs. Maryland in 1994 and a 96-yard score vs. Florida State in 1996.

Whitted's N.C. State athletic contributions on the track in the spring were just as valuable. A world-class sprinter as a four-time All-American, he holds the school records in the 100, 200 and 400 meters. At the 1996 U.S. Olympic Trials, he finished sixth in the 200. On two occasions, the Atlantic Coast Conference named him its most valuable performer, and seven times he won an individual conference title. After being drafted into the NFL, he graduated with the H.C. Kennett Award, the most prestigious honor given to an N.C. State athlete each year.

A native of Durham, N.C., Whitted competed in football and track at Orange High School in Hillsborough, N.C. He won the 100 and 200 meters at the North Carolina state championship.

Whitted graduated from N.C. State in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in business management/finance. He is single.

Tom EHLERS

One of Colorado State's most passionate individuals, Tom Ehlers enters his 28th overall season in the Rams athletic department, and his 32nd year overall in college athletics.

After a long career as a Rams student-athlete and assistant football coach, Ehlers took on a new role prior to the 2005 season, assuming supervision over the football program's logistics, administration and overall operations.

Originally a competitor on the gridiron as a four-year starter on the Rams' offensive and defensive lines, following his career he channeled his gregarious enthusiasm into the coaching profession. And now, including his chapter as director of operations, his tenure as a member of the football staff is the longest by an assistant in school history.

During his coaching career, he tutored 12 all-conference performers, including Bryan Save (2003), Peter Hogan (2001, '02), Clark Haggans (1999), Joey Porter (1998), Adrian Ross (1997), Brady Smith (1994, '95), Sean Moran (1994, '95), Steve Norton (1993), and Steve Hodge (1993).

Six of the players he formerly coached ranked in the top 10 in quarterback sacks, including Haggans (first), Smith (second), Porter (fourth), Hodge (tie, seventh), Ross (tie, seventh), and Moran (ninth).

In 2003, defensive tackles Bryan Save, Lavell Mann and Chris Kiffin all ranked among the conference leaders in quarterback sacks. In 2002, Peter Hogan was a first-team all-conference selection.

Porter, a former NFL star, was a first-team all-conference performer in 1998 and played in two postseason all-star games. He now plays for the Arizona Cardinals after having earned all-star honors as a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers, where he was also a member of a Super Bowl champion squad, and Miami Dolphins.

Ross was a two-time first-team all-conference selection in 1996 and '97 and played in the Hula Bowl following his senior season. He later played six years in the NFL as a member of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Smith and Moran each earned first-team honors in 1994 and '95. Smith was the conference's defensive player of the year in 1995. Both played extensively NFL.

Haggans initially played for the Pittsburgh Steelers, and was a member of the team's Super Bowl championship team, before signing with Arizona, who went to the Super Bowl in his first season there.

Ehlers also was responsible for recruiting Gartrell Johnson, who finished his CSU career with the second-most prolific rushing season in program annals. Ehlers formerly served as a defensive line coach at Oregon State (1985-86) as a graduate assistant for the Beavers. In 1987 he was a graduate assistant working with the defensive line at the University of Arizona.

As a player at Colorado State (1980-84), he was a four-year starter and letterwinner. Ehlers played offensive line and defensive line and was a WAC Scholar-Athlete Award Winner in 1984. On three occasions, he earned academic all-WAC honors.

Born July 10, 1962, in Riverside, Calif., he and his wife Laurie have three children, Annie, Christine and Timothy, and make their home in Fort Collins.

He graduated from Colorado State in 1985 with a bachelor's in business administration, before earning an MBA from Oregon State ('86).

Mike Kent begins his first season as the head football strength and conditioning coach at Colorado State. Hired by Jim McElwain, he joined the Rams staff on Jan. 19, 2012.

Kent, who trained Darrelle Revis, Josh Freeman and Deion Branch during their college careers, enters his 32nd season as a coach of football student-athletes, a career that includes 29 years as a respected strength and conditioning instructor.

Kent joins the Rams from Appalachian State, where he'd served two stints (2009-11 and 1990-99) as head of the Mountaineers' strength and conditioning program for all student-athletes.

Including a school-record three Appalachian State players selected in a single draft (three in 2011) and eight total drafted players - counting five during his first stint at App State - Kent has physically and mentally conditioned more than three dozen future NFL athletes. Included on that list:

He spent three seasons (2007-09) at Kansas State, three years (2004-06) at Pitt, four campaigns (2000-03) at Louisville, and one year (1999) at Eastern Kentucky.

Before overseeing the power and speed performances of all student-athletes at Appalachian State (1990-99), he served as assistant director of strength and conditioning at East Carolina from 1998-90.

The head strength coach at Shepherd College in Shepherdstown, W.V. from 1987-88, Kent also coached defensive line for that program. Before that, he laid much of his foundation in the field at North Carolina State, where from 1985-87 he served as graduate assistant, strength coach and assistant defensive line coach.

Kent invested four years into high-school athletes, as a strength coach, offensive line coach and social studies teach at Miramar (Fla.) High School from 1984-85, and as the head wrestling coach, assistant football and track coach, and weight-room assistant at East Fairmont (W.V.) High School from 1982-84. He launched his coaching career as a student-assistant working with defensive ends, and assisting in the weight room, at Fairmont (W.V.) from 1981-82.

A former outside linebacker, Kent played from 1978-79 at Potomac State College in West Virginia, and in 1980 at Fairmont State. A 1982 graduate of Fairmont State, he owns a bachelor's in education and social studies. He also earned a master's in recreation resource administration from N.C. State in 1987.

Kent and his wife, Deena, are relocating to Fort Collins. A member of the National Hot Rod Association, he hails from Parkersburg, W.V.



Rashad HARRIS

>> Assistant Football Strength & Conditioning
>> First Season at Colorado State

Rashad Harris begins his first season as the assistant strength & conditioning coach for CSU football in 2012.

At Colorado State, Harris is reunited with Head Coach Jim McElwain and Football Strength & Conditioning Coach Mike Kent for the first time since the three were on the Louisville sideline at the 2000 Liberty Bowl against the Rams. A four-year starter (1997-2000) for the Cardinals, Harris was the program's defensive MVP as a senior.

He joins the Rams from powerhouse Saint Xavier High School in Louisville, Ky., where he had served as an assistant football coach, strength coach, and P.E. teacher since the 2006 season.

Before that, Harris was a football graduate assistant at Michigan State, where he worked with McElwain and CSU offensive coordinator Dave Baldwin.

He made the transition into coaching after retiring as a professional player, following two seasons with the Barcelona Dragons (NFL Europe) from 2002-03, and time on the rosters of the Jacksonville Jaguars (2002) and Cincinnati Bengals (2001).

A second-team all-Conference USA linebacker at Louisville, he also garnered third-team honors from Phil Steele and all-freshman recognition in 1997, his first of four years as a starter. Harris, who ranks 10th all-time on the program's career tackles list, led the Cardinals to three bowl games and a 2000 league championship. A scholar-athlete, he also earned his teammates' vote as a captain in each of his final two seasons.

Recruited to Louisville by Ron Cooper, now an assistant at LSU, Harris starred at Athens (Ala.) High School near Huntsville, Ala., a school that also produced QB Philip Rivers.

Harris graduated in 2001 from Louisville with a degree in physical education. He also owns a master's in sports administration from Michigan State ('05) and has nearly completed his requirements for a second master's, in special education, from Georgetown (Ky.) College.

Harris and his wife, Rebecca, have a daughter, Soleil.



Drew HILL

>> Director of Player Personnel
>> First Season at Colorado State

Drew Hill enters his first season on staff at Colorado State, where he will fill the role of Director of Player Personnel on Head Coach Jim McElwain's inaugural staff.

Hill comes to Colorado State from new Mountain West foe Fresno State, where he spent eight seasons as the Bulldogs' football operations coordinator (2004-12). While in Fresno, Hill worked alongside McElwain for one seasons (2007) and spent five years (2006-11) on staff with CSU's new linebackers coach Tim Skipper.

Hill will play a key role CSU's recruiting efforts, coordinating several aspects of the recruiting process. He will act as a link between the coaching and support staff that will develop student-athletes on and off the field, including strength and conditioning coaches and academic coordinators. In addition, Hill will act as the liaison between CSU and NFL scouts for pro-day events, and assists with camps, clinic and other football-related events.

During his tenure at Fresno State, the Bulldogs made six bowl appearances, including the 2008 New Mexico Bowl against Colorado State, and captured bowl victories over two opponents, Virginia (37-34 in the 2004 MPC Computers Bowl) and Georgia Tech (40-28 in the 2007 Roady's Humanitarian Bowl), from BCS-automatic-qualifying conferences.

Hill, a 14-year veteran with collegiate and NFL experience, came to Fresno State from Southern Mississippi, where for three years he served as the assistant director of football operations. While with the Golden Eagles, he was a part of a team that won the 2003 Conference USA championship and played in the Liberty Bowl. USM also participated in the 2002 Houston Bowl in Hill's tenure.

Prior to Southern Mississippi, the Atlanta native worked for three years as the college scouting assistant for the Atlanta Falcons of the NFL. He was a part of the 1998 team that played the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XXXIII.

Hill graduated from Southern Mississippi in 2002 with a bachelor's degree in sports administration and a minor in business administration. He married Kristi Moak in the spring of 2005 and they have one daughter, Madison Elizabeth.

Tim LeRoy is in his first year at Colorado State, joining the Rams' program after spending the last two years at Washington State.

A veteran coach and recruiter with more than 17 years of experience in the business, LeRoy was director of player personnel at Washington State, where he evaluated prospective student-athletes, provided defensive quality control and

Miles Kochevar enters his first season as a graduate assistant at Colorado State. He will work on the defensive side of the ball. Kochevar returns to Colorado State where he starred on the gridiron for the Rams.

Prior of his return to Fort Collins, Kochevar spent four seasons on the Colorado Mesa University football coaching staff. Kochevar mentored the secondary and was the

Mavericks Special Teams unit coordinator.

Thanks to Kochevar's expertise, in 2010 Colorado Mesa ranked fourth overall in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference in total defense. Inside linebacker Bennett Newton ranked 12th overall in Division II and led the conference in tackles per game (11.0). Defensive back Aaron Silverthorn ranked third in the league in tackles. Five defensive players earned RMAC All-Conference honors including Newton's selection to the National Football Foundation All-Colorado Team.

In 2008 CMU's secondary placed two players on the All Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference Team and three players on the All-RMAC Special Teams. All-American kicker Jared Keating was named RMAC Special Teams Player of the Year and invited to play in the Cactus Bowl.

A local standout at Fruita Monument High School, Kochevar was a three sport athlete for the Wildcats excelling in football, basketball and baseball. He was a three-time all-conference and two-time all-state defensive player. Kochevar was named to the All-Colorado Team and named Rocky Mountain Defensive Player of the Year following his senior season.

Kochevar was a three-year varsity letterwinner at CSU. As Team Captain his senior year he anchored the Rams defensive unit, leading the team in tackles. He was voted Most Valuable Player by the Rocky Mountain Collegian.

Miles Kochevar is a 2005 graduate of Colorado State. As a two-year letter winner, he was on the 2002 Mountain West championship team. His best season in the green and gold came in 2005, his senior year, as he recorded 91 tackles and a sack.

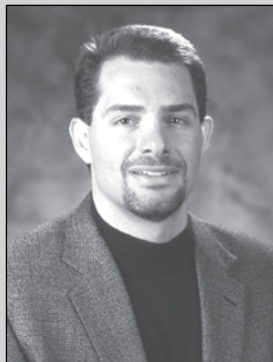

Dr. Jim FRANCIS

>> Faculty Athletics Representative
>> 42nd Year at Colorado State

G. James Francis, Ph.D., is in the third year of his second turn as Colorado State's faculty athletic representative to the NCAA.

Designated by President Tony Frank, Francis represents Colorado State and its faculty in its relationships with the NCAA and Mountain West. He is one of five recognized individuals authorized to make contact with the NCAA membership services staff, and plays an important role in the well-being of student-athletes. He also serves as the senior faculty advisor to the President, and as a vital communications link between the athletics department and faculty.

A professor and director of the Center for Professional Development and Business Research in CSU's College of Business, Francis during his first tenure as FAR (1985-95) was a member of the NCAA Council, the secretary/treasurer and member of the board of directors of the College Football Association, and president of the Mountain-Pacific Sports Federation.

Involved in athletics in some capacity for most of his life, Francis lettered in four sports as a college athlete. He also has coached baseball and basketball at all levels from grade school to high school.

Today, he serves on the Colorado Senior Sports Development Council and coaches track for Special Olympics and Masters Athletes, and remains competitive in track with the Masters organization, having earned All-America honors in the outdoor pentathlon and 400 meters.

Francis has taught management classes at the graduate and undergraduate levels, has been an owner/operator of two small businesses, and has worked for a Fortune 100 firm in organization development. As a management consultant to clients in the private and public sectors, he has worked with a wide variety of businesses and organizations and has served on boards of directors and advisory councils for corporations, public institutions and not-for-profit organizations. Currently, he holds the national reins of Sigma Iota Epsilon, the professional and student honorary of the Academy of Management.

Jim and his wife, Sandra, live in Fort Collins and have two grown children. A native of Yale, Iowa, he holds two degrees from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, diplomas in management/organizational behavior (Ph.D.) and industrial relations (M.A.). He completed his undergraduate work with a B.A. in economics from Central College of Iowa.

The author or co-author of three books, he has written more than 50 articles and professional papers, and has been the principal investigator on research grants eclipsing \$5 million.

Doug MAX

>> Senior Associate A.D./Facilities Management
>> 33rd Year at Colorado State

Doug Max enters his 33rd year at Colorado State. Then-AD Fum McGraw named him to the CSU staff as head track and field coach on Aug. 23, 1980.

Max is responsible for all athletic facilities, including the McGraw Athletic Center, Moby Arena, Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium and the Jack Christiansen

Track, where he spent 19 seasons (1980-99) as head coach. He also works with the university's concessions and game management staffs.

In addition, he oversees the athletic video office as well as CSU's equipment room and its staff. During his tenure in the Rams' athletic administration, he also has coordinated football team travel.

Max has been instrumental in nearly \$50 million of athletic facilities enhancements, including the building of the McGraw Center and major renovations of the Rams' football stadium and home track.

In 2006, Max and then AD Paul Kowalczyk worked to turn CSU's new athletic facilities, buildings critical to future success, from conception to reality. Max oversaw the construction of the two buildings, a \$7 million academic and training center, and \$13 million indoor practice facility, both of which opened in the fall of 2009. In 1997, Max served as Colorado State's interim athletic director.

Max joined the administration in May of 1999, when CSU named him assistant AD for facilities and operations. He became an associate AD in 2004. In nearly two decades as head coach at Colorado State, he earned a reputation as one of the country's finest track and field mentors, producing an extensive list of All-Americans, including Shelly Greathouse-Borrman, Bryan Berryhill and Casey Malone. Greathouse-Borrman won five All-America certificates. Berryhill, now head coach of CSU's cross country program, won the 2001 NCAA indoor mile and recorded the nation's fastest outdoor time in the 1,500 meters. Malone won the 1998 NCAA discus title, the program's first men's track crown since 1952, then went on to compete in the 2006 Athens Olympics. He also recruited the program's successful current coach, Brian Bedard.

Prior to returning to his alma mater before the 1980-81 academic year, Max was an assistant at Western Kentucky (1979). He also served four years (1975-78, '80) as the head coach at Estes Park (Colo.) High School.

A Colorado State hurdler from 1971-75, he earned four letters and missed qualifying for the 1972 Olympic trials. In 2003, Max was inducted into the CSU Hall of Fame for his contributions to the athletic department. He also won Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year honors.

Max owns both a bachelor's degree in physical education (CSU '75) and a master's in education (Western Kentucky '80). A native of Sioux City, Iowa, he graduated from Greeley (Colo.) West High School.

He and his wife Cindy make their home in Fort Collins and have three children, daughters Jordan and Rachael, and son Joel.



Gary OZZELLO

>> Senior Associate A.D./Media & Communications
>> 35th Year at Colorado State

Gary Ozzello enters his 35th year in the Colorado State athletic department. He became a full-time employee on June 1, 1978.

Promoted to senior associate athletic director for external operations in the summer of 2003, Ozzello oversees the Rams' marketing, promotions, licensing and media relations efforts, as well as the ticket office. He also serves as the chief

liaison to Nelligan Sports Marketing and works closely with the athletic development, donor relations and special events offices.

Ozzello, 56, had directed the day-to-day operations of Colorado State's media relations office for 28 years, until that wing was reorganized in the summer of 2007, allowing Ozzello to focus on supervising all of the athletic department's external affairs.

In April of 2000, then-President Albert C. Yates presented Ozzello with the university's Distinguished Alumni Award.

During nearly three decades directing media relations, including a tenure as an assistant athletic director (1986-2003), Ozzello publicized hundreds of outstanding CSU accomplishments. In addition, he served as the media coordinator for the 1999 NCAA men's basketball regional, and the 2004 tournament's first and second rounds, both in Denver. He also was a member of the 1994 U.S. Olympic Festival media staff and has volunteered at three men's basketball Final Fours, and more than a dozen regional and first- and second-round events.

Shortly after earning his degree, Ozzello joined the media relations office as its first-ever assistant director, in the summer of 1978. After his supervisor, Mike Mills, resigned in October 1979, Ozzello assumed acting sports information director duties for eight months before then-athletic director Fum McGraw removed the interim label from his title on June 27, 1980. One of Ozzello's first responsibilities was to promote the football team. While earning his degree, he worked four years as a student assistant, originally hired by then-SID Tim Simmons.

Sold on Fort Collins and Colorado State as a junior in high school, Ozzello made his college choice after attending a summer basketball camp run by the late legendary Rams coach Jim Williams. A 1978 graduate, he owns a bachelor's degree in technical journalism, with a concentration in public relations. One of his fellow Class of '78 graduates at CSU was Bill Ritter, now Colorado's governor.

Born in Trinidad, Colo., Ozzello graduated in 1974 from La Junta (Colo.) High School, where was a standout athlete in both baseball and basketball.

Gary has two children, D.J., who graduated summa cum laude from Colorado State in May of 2010, and daughter Angie, who is a junior at CSU majoring health and exercise science with a concentration in health promotion. Christine Susemihl enters her 39th year in the Colorado State athletic department.

Susemihl is Colorado State's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Internal Operations and the department's Senior Woman Administrator (SWA).

Susemihl oversees academic student services, compliance, business operations, the training room, the weight room and 13 of the department's 16 intercollegiate sports.

In recognition of her administrative contributions to the athletics department, she was inducted into the CSU Sports Hall of Honor in 2008.

She is a certified peer-reviewer for the NCAA Division I Athletics Certification Program and served two elected terms as a member of the Board of Directors of the National Association for Athletics Compliance (NAAC). She also is a member of the Joint Council of the Mountain West.

Susemihl serves as the department's equal employment opportunity coordinator and is a member of both the university's Operations Team for Diversity, and Grievance Panel. She has served two terms as a university mediation officer and two terms as a member of the Administrative Professional Council. She also serves on the Campus Community Coalition.

Susemihl joined the staff in 1973. In addition to a myriad of administrative responsibilities over the years, she served as the school's interim Director of Athletics during searches that led to Mark Driscoll's appointment in August of 2003 and Paul Kowalczyk's appointment in May of 2006.

When then-President Albert C. Yates initially named her to this position in 2003, she became the first woman in university history to hold the title of Director of Athletics. She also instituted the department's first-ever NCAA compliance program and headed CSU's day-to-day compliance efforts from 1993 until accepting her internal operations duties in 2007.

After attending The Colorado College and Colorado State University, Susemihl received a degree in business administration from Regis University. A native of Grand Junction, Colo., she has lived in Fort Collins since 1970.



Mike LaPLANTE

>> Associate A.D./Development
>> Ninth Year at Colorado State

Mike LaPlante kicks off his ninth year at Colorado State. He joined the athletic department on April 1, 2004.

LaPlante, 41, is charged with coordinating development efforts and the cultivation of major gifts in support of the university's 16 sports. His experience in athletics in general and with donor cultivation and development has played a critical role in the growth of Colorado

State's athletic program.

Leading five staff members in the areas of development, special events, donor relations and the Ram Club, CSU's annual fund, his group's collective focus is on expanding the department's efforts to provide student-athletes and coaches the resources necessary to compete at the highest levels nationally.

LaPlante has led numerous fundraising efforts, most recently leading athletics fundraising initiatives as part of the university's Campaign for Colorado State, a seven-year, \$500 million effort. Thus far, the athletics department has raised \$27.5 million toward this effort, including the department's newest buildings, a spectacular indoor practice facility and an academic and training center, both of which opened in Fall 2009. In addition to the facility improvements, LaPlante has directed vast improvements for the department, including significant growth in the Ram Legacy of Champions scholarship program, the Junior Ram Club and the Varsity Athletes Club. LaPlante has also led an effort to increase the number of scholarship endowments and estate gifts to athletics. Additionally, LaPlante has played a key role in expanding CSU's reach into the Denver market, home to more than 43,000 alumni, by adding a full-time staff member to operate a Denver development effort. In Spring 2010, LaPlante led the implementation of the Ram Point System to reward fans for their loyal support of CSU Athletics.

LaPlante was promoted to associate athletic director in the fall of 2007. He came to Colorado State after having held a similar position at Cal Poly, where he was associate athletic director for advancement (2000-04). In that role, he oversaw marketing, sponsorship sales and fundraising, and directed a university-wide campaign for athletics that eventually surpassed a goal of \$12 million. Prior to his time at Cal Poly, LaPlante served as assistant director of the Aztec Athletic Foundation at San Diego State University. He began his athletic administration career at SDSU in 1993 as an intern in the marketing and development area.

A 1993 graduate of Bowling Green State University, he owns a bachelor's degree in sport management. Born in Toledo, Ohio, he graduated from the city's St. John's High School.

2012 Season Outlook



Head Coach Jim McElwain

On Dec. 12, 2011 newly-appointed Athletic Director Jack Graham made his first big hire, Jim McElwain the offensive coordinator from Alabama. And, thus, the “Bold New Era” was born.

From the get-go McElwain made it clear he was here for the long haul.

“This is a long-term commitment,” McElwain said. “I am not looking here to bounce; I’m not looking for that. We were looking for a place that we really thought we could build. This is one—because of the vision, because of the drive, because of the commitment and because of the bold new era—we are really excited to be a part of it.”

The offseason was a rollercoaster ride, filled with ups and downs. The depth chart was wiped clean and all jobs are up for grabs. This will give all the student-athletes a chance to prove themselves to the new coaching staff. McElwain made it clear before spring practices what he was looking for, but also emphasized that the returning upperclassmen would be given a chance to make it “their team,” out of respect for the work they’ve put in.

McElwain wanted energy and accountability, both prominent traits he carries; traits that the coaching staff and players demonstrated throughout spring practices.

The Rams enter the 2012 season under new leadership, but with returning players who were difference-makers on the field last season, and renewed energy of a new beginning.

POSITION CHANGES

During the offseason the Rams shifted a few players around in order to get the best athletes on the field. Senior Dominique Vinson will move from cornerback to the offensive side of the ball and line up as a wide receiver, his natural position. With the Rams set to run a multiple-front defense, Broderick Sargent and Davis Burl will move from the defensive line to linebacker. This will provide the defense with even more experience at linebacker.

OFFENSE

Quarterback: The Rams starting quarterback for the past two seasons, Pete Thomas, transferred after the 2011 campaign but the cupboard wasn’t left completely bare. Garrett Grayson, who was rated the No. 22 all-purpose quarterback in the nation out of high school, started the final three games for the Rams after Thomas went down with a knee injury. Grayson offers CSU more mobility than the other quarterbacks on the depth chart. Two other returning quarterbacks are M.J. McPeck and Conner Smith. McPeck, a 6-foot-4 pocket passer, has been a varsity reserve since transfer to CSU from Kansas State. Smith, another pocket passer, redshirted in 2011. New to the squad in fall camp was Fort Collins native Craig Leonard, a Fort Collins native.

Running back: Chris Nwoke, a versatile junior from Highlands Ranch, Colo., made a huge splash onto the Mountain West scene in 2011, running for 1,030 yards and nine touchdowns. His rushing total was the most by a Ram since Gartrell Johnson in 2008. It was also the 16th-best single-season rushing mark in CSU history. Nwoke, who played in all 12 games, is a power back capable of leaping over defenders.

While former starter Ray Carter, who contributed 30 percent of CSU’s 2011 rushing total, graduated, sufficient depth resides behind Nwoke on the depth chart. Donnell Alexander, son of late Pro Football Hall of Famer Derrick Thomas, red-shirted in 2011 but found himself second on the spring depth chart. Although he is listed at 5-foot-11 and 205 pounds he packs a big punch, capable of running over the biggest defenders, which was evident in spring ball. Alexander cumulated over 7,000 yards rushing in four seasons in high school.

Davon Riddick, another redshirt freshman who will be looking to get some touches in 2012, brings speed to the Rams backfield. A football and track athlete from Abilene, Texas brings his 4.4 second speed in the 40-yard dash to CSU.

True Freshman Tommey Morris, from Odessa, Texas and senior Mark Woodbury round out the depth chart.

Tight End/Fullback: The Jim McElwain one-back offense renders the returning fullbacks as more hybrid H-backs or tight ends. Crockett Gillmore entered the 2011 season fresh off a move from defensive end to tight end just nine days before the spring game. He went on to start all 12 games and led the team in all major receiving categories with 45 receptions for 468 yards (10.4) and four touchdowns. That performance prompted him to be named to numerous pre-season all-MW teams for 2012 and to the John Mackey Award watch list.

Backing up Gillmore is a combination of last year’s returning reserves and the corps of converted fullbacks. Blake Jones, who is coming off a knee injury, and Kivon Cartwright are the most experience returning tight ends. When Jones went down, Cartwright saw an increase in playing time and caught three passes for 63 yards (21.0), including a 45-yard reception, catching all passes thrown his way for an average of 21 yards per reception. Cartwright is a fast and athletic hybrid back, a lot like former tight end Kory Sperry was.

Among the former fullbacks, Austin Gillmore returns to full strength after tearing his ACL against Northern Colorado. Gillmore had already made a big move from linebacker to fullback, and was named the starter entering the season.

Jake Levin played in all 12 games last year, including seven starts at fullback. He stepped up in the absence of Gillmore and hauled in nine passes for 100 yards. Levin was key in propelling Nwoke to a Hughes Stadium-record 269 rushing yards vs. Air Force, third-most in CSU history and third-most by an individual at the FBS level in 2011.

Joe Brown was one of CSU’s most complete players in 2011. Listed as a fullback he was able to open up big holes for the running back and also line up in the slot and make plays with his hands. A sure-handed, athletic target, Brown caught at least one pass in 11 of 12 contests and finished with 25 for 197 (7.9) and a touchdown.

Wide receiver: Speed will be the strongest attribute of this year’s receiving corps. The position lost Matt Yemm and T.J. Borcky to graduation, but returns big-play threats Lou Greenwood and Thomas Coffman.

Greenwood, a 6-foot, 181-pound senior, led all receivers with 26 catches for 396 yards and two touchdowns. Since being moved from running back he has been

CSU's most dangerous weapon with the ability to line up in the slot or split wide.

The Rams have another speed threat in Coffman. Although only pulling in eight receptions, he had the team's highest average per reception (26.2). He best demonstrated his speed and athletic ability when he made a highlight-reel, diving catch against Boise State. This 46-yard gain was nominated for GEICO Play of the Year and made No. 3 on ESPN's Top Plays of the Weekend.

Marquise Law and Dominique Vinson also will be receivers to watch in 2012. Law has flashed potential, and seeks to put it all together in final season as a Ram. The 6-foot-4, 212-pound senior capitalized on an opportunity to start in 2011.

Vinson is the best off-the-radar candidate for 2012. After playing cornerback for the Rams since his transfer from Saddleback College he will be moved to the offensive side of the ball. Wide receiver was his high school position, where he excelled. As a senior in high school Vinson caught 78 passes for 1,126 yards and 12 touchdowns. At the collegiate level he has been able to show off his speed and versatility, including a 25-yard interception return while breaking tackles and side-stepping opponents.

Offensive line: From last year's starting offensive line the Rams will return three of the starters, losing Jake Gdowski and Paul Madsen to graduation. This group will be one of the most experienced lines in the Mountain West.

Not only do the Rams return Weston Richburg, Jordan Gragert and Ty Sambrailo—a group with more than 43 combined starts—but also will add Joe Caprioglio. Caprioglio, a 6-foot-6, 315-pound senior, was moved to tackle, his natural position, last season but a knee injury sidelined him after three games at weakside tackle. He has notched 12 career starts.

Offensive linemen will tell you that it is a bad thing if the media or fans know their name but that isn't the case for Richburg. He is a household name for Ram fans. Richburg, who hasn't missed a game in his career, has earned first-team Freshman All-America honors (2010), a second-team all-MW nod (2011), and back-to-back years on the Rimington Trophy watch list. He became a fan favorite late in the 2011 season after demonstrating his toughness. Richburg broke a bone in his snapping hand but played next week at tackle. After two weeks at tackle he returned to center and snapped with his left hand in the season finale against Wyoming.

Ram fans should expect consistently strong pass protection and wide holes for Nwoke and his fellow backfield mates.

DEFENSE

Defensive line: This will be a new-look unit for CSU fans after a great deal of change in the offseason. Co-defensive coordinators Al Simmons and Marty English will run a multiple front defense, catering to the unit's strength at linebacker, but talent does return, and several new faces will bolster the position.

Among the returnees, Curtis Wilson, a 6-foot-4, 265-pound junior, played in 12 games last season and recorded 12 tackles. He should see significant time on the line along with Te'Jay Brown. Brown, also a junior who played in 12 games and also flashed potential.

John Froland, who received 2012 preseason all-MW honors by Phil Steele, is the most promising of the returning defensive linemen. He has a nice balance of speed and strength that can make him tough to block. As a freshman he was able to accumulate 34 tackles, the second-most by a CSU defensive lineman in 2011. At 6-foot-5 he also has length to get his hands on the ball and deflect it at the line.

New to the unit is defensive end Lanston Tanyi, a late transfer from Appalachian State. The former all-conference player has one season of eligibility remaining, and is cleared to play immediately after graduating from Appalachian State in the spring.

Linebacker: The strength of this year's defense lies in the linebacking unit with the addition of Davis Burl and Broderick Sargent to an already strong core.

The top returnee is preseason All-MW selection Shaquil Barrett, who led the Rams with 99 tackles in his first year with CSU after transferring from Nebraska-Omaha. Barrett produced one of the best seasons by a CSU defensive player in many years, highlighted by two return touchdowns to go along with 4.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks.

The 2012 defensive formation will feature more linebackers than seen previously so the roles of James Skelton, Max Morgan and Aaron Davis will be greater this year.

2012 Season Outlook

Skelton was very consistent last season, finishing second on the team with 91 tackles, and will be a big factor this year, complementing Barrett.

Morgan, who registered a safety in his first collegiate game, and Davis have played in a combined 21 games.

Secondary: The secondary took the biggest hit after the 2011 season. The Rams' most experienced players, Ivory Herd and Elijah-Blu Smith, graduated. They will, however, have some veteran experience in the secondary in Momo Thomas and Austin Gray.

Another familiar name will be Shaq Bell. He will play everything from safety to nickel corner.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Special teams coordinator Jeff Hammerschmidt has to be pleased with what he has inherited in his first year in Fort Collins. He will be working with a four-year punter in Pete Kontodiakos, a long snapper that he can trust and experienced kick and punt returners.

Kontodiakos averaged a career-best 38.7 net yards per punt and also recorded a 43.6 gross average which was in the top 20 in the nation. He also blasted 20 of his 57 punts for 50 or more yards, while pinning opponents inside their own 20 on 13 occasions.

Tanner Hedstrom has two of the most important traits for a long snapper: confidence and a short memory. Hedstrom has the confidence that makes him one of the best long snappers in the country. Hedstrom, who learned from Scott Albritton, an NFL prospect, earned Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Week honors after the Utah State double-overtime victory. He recovered two muffed punts, which put the Rams in position for the game-tying score.

Momo Thomas, who returned 21 punts, averaged 10 yards a return, the third-best average in the Mountain West.

Lee Clubb finished the 2011 season ranked second in the conference averaging 26 yards per return. This also placed him in the top-25 nationally.

The Rams lost a kicker with big-game experience in Ben DeLine. Competition to replace DeLine will take place between sophomore Jared Roberts and true freshman Keenan Adams. Roberts was slotted as the No. 1 kicker during the spring game and connected on 41- and 45-yard field goals.

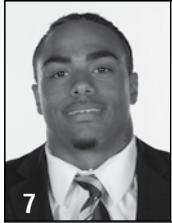

2011 (Sophomore): Immediately eligible because Nebraska-Omaha disbanded its football program, quickly adapted to the CSU defensive scheme and played in all 12 games with 11 starts...A first-year starter as a true sophomore, garnered second-team all-conference honors (Phil Steele), finishing

third in the conference with 8.2 tackles per game...Led the team with 99 tackles (45 solo), capitalizing on an opportunity when All-America candidate Mychal Sisson broke his ankle in Week 2; also recorded 4½ tackles for loss, 2½ sacks, three pass breakups, one forced fumble and an interception and fumble recovery, both of which he returned for touchdowns...Became the first CSU player to score twice on defense in a season since Luke Adkins, who returned two INTs for touchdowns, in 2004...Made his Division I debut in the opener at New Mexico (Sept. 3), entering late in the first quarter; with just over four minutes left in the game, and CSU protecting a 14-10 lead, combined with C.J. 2010 (Freshman): Just out of high school, earned a spot in the Rams' cornerback rotation out of fall camp and played in all 12 games, with nine starts (the season's final nine contests)...Posted 39 tackles (27 solo) and shared one stop for loss...One of seven true freshmen to play for CSU in the season-opener vs. Colorado (Sept. 4), picked up early experience in the secondary...Saw extensive playing time at cornerback at Nevada (Sept. 11), playing most of the game in place of Momo Thomas (shoulder); wound up leading the team with the first 10 tackles of his career...The performance earned him his first career start one week later, at Miami-Ohio (Sept. 18), in place of Thomas...In loss vs. No. 5 TCU (Oct. 2), again made the start, replacing an injured Thomas (shoulder surgery), and contributed to an impressive defensive effort...In 43-10 win vs. UNLV (Oct. 16), made a nice play to combine with Alex Williams after a first-quarter completion, throwing RB Tim Cornett for a 5-yard loss...On consecutive third-quarter plays in 38-14 win vs. New Mexico (Oct. 30), nearly intercepted a pass, then shot through a blocker on an option pitch to take out the legs of Kasey Carrier for no gain...Demonstrated strong run-support skills at SDSU (Nov. 6), dropping the MWC's leading rusher, Ronnie Hillman, for no gain in the first quarter; also helped limit the MWC's leading passer, Ryan Lindley, to a season-low 171 yards, as the Rams blanketed the league's leading two receivers, DeMarco Sampson and Vincent Brown, over the game's first two quarters...Missed practice time with a sprained ankle, but still started vs. BYU (Nov. 13)...At Wyoming (Nov. 20), combined with Mike Orakpo on a first-quarter completion to hold Alvester Alexander to no gain on fourth-and-1, giving the Rams possession at their own 34; later in the quarter, his blanket coverage in the end zone prevented an early TD pass.



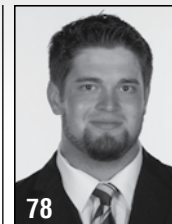

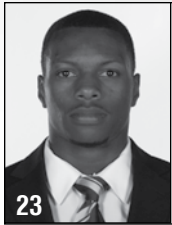

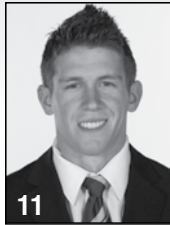

His sudden tragic death shocked the campus. Colorado A&M class president Roy Romer, who later served as governor of the state, collected money for an Eddie Hanna memorial scholarship that still is available today. Hanna came to Fort Collins after serving in World War II. A 5-foot-6, 165-pound athlete from Dodge City, Kan., Hanna also played basketball and ran track for the Aggies. He helped the school to its first bowl, the Raisin Bowl following the '48 season, and nearly won the game with touchdown runs of 71 and 79 yards.

2011 (Freshman): A grayshirt, enrolled in January 2011 and began practice with the Rams in the spring...Wound up playing in four games as a true freshman, with three starts - all over the final third of the season...Connected on 55.8 percent of his passes (43-for-77) with two touchdowns and six interceptions...Did his most damage on the ground, with 193 yards on 47 carries (4.1 avg.) and one TD...The No. 22-ranked all-purpose quarterback in the nation and No. 17 overall prospect from the state of Washington (Rivals.com), showed remarkable poise in making his college debut in windy, 18-15 loss vs. San Diego State (Nov. 12)...Replaced injured starter Pete Thomas (knee) to begin the second series of the second quarter, with the Rams trailing 15-7, and on his first snap, completed a 5-yard pass over the middle to T.J. NEAR-BOWL BERTHS

1950 Salad Bowl — After a 9-1 regular season in 1949 and second-place finish in the Skyline Conference, Colorado A&M received an invitation to the Jan. 1, 1950, Salad Bowl in Phoenix, Ariz. However, the players took a vote and decided not to attend their second bowl game in a row. Some of the players' reasons were that many of them were family men and did not want to spend another holiday season away from their wives and children. Another reason was that they had Arizona State, their opponents in the Salad Bowl, on their 1950 regular-season schedule and did not want to play them in games so close together. It is the only time in school history that the team was officially invited to a bowl game and turned it down.

1956 Sun Bowl — Although never officially invited to the Jan. 2, 1956, Sun Bowl, the 1955 Skyline Conference champion Colorado A&M football team received a verbal invitation to the contest in El Paso, Texas, to be played against Texas Tech. School officials refused to attend despite their championship, so an official invitation was never extended to the team and second-place Wyoming was instead allowed to receive the invitation.

2011 (Sophomore): Bounced back from a knee injury that truncated his true freshman season to earn a significant role in the CSU backfield; played in all 12 games, with seven starts...Caught nine passes for 110 yards (12.2 avg.), with one touchdown...In season-opening win at New Mexico (Sept. 3), made what coaches voted the special-teams play of the week, launching himself through a wedge during a fourth-quarter kickoff to drop returner Lamaar Thomas...In first quarter of home-opening win vs. Northern Colorado (Sept. 10), caught a play-action pass for his first career touchdown, giving CSU an early 14-0 lead; also made a kickout block on Chris Nwoke's second-quarter TD run, before leaving with a knee injury in the third quarter...Shrugged off the injury to play one week later in Denver loss vs. Colorado (Sept. 17)...In exhilarating, 35-34 win at Utah State (Sept. 24), made several important blocks as the Rams clawed back with touchdowns on their final three possessions, including two in overtime; supplied the lead block on both Chris Nwoke TDs, the game-tying run at the end of regulation and the game-winning points in the extra period...In loss vs. No. 5 Boise State (Oct. 15), made his first career start...In second quarter of loss at UTEP (Oct. 22), set up the Rams' first points by finding a hole in the belly of the Miners defense and taking a short pass for 32 yards...Nearly scored on a 12-yard catch at UNLV (Oct. 29), but stepped out of bounds on the third-quarter reception...In windy, 18-15 loss vs. San Diego State (Nov. 12), helped RB Chris Nwoke to 232 rushing yards, most by an FBS player in Week 11, and then the most by a CSU player ever at Hughes Stadium; the Rams averaged 7.83 yards per carry, sixth-best in program annals; also delivered a key block on Nwoke's 63-yard TD run in the first quarter...In loss vs. Air Force (Nov. 26), caught another 32-yard pass, to the AFA 4-yard line to set up a TD pass on the next play, giving CSU a 7-0 first-quarter lead...Also in Falcons contest, made a lead block to help spring Chris Nwoke on a 62-yard TD run in the third quarter, assisting the RB to a Hughes Stadium record 269 rushing yards, third most in CSU history and third most by an individual at the FBS level in 2011; helped Nwoke become first player in Rams history with multiple 200-yard rushing games in the same season...In season finale vs. Wyoming (Dec. 3), kept the Rams in the game during the fourth quarter by breaking up a would-be interception.

2010 (Freshman): Joined the Rams in fall drills and shared a spot in the two deep, behind Zac Pauga, at the end of camp; had played in six games until sustaining a season-ending knee injury in Week 8...Made his college debut, the eighth true freshman to see the field for CSU, at Miami-Ohio (Sept. 18); on his first play, CSU's first-quarter kickoff, made a special-teams tackle...Late in loss at

1966 Bluebonnet Bowl — With their best season in over a decade, the CSU football team was on pace to receive an invitation to the Dec. 17, 1966, Bluebonnet Bowl. Following their Nov. 12 win over West Texas State, along with the national attention of their triumph over No. 10 Wyoming, all the Rams needed to do was beat Wichita State and Iowa State and complete the season with an 8-2 record to receive an invitation to the Houston bowl game. But CSU's embarrassing loss to Wichita State, a 1-8 team, ended the Rams' chance for the bowl bid.

1977 Fiesta Bowl — With their greatest season since 1949, the Rams were in control of the WAC in 1977. Despite a loss to BYU, the CSU team remained in the top position for the Fiesta Bowl as the WAC representative, since BYU would not play on Christmas Day for religious reasons. But a loss to Wyoming made the difference, and although the Rams beat both Arizona and Arizona State in the regular season, CSU finished the year in third place and did not receive an invitation to the Fiesta Bowl; instead, ASU went to the bowl as the WAC representative. With only 13 bowl games in the 1977 season, CSU did not receive an invitation to another bowl game despite an impressive 9-2-1 record.

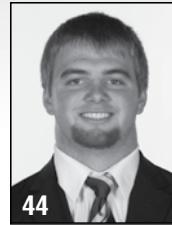

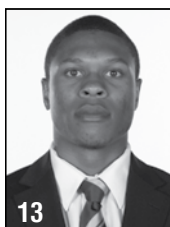

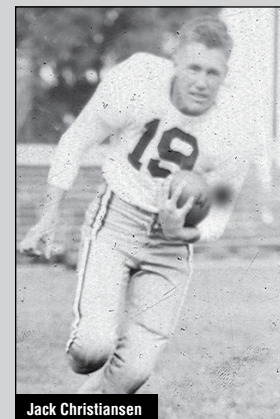

JACK CHRISTIANSEN

Jack Christiansen is the only former Colorado State player enshrined in the Professional Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, and he didn't even come to Fort Collins to play football.

Discouraged by his size, the Kansas native began college — CSU was then known as Colorado A&M — figuring he would concentrate on track alone. But coaxed out onto the gridiron as a sophomore, Christiansen wound up starring for the Aggies from 1949-50, helping the team to a 9-1 record in his first season. One of the finest athletes in university history, he also lettered in track. CSU's renovated varsity track and field facility — where Christiansen used to play football before Hughes Stadium was constructed — is named in his honor.

Selected by Detroit in the sixth round (69th overall) of the 1951 NFL Draft, Christiansen in one pivotal game as a rookie scored twice on punt returns to help defeat the Los Angeles Rams. A five-time Pro Bowler who appeared on six consecutive all-NFL teams (1952-57), Christiansen helped the Detroit Lions to three world championships. A feared return man and defensive back, he intercepted 46 passes and returned three for touchdowns. During his distinguished career, he also averaged 12.8 yards per punt return, with eight TDs.

He passed away in 1986.

2011 (Sophomore): A power back capable of leaping over defenders, played in all 12 games, with five starts, earning the Fum McGraw team MVP as a sophomore, and second-team all-conference honors (MW coaches/media, Phil Steele), in addition to academic all-conference recognition...Finished third in the Mountain West and 32nd in the nation with 94.2 rushing yards per game, including the league's top two single-game totals, 269 and 232 yards...Joined Oregon's LaMichael James as one of just two backs in the country with multiple rushing games of 232-or-more yards...Led the team with 1,130 rushing yards (No. 10 in Rams history) on 200 attempts, averaging 5.7 yards per carry, the highest figure by the Rams' leading rusher in 14 years, since Damon Washington (6.1) in 1997...Scored nine touchdowns, all on the ground, to lead the team in scoring (56 points)...Also caught 23 passes for 143 yards (6.2 avg.), and finished with the team's longest receptions streak, 13 games, a stretch that began with the 2010 season finale...From Oct. 22-Nov. 26, over a five-game stretch in the starting lineup, averaged 162.0 rushing yards per game, and 6.9 yards per carry (118 attempts, 810 yards, five touchdowns), the best five-game rushing stretch in the rich history of CSU football... In Denver loss vs. Colorado (Sept. 17), converted a third-and-1, setting up a fourth-quarter TD that cut the Buffs' lead to 21-14...Principal in exhilarating, 35-34 double-overtime win at Utah State (Sept. 24), picked up 47 hard-earned yards on 11 carries, including a career-best two touchdowns, on the Rams' final three possessions...With 42 seconds left in regulation, helped CSU erase a 21-13 deficit with a 1-yard score (just before Pete Thomas hit Crockett Gillmore for a game-tying two-point conversion to send the game to OT)...Then in the extra periods, ran seven times for 32 yards, setting up Gillmore's game-tying TD and scoring the eventual game-winning points with a 2-yard TD...Also converted a pair of third-and-1 attempts, one on an important second-quarter FG drive to put CSU on the board...For his efforts against Aggies, earned Mountain West Co-Offensive Player of the Week honors, the first award of his career, sharing the award with UNM's Deon Long...In 38-31 loss vs. San Jose State (Oct. 1), with four minutes remaining in the first quarter, left after taking a helmet on his leg, but returned to action in the second quarter; left with a leg cramp in the fourth quarter...In loss vs. No. 5 Boise State (Oct. 15), had 74 yards on 15 carries (4.9 avg.), including an impressive 29-yard rumble late in the game, a nice second-effort to convert a fourth-and-short; also finished as CSU's leading receiver, with four catches...In loss at UTEP (Oct. 22), made his first 2011 start and finished just 7 yards shy of his first 100-yard game; converted a pair of third-and-short carries in the first half, the latter on a field-goal drive...Then, in fourth quarter of Miners contest, scored an important touchdown, weaving through defenders and following blocks on a 24-yard run...Got 14 yards on his first carry in loss at UNLV (Oct. 29), en route to a career-best 156 on the ground, his first 100-yard rushing effort; set up a go-ahead field goal late in the first half with a career-long 38-yard gallop...In second half of Rebels contest, picked up 17 yards on one carry, then converted a third-down with a 14-yard reception; later in game, brought the Rams to within a FG with a run for a two-point conversion, then

punched in a go-ahead touchdown one play after Shaq Bell's blocked FG and Austin Gray's return... In 18-15 loss vs. San Diego State (Nov. 12), turned in the top individual rushing performance in all of major-college football during Week 11, a career-most 232 yards, the ninth-best total by an FBS player in 2011, and tops among Mountain West competitors; within those top nine rushing performances, only three averaged more per carry than Nwoke (10.55, 22-232): Missouri's Henry Josey (18.79, 14-263 vs. Western Illinois Sept. 17); Oregon's LaMichael James (12.52, 23-288 vs. Arizona Sept. 24); and UTEP's Joe Banyard (10.91, 22-240, vs. Houston Sept. 29)...Also registered then the highest total by a CSU player in 226 all-time games at Hughes Stadium (a mark he surpassed two weeks later), breaking Brian Copeland's standard, 228, vs. New Mexico, Nov. 16, 1991...His 232 yards ranked fifth all-time on CSU's single-game rushing chart, most by a Rams player since Gartrell Johnson's 285 in the New Mexico Bowl, Dec. 20, 2008, vs. Fresno State, and his 67-yard burst - on which he made a perfect cut and wound up breaking four tackles -- in the second quarter, and his 63-yard touchdown in the first, were the Rams' two longest plays from scrimmage at that point in the season...In loss at No. 19 TCU (Nov. 19), against the conference's No. 1 rushing defense, managed 60 yards on 21 carries, converting a pair of third downs, one on a first-quarter run, the other on a 14-yard reception in the third quarter... One week later in loss vs. Air Force (Nov. 26), had a Hughes Stadium-record 269 rushing yards, the third most in Rams history and third most by an FBS player in 2011, becoming CSU's first 1,000-yard rusher since MW rushing champion Johnson (1,476) in 2008, and 19th overall, eclipsing the landmark on his 62-yard TD run in the third quarter; also became just the seventh CSU player to break 1,000 as a sophomore or younger...Additionally against Falcons, became first player in CSU history with multiple 200-yard rushing efforts in the same season, joining a group of four CSU players with multiple 200-yard rushing games in a career: Kevin McDougal (1997 and '99), Lawrence McCutcheon (1969, '70) and Steve Bartalo (1983, '85)...His 269 yards were the most ever by any player in 227 all-time games at Hughes Stadium, which opened in 1968, breaking the 2007 record held by Air Force's Chad Hall, 256...Plus, with 810 rushing yards over a five-game stretch from Oct. 22-Nov. 26, broke the program record, held by Steve Bartalo over the last five games of his career in 1986, 759 yards...Slowed entering season finale, vs. Wyoming (Dec. 3), by hip and foot injuries, did not start; slightly aggravated the foot injury during the game and finished with limited carries.

2011 (Junior): Back in the lineup after the conference granted him a medical hardship waiver for 2010, played in 11 games, with 11 starts...A second-team all-conference punt returner (Phil Steele), finished third in the Mountain West with a 10.0-yard average on punt returns...Led the team with a 10.0-yard average on punt returns (21-210), joining Billy Gonzales (1989-91) and a pair of All-Americans, Greg Myers (1992-95) and Dexter Wynn (2001-03), as one of four CSU players to lead the team in three straight years...Also paced the team with two interceptions (tied for sixth in the league with 0.18 per game), one of which he returned for a TD...Returned one kickoff for 21 yards... In addition to the two picks, registered 31 tackles (15 solo), one for loss, seven pass breakups (sixth in the conference), one fumble recovery and a forced fumble...Enters Week 14 ranked second in the MW and 24th in the nation with 10.0 yards per punt return; also tied for fourth in the MW with two interceptions... Selected first-team midseason all-conference at punt returner by CollegeFootballNews.com on Oct. 21...In home-opening win over Northern Colorado (Sept. 10), ripped off a career-long 26-yard punt return...In Denver loss vs. Colorado (Sept. 17), prevented a completion intended for the nation's leader in receiving yards entering the game, Paul Richardson; also had five punt returns for 62 yards (12.4 avg.)...Critical in exhilarating win at Utah State (Sept. 24), made the game-winning tackle on a two-point conversion, driving RB Robert Turbin out of bounds to preserve a 35-34 triumph in double overtime...In third quarter of Aggies contest, nearly intercepted Chuckie Keeton, but the intended receiver batted the pass in the air; then in the fourth quarter, with USU up 14-13, broke up a third-down pass to force a key punt...Garnered both defensive and special-teams player of the week honors from CSU coaches in 38-31 loss vs. San Jose State (Oct. 1), breaking up two passes and becoming the first CSU player with interceptions in four straight seasons since Erik Olson (1996-99)...As a cornerback against Spartans, made a pair of significant plays on consecutive drives late in the third quarter of a 31-17 game, first picking off Matt Faulkner to set up a CSU TD, then delivering a crushing blow to big TE Ryan Otten in the final minute of the third quarter, forcing an incompletion and punt; also barely dropped a first-quarter pass with a clear lane to the end zone late in the first half of a 24-14 contest, ...As a punt-returner against SJSU, picked up 22 yards on a fourth-quarter runback with the score tied 31-31, setting up the Rams at the SJSU 34...In second quarter of loss vs. No. 5 Boise State (Oct. 15), personally halted an eight-play drive by forcing and recovering a Mitch Burroughs fumble at the Rams' 13-yard line; CSU cashed in the turnover by driving for a TD...Gave Rams life in tough loss at UTEP (Oct. 22), reading a second-quarter screen pass and returning an interception 45 yards for his first career touchdown, cutting the Miners' lead to 14-10, then returned fourth-quarter punts for 22 and 17 yards to give CSU solid field position...In second quarter of loss at UNLV (Oct. 29), blew up a screen to register a tackle for loss on third down and force a punt in a tie game...In loss at No. 19 TCU (Nov. 19), had a second-half punt return wiped out by a block-in-the-back penalty; the return would've gone for 25 yards...One week later, vs. AFA (Nov. 26), made an athletic play to break up a second-quarter pass.

2010 (Junior): A savvy, third-year starter, underwent right shoulder surgery Sept. 29 missed the balance of the season, after playing in four games (three starts)...Granted a medical hardship waiver by the Mountain West on Feb. 17, 2011...Injury truncated a promising season, as he had seven PR for 80 yards (11.4 avg.)...Also had 13 tackles (eight solo) and one INT...In season-opener vs. Colorado (Sept. 4) at Invesco Field, had 58 return yards, 38 on punt returns and 20 on his third career interception...Gave the Rams an early spark in Buffs contest with a career-long 24-yard punt return, then picked off Tyler Hansen late in the first half to set up a FG attempt...At Nevada (Sept. 11), aggravated a shoulder injury from the previous week and missed the second half...Did not start following week

at Miami-Ohio (Sept. 18), but played most of the game; early in the fourth quarter, broke three tackles on a punt return that surpassed 40 yards, but a CSU penalty reduced it to only 22...In 2011, bids to become the first CSU player since Erik Olson (1996-99) with an interception in four consecutive seasons (Thomas has one in each of his first three campaigns, 2008-10).

2009 (Sophomore): Played in 11 games, with eight starts at CB...Had 43 tackles (31 solo), one for loss, one INT and four PBU...Also returned seven punts for 46 yards (6.6 avg.)...In resounding 23-17 win at Colorado (Sept. 6), helped to snuff out the Buffs' first drive, defending on an incomplete pass that forced a punt; also in CU contest, dropped back to return kickoffs for the first time as a college player...In 24-23 win vs. Weber State, broke up a first-quarter pass that led to a missed FG; injured, left the game late in the contest, but after receiving treatment on the sideline, walked to the locker room on his own power...MRI revealed no significant damage; dressed but did not play following week in win vs. Nevada (Sept. 19)...Returned to action in conference-opening loss at No. 19 BYU (Sept. 26); didn't start, but played most of game, and returned punts...Back in starting lineup for bitter 31-29 loss at Idaho (Oct. 3), made an athletic play to break up a second-quarter pass intended for 6-foot-6 Eric Greenwood, forcing a 47-yard FG attempt...In first quarter of loss at No. 8 TCU (Oct. 17), broke up a third-down Andy Dalton pass to force a punt...Filled the role of nickel back in place of primary NB DeAngelo Wilkinson over the last quarter of the year...In last-second loss at New Mexico (Nov. 21), utilized good closing speed to register his second career INT...In 17-16 loss vs. Wyoming (Nov. 27), diagnosed a hook-and-ladder play to throw the Cowboys for a 1-yard loss on the game's final drive.

2008 (Freshman): Saw defensive action in each of the Rams' 13 games, with 10 starts, including the New Mexico Bowl (Dec. 20)...Posted 54 tackles (38 solo), three stops for loss, three passes broken up and one INT, in which he returned for a TD before a penalty nullified the score...Also returned five punts for 16 yards (3.2 avg.)...One of five true freshmen to play for CSU, and one of two to start (including Michael Kawulok), made his collegiate debut in season opener vs. Colorado (Aug. 31), entering as a DB late in the third quarter...Saw extensive action in win vs. Houston (Sept. 20) and the nation's No. 2 passing offense, replacing an injured Brandon Owens (ankle) in the first quarter and playing the balance of the game at cornerback; broke up a pass in the end zone late in the first half, forcing a FG attempt...Made his first career start the following week, at Cal (Sept. 27); separated the Bears' Sean Young from what would've been a 43-yard TD late in the first half, helping to hold Cal to just 159 net passing yards on the day...Started again in conference-opening win vs. UNLV (Oct. 4), breaking up a screen...Posted nine stops vs. TCU (Oct. 11), including a pair of tackles for loss -- both on third downs in the fourth quarter; also, on a TCU punt late in the first half, alertly pounced on a live ball at the Rams' 10-yard line...At No. 14 Utah (Oct. 18), with CSU trailing just 14-7 in the second quarter, halted Darrell Mack for no gain on third-and-7, forcing a punt...In victory at SDSU (Oct. 25), broke up a third-down pass to end the Aztecs' game-opening drive, then after each team answered the other TD for TD, ended the pattern by breaking up a third-down pass early in the fourth quarter, forcing a punt and preserving CSU's 38-31 lead...In tough, 45-42 loss vs. No. 17 BYU (Nov. 1), picked off Max Hall's fourth-quarter pass with CSU trailing 38-35 late in the fourth quarter; actually returned the INT, the first of his career, 44 yards for a go-ahead TD with less than 2 minutes left, but a personal foul after the INT nullified the score...Earlier in fourth quarter of Cougars contest, drilled Dennis Pitta, knocking his helmet off, but the TE somehow maintained possession for a TD.

High School: A South Florida Sun-Sentinel and Orlando Sentinel all-state selection as a do-everything utility athlete, enjoyed a memorable career at Osceola High School in Kissimmee, Fla. ...A first-team all-conference selection, lined up as a RB and WR, while also returning kickoffs and punts...In 2007, helped his team to a 14-1 senior season, a District 8 league title and a trip to the Florida Class 5A state championship, where OHS lost to powerhouse St. Thomas Aquinas; electrified the Citrus Bowl late in the first half of the title game, returning a punt 85 yards for a TD to chop his team's deficit in half...Averaged 10.8 yards per carry in 2007, with 915 yards on 85 attempts and nine TDs, including an 80-yard gallop...The Kowboys' leading receiver, also caught 15 passes for 495 yards (33.0 avg.) with five scores...As a senior in an emotional, 34-31 win over Lake Gibson,

2011 (Junior): A playmaking and versatile athlete, played in nine games...Had 16 tackles (nine solo), one stop for loss, one sack, one interception...Having rebounded from a shoulder injury that cut short his 2011 spring, spent much of fall camp as a wide receiver, but returned to the defensive side of the ball just before the season opener at New Mexico (Sept. 3)...Inserted during the first series of Lobos contest, played most of the game, including his first career sack, dropping Tarean Austin for a 5-yard loss deep in UNM territory, forcing a third-quarter punt...In fourth quarter of home-opening win over Northern Colorado, posted his second Division I interception, picking off Matt Baca...Did not play in the final three games of the year.

WORLD WAR II HERO DUDE DENT

Lewis "Dude" Dent may be remembered for his success on the gridiron, as a legendary performer at Colorado A&M, but he was much more than just a football star. He was a heroic soldier.

That part of his story is much more important, and in May 2009, an episode of the History Channel series *Patton 360* profiled Lt. Dent and his tragic death at Troyes, France, on Aug. 25, 1944, as the American Army approached Paris to liberate it from the Nazi Army. Dent was one of the men that served with the famous general, George Patton, in combat.

A native of Craig, Colo., Dent arrived on the Colorado State campus in the fall of 1939 and became an all-conference running back for coaches Harry Hughes and Julius "Hans" Wagner from 1940-42.

Besides his role as fullback, Dent was named team captain in 1942 and also kicked and punted for the Aggies.

Following his career at CSU, Dent was drafted by the Brooklyn Dodgers (of the NFL) to play in 1943, but instead he entered into the military shortly before graduation, just a few credits away from a degree in mechanical engineering.



THE KELI S. MCGREGOR SCHOLARSHIP

Keli McGregor first became an All-American at Colorado State, then became an All-American at life.

Long before he unexpectedly passed away April 20, 2010, McGregor had left a living legacy with everyone who knew him, from his playing days with the Rams to his time as President of the Colorado Rockies. Above reproach and a champion of genuine leadership, he exuded legacy in a unique way. That's why the CSU athletic department wants to preserve his memory in unique fashion.

Beginning in 2010, Head Coach Steve Fairchild awarded the Keli S. McGregor Memorial Football Scholarship to a walk-on player. McGregor first joined the CSU program during his second year on campus, as a walk-on in 1981, then earned a scholarship in 1982 and garnered All-America honors as a senior in 1984. Selected in the fourth round of the 1985 draft by the Denver Broncos, he entered administration following his NFL career.

An endowment, this scholarship fund perennially will inspire CSU football players to follow his example, work ethic, dedication and diligence, both on the gridiron and in the classroom.

"Lori, the kids, and the rest of Keli's family continue to be close to our hearts and never far from our minds," then-Director of Athletics Paul Kowalczyk said. "We want to create a meaningful, immediate and long-lasting connection between Keli McGregor, Ram Athletics and our student-athletes, campus community, alumni and fans. We believe our program shares Keli's core values and, after consulting with his family and the Rockies organization, cannot think of a more heartfelt gesture than to honor him in perpetuity this way."

The recipient of the first McGregor scholarship, Broderick Sargent, was announced at the Green & Gold Gala, in Denver on May 22, 2010. One player will always have the scholarship until he graduates; it will not be awarded annually, similar to CSU's legacy scholarship. It is the expectation of the athletic department that the player will realize the tremendous honor he has received, and demonstrate McGregor-like attributes as a leader, a selfless teammate and a man of authentic character and integrity.

In response to the numerous requests from teammates and friends inquiring about how they can contribute, the university has established a Web site to make gifts to the Keli S. McGregor Memorial Scholarship Endowment: <https://advancing.colostate.edu/MCGREGOR>

In addition, Colorado State in 2010:

- Created the Keli McGregor Award, given annually beginning in Fall 2010 to a student-athlete in one of CSU's 16 varsity sports that best exemplifies traits demonstrated by the honor's namesake, including integrity, honesty, leadership, class and competing the right way. Presented during CSU's Scholar-Athlete Awards Brunch, during Homecoming/Family Weekend, the award recognizes the characteristics that best defined McGregor's legacy as an All-America tight end and honors student at CSU, an NFL player, and later President of the Rockies. The new award is among the most prestigious honors given by CSU, on par with the award named after Fum McGraw, the athletic director whom McGregor credited with guaranteeing his scholarship on the heels of a 1982 coaching change.
- Honored him by affixing to every football helmet in 2010 a decal with his CSU uniform number, 88.
- Held Keli McGregor Day at CSU's Sept. 25, 2010, home football game against Idaho, at Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium. Colorado State's President, Dr. Tony Frank, and Kowalczyk invited McGregor's wife, Lori, and the couple's four children, as well as McGregor's parents and Rockies staff, to join them in the home athletic director's suite. The family served as honorary game captains during the coin toss, and took part in a brief pregame ceremony honoring McGregor and his family.

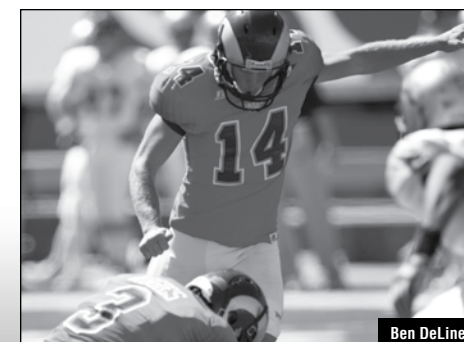

Capi's NCAA record leads CSU past New Mexico

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - Defensive lineman Nordly Capi forced and recovered a fumble, his NCAA single-game record fourth forced fumble, in the closing seconds Saturday to preserve Colorado State's 14-10 victory over New Mexico.

With New Mexico at the Rams' 15-yard line with 23 seconds left, Capi stripped quarterback Tarean Austin, then fell on the ball to thwart the Lobos' last chance.

Capi established the NCAA mark of three, shared by nine players, most recently Armond State of Central Michigan, vs. Western Michigan, Nov. 5, 2010. Capi, who rebounded after a critical unnecessary roughness penalty put new life into New Mexico early on, also registered 3 and-a-half sacks, leading the team to a CSU single-game record 10 sacks.

Chris Nwoke's 2-yard touchdown run with 7:17 remaining in the fourth quarter put the Rams up in the season and Mountain West opener for both teams.

After a scoreless first quarter that featured a missed field goal by each team, both squads found the end zone in the second quarter.

With 2:37 left in the half, Colorado State receiver Crockett Gillmore out-jumped defensive back A.J. Butler in the end zone for a 33-yard score.

The Lobos moved right back down the field in five plays, capping the drive with a 27-yard pass from Austin to Lazaar Thomas.

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) - Raymond Carter ran for 100 yards and two touchdowns leading Colorado State to a 33-14 victory over Northern Colorado on Saturday.

Rams fall to rival Buffaloes, 28-14

DENVER, Colo. (AP) - Tyler Hansen led Colorado to four touchdown drives and the Buffaloes handed coach Jon Embree his first victory Saturday, 28-14 over rival Colorado State.

The Buffaloes (1-2) overcame a slow start and a rash of penalties to beat the Rams (2-1) for the fourth straight time in Denver.

The Rams were playing without two of their top defenders. Standout senior linebacker Mychal Sisson broke his right ankle last week and watched on crutches from the sideline with pass-rusher Broderick Sargent, who tore an ACL in CSU's opener.

The bevy of backups helped stifle the Buffs until they got their ground game going behind Rodney Stewart, who rushed 19 times for 98 yards to go with seven catches for 93 yards and two punt returns for 9 more.

Colorado receiver Paul Richardson had four catches for 27 yards and three big drops one week after setting a school record with 284 yards on 11 receptions in an overtime loss to Cal.

Hansen also threw for a school-record 474 yards in that game. This time, he was held to 215 yards passing but scored twice on keepers and threw two touchdown passes.

His second touchdown run, from 2 yards out, capped a 16-play, 85-yard drive that ate up more than 10 minutes after the Rams had pulled within 21-14 with some trickery.

Rams wide receiver Charles Lovett took a quick pass from quarterback Pete Thomas in the left flat and threw a perfect 23-yard touchdown pass to tight end Crockett Gillmore early in the fourth quarter.

The Buffs managed just 10 yards of offense in the first quarter, when they were whistled for 40 yards in penalties, but they bounced back.

Gillmore hauled in five passes for 84 yards for Colorado State.

Rams land thrilling double-overtime victory over Aggies, 35-34

LOGAN, Utah (AP) - Chris Nwoke scored a touchdown in overtime and ran for another with less than a minute in regulation to push Colorado State past Utah State 35-34 on Saturday night.

Utah State (1-2), which nearly beat defending national champion Auburn Sept. 3, went for a two-point conversion after its second touchdown in overtime, but Robert Turbin was stopped by Momo Thomas and the Rams (3-1) on his running attempt. That came one play after officials called a pass-interference penalty on CSU, inching the ball closer for a second USU attempt at winning the game.

Turbin had scored both of USU's overtime TDs, including a 25-yard run. The Rams' Crockett Gillmore caught a 7-yard pass from Pete Thomas for CSU's second overtime touchdown.

After losing yardage on a sack and a personal-foul penalty, CSU punted with 2:17 to play. USU's Eric Moats dropped the punt, his second fumble of a punt in the game, and Tanner Hedstrom recovered both, including the critical fourth-quarter takeaway that gave the Rams the ball on the 15-yard line. Nwoke then made a 7-yard run, followed by a 1-yard plunge to bring the score to 21-19.

Battling adversity all night, the Rams overcame it again after that touchdown. Looking to tie the game with a two-point conversion, CSU committed a false-start penalty, pushing the Rams back 5 yards. But Thomas connected again with Gillmore to send the game into overtime.

The Rams recovered four fumbles for the first time since a 1997 win over Tulsa. They also won their initial two road games for the first time since 2003.

Rams fall short of Rebels in thriller, 38-35

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) - Quarterback Caleb Herring had a 5-yard touchdown run with 1:20 remaining to lift UNLV to a 38-35 victory over Colorado State on Saturday.

In a game with eight lead changes, Phillip Payne had two TD catches for the Rebels (2-5, 1-1 Mountain West) to break the school's career record. The senior has 25 scoring receptions.

Pete Thomas was 17 of 30 for 230 yards and a touchdown for the Rams (3-5, 1-2), but a late scoring chance was denied when his deflected pass was intercepted by Tani Maka at the UNLV 28-yard line with 35 seconds remaining.

Chris Nwoke led Colorado State with 156 yards rushing on 23 carries. His touchdown from 4 yards out, set up by a long return of a blocked field goal, gave the Rams a 35-31 lead with 4:13 remaining.

Dionza Bradford had 122 yards and a touchdown on 21 carries for UNLV.

Payne's second TD and Bradford's 1-yard scoring run gave the Rebels a 31-20 lead.

Colorado State cut it 31-28 with Thomas' 12-yard touchdown run and a two-point conversion run by Nwoke.

UNLV's next drive ended when Shaq Bell blocked Nolan Kohorst's 34-yard field-goal attempt, and Austin Gray ran it back 61 yards to set up Nwoke's scoring run.

Playing their first afternoon home game in five years, the Rebels led 17-13 at halftime. Herring hit Payne in the end zone with 14 seconds left in the first half, a score set up by a fumble recovery on a punt at the Rams' 11-yard line.

Payne's second score broke the school record held by Henry Bailey (1990-94).

Colorado State took a 7-3 on Shaqui Barrett's 52-yard interception return of a Sean Reilly pass for a touchdown with 5:14 left in the quarter.

On the ensuing kickoff, Deante' Purvis ran it back 98 yards for a TD.

Reilly, who was 2 of 3 for 27 yards, was relieved by Herring with 2:55 remaining in the first quarter. Herring finished 9 of 13 for 90 yards.

Nwoke's big day spoiled as Rams fall to Aztecs 18-15

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) - Abelardo Perez kicked a 37-yard field goal with 5:49 left and Ryan Lindley threw for 154 yards and a touchdown on a record-setting night as San Diego State defeated Colorado State 18-15 Saturday night.

Lindley improved to 11,494 career passing yards to pass former BYU quarterback Max Hall's 11,365 for the Mountain West Conference record and Todd Santos' 11,425 for the San Diego State mark.

Ronnie Hillman, the nation's second-leading rusher, ran for 80 yards on 24 carries for San Diego State (6-3, 3-2 Mountain West). But Colorado State's Chris Nwoke had better numbers, rushing 22 times for 232 yards and a touchdown.

Nwoke got Colorado State (3-6, 1-3) on the board first with a 63-yard touchdown run midway through the first quarter. The 63-yard scamper wasn't even Nwoke's longest run of the day, he later added a 67-yard run but was unable to finish in the end zone.

The Rams lost quarterback Pete Thomas to a strained left knee early in the second quarter. The Rams have lost five straight.

A 1-yard score by Colorado State's Garret Grayson early in the fourth quarter tied the game at 15-15 before Perez, who had missed from 22 and 44 yards earlier, was right down the middle.

Colorado State loses to rival Air Force, 45-21

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) - The Rams (3-8, 1-5) lost their seventh straight game 45-21 Saturday night overall and their sixth straight to the Falcons despite sophomore Chris Nwoke's career-best 269-yard rushing performance that included TD runs of 62 and 2 yards.

Tim Jefferson threw three touchdown passes to Zack Kauth in the second quarter and Air Force routed rival Colorado State to reach bowl eligibility for the fifth straight season.

Ambassadors of the Rams' Legacy



Sonny Lubick

- >> Head Coach, 1993-2007

Colorado State's football program attained previously unknown heights during head coach Sonny Lubick's 15 seasons. During that time, Lubick created a standard for excellence never before evident during the 115-year history of the football program.

Since taking over a program that had won just 47 games in 11 seasons with just two bowl appearances prior to his arrival in 1993, Lubick guided the Rams' program to elite status nationally. For example:

- Colorado State won or shared six conference titles from 1994-2007, more than any other Mountain West Conference member over that period;
- CSU played in nine bowl games, more than any other league institution from 1994-2007;
- The Rams ranked among the Top 20 teams in the nation in total victories since 1997;
- Lubick ranked among the Top 20 NCAA Division I FBS active coaches in career wins at the end of 2007;
- Colorado State placed among the leaders in MWC victories since the conference came into being in 1999;
- The Rams seven times during Lubick's tenure won eight or more games in a season. Four times – the only four times in school history – CSU won 10 or more games under Lubick.

Lubick ushered in by far the most successful era in the history of CSU football. His fingerprint can be seen on the results on the field as well as at the turnstiles.

Not only have the Rams been perennial postseason competitors, but nine of the top 10 seasons in total attendance in school history came during his reign. Additionally, eight of the 10 largest single-game crowds in CSU history came during his time at the helm.

Lubick also joined another elite list of coaches including Joe Paterno, Bobby Bowden, and Frank Beamer, in 2005 as active Division I-A coaches with 100 or more career wins at their current institutions. The group includes only nine members.

Interest and support of CSU's program had never been greater. The 2006 season marked the completion of an 18-month project to renovate and expand Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium. The project was made possible through a \$15.2 million gift by the Bohemian Foundation, with a caveat the stadium's playing surface be named in Lubick's honor.

The project included the installation of 4,400 new seats, the renovation of the press box and club seating area, and the addition of 12 luxury suites – each of which were sold prior to the beginning of the 2005 season.

Prior to the 2006 season, a new artificial playing surface was installed to complete the renovation.

The success enjoyed by the Rams' program under Lubick's watch touched the entire athletic department. For instance, during his tenure, CSU was able to:

- Renovate and expand the stadium (\$15.2 million).
- Acquire a \$200,000 gift from former CSU all-star and current NFL All-Pro linebacker Joey Porter, who played for Lubick in the 1990s and a gift of \$75,000 from former defensive end and 10-year NFL veteran Brady Smith for program enhancements.
- Secure funding and build the McGraw Athletic Center (\$5.5 million), completed in 1999, which houses offices for every athletic department staff member, includes an academic support center, athletic marketing, promotions, and ticket offices, and breakout rooms for football position meetings, as well as a 125-seat auditorium for team meetings and special functions.
- Renovate Moby Arena (\$4.5 million) in 1998 as part of the McGraw Center project.

Those projects alone total more than \$25 million, made possible in large part by the success that CSU's football program enjoyed since Lubick's arrival.

Lubick cared deeply about the people around him, particularly the program's student-athletes and his staff members. He carefully built CSU's programs into one of the nation's best using a time-tested philosophy:

- **Responsibility:** Each member of the Rams' program was responsible for his actions and the impact on the success of the team.
- **Character:** Lubick placed a premium on student-athletes who display integrity and honesty.
- **Respect:** Earning respect among peers, fans, and colleagues remained more important to the veteran coach than gaining popularity from those groups.
- **Perspective:** Remaining on an even keel, win or lose. Lubick had those in the program focused on the goal ahead.

Lubick's impact was felt not only in the football program or athletics department, but across the university and throughout the community:

- He was named the Sports Illustrated Coach of the Year in 1994 after leading CSU to a 10-2 record.
- In 2003, Lubick was named one of four national finalists for the Eddie Robinson Coach of Distinction Award for his community service work.
- Also in 2003, the Rams' coach was recognized by the American Diabetes Association-COLORADO Chapter as "Father of the Year."
- He was an annual contributor and participant in several local and national charities including St. Jude's Children's Hospital.
- In May of 2005, he was named Citizen of the Year by the Fort Collins Board of Realtors;
- Lubick and his family were honored by a local charitable organization in the winter of 2006 for their commitment and dedication to the northern Colorado community.
- In January of 2007, Lubick was named the Collins Award winner, given annually to a local figure that exemplifies leadership and service to the Fort Collins Community by the local chamber of commerce.

Lubick remained staunch in his belief a family approach was one of the reasons for Colorado State's success during his tenure.

Four of his 2007 coaching staff members – Tom Ehlers, Darrell Funk, Dan Hammerschmidt, and his son Marc – either played or coached under Lubick during his first stint in Fort Collins or his return beginning in 1993.

Marc joined the staff in 2005 after time with the St. Louis Rams. He replaced his older brother, Matt, who departed for a position at the University of Mississippi.

Assistants Mick Delaney and Dave Arnold both coached alongside Lubick at Montana State. Steve Stanard and James Ward had previous ties to long-time Lubick colleagues, while Jessie Williams was on the same coaching staff as Matt Lubick.

Further testament to his belief in a family atmosphere took place after every home game. After conducting his postgame news conference and greeting wife Carol Jo, Lubick always was embraced by his three young grandchildren – Matthew, William and Emma – children of his daughter, Michelle, and son-in-law Gerard Boyle.

Lubick's smile while embracing his three youngest Rams fans reflected the same happiness CSU supporters had come to appreciate during the most successful era in school history.

Never is a long time. Unless you are talking about former runningback Steve Bartalo.

Told by nearly every college recruiter he would never play NCAA Bowl Subdivision football, Bartalo proved every critic wrong in record-setting fashion.

A former Wishbone offense quarterback at Doherty High School in Colorado Springs, Colo., Bartalo walked on to the CSU squad in the fall of 1982, redshirting his first season but making his presence felt nonetheless.

Bartalo earned the attention of his coaches and the ire of defenders with his competitive attitude as the "scout team" quarterback. Bartalo made it apparent to every teammate and coach that he would be a key contributor to CSU's program.

A season later, Bartalo was buried on the team's offensive depth chart, so far down he didn't see action in the first two games of the season, both losses. In fact, he was scheduled to play on special teams the second game of the year, a conference date in Hawaii. A day prior to the team's departure, Bartalo was replaced on the travel squad. While disappointed in the decision, it only further reinforced his will to succeed at CSU.

A week later, the Rams trailed Colorado at halftime. CSU's rushing game had been negligible at best, and Leon Fuller and his staff desperately looked for answers. They found one in Bartalo, who gained 61 yards in the second half and became a fixture in CSU's backfield the rest of his illustrious career.

Following his impressive debut in Boulder, Bartalo surpassed the 100-yard mark for the first of 28 times in his career while making his initial starting appearance in the backfield.

Bartalo was listed at five feet, nine inches tall and weighed about 200 pounds. But those tangible measurements failed to gauge his heart, determinate and competitive drive.

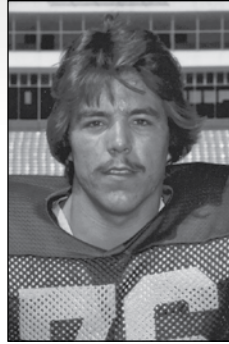
By the time he concluded his four-year career, he became the first and only player in school history to lead the team in rushing four consecutive seasons. Bartalo was a three-time all-conference selection. Following his freshman season, despite playing in just eight of the team's 11 games, he was named the conference newcomer of the year. Following his senior season in 1986, Bartalo was voted the league's offensive player of the year.

He concluded an illustrious career with 4,813 yards, still a record and set an NCAA mark with 1,210 career rushing attempts. In his career he gained more than 100 yards in a game 28 times, another school record.

Bartalo later played in the Japan Bowl, and was drafted in the sixth round of the NFL selection process by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. After one season, 1987, with the Bucs, he played one season, 1988, with the San Francisco 49ers. He concluded his professional career by playing for the Frankfurt Galaxy in 1989 and '90.

Bartalo's prominence was not limited to the football field. In 1986, he was named an NCAA Academic All-American, and was also the winner of an NCAA post-graduate scholarship award.

In 1995, Bartalo was inducted into the CSU Sports Hall of Fame.



Mike Bell

- >> Defensive Tackle
- >> 1977-78 All-American

"Football is my life; it's everything to me and I won't have it any other way."

Football was life for the 6-foot-5, 265-pound defensive tackle from Wichita, Kan. After an all-state career at Archbishop Carroll High School, Bell and his identical twin brother, Mark E., came to Colorado State to continue their playing careers.

In fact, at the time, Colorado State's football roster boasted three Bells, including the twin brothers, nicknamed Ding (Mike), Dong (Mark E.), and Tinker (Mark R. Bell, a talented wide receiver of no relation).

Following his Colorado State career, Bell became the second overall selection in the NFL Draft and played for more than a decade with the Kansas City Chiefs, his boyhood dream team.

Bell, who starred at defensive tackle for the Colorado State Rams from 1976-78, is one of the most honored football players in Rams history.

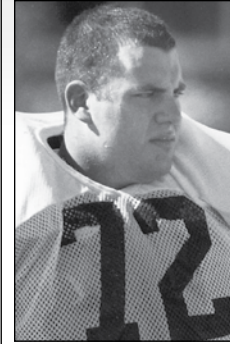
He was a three-year starter and letterwinner. As a sophomore, Bell made his presence felt nationally, earning a spot on the Football News Sophomore All-America team in 1976, when he recorded 86 tackles and 10 quarterback sacks, helping the Rams to a 6-5 overall record.

Perhaps Bell's greatest season at Colorado State was his junior year (1977), when he compiled numerous awards and achievements. He was named twice the Western Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Week, while on his way to the Lineman of the Year award and a first-team all-WAC selection. Sports Illustrated and the Associated Press also honored Bell as National Lineman of the Week, for his outstanding play against Arizona State on November 19.

In 1977, Bell compiled 103 tackles, 15 quarterback sacks, four forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries in leading his team to a 9-2-1 record. These amazing stats landed him Associated Press second-team All-America recognition. Bell's award list didn't stop there; he was named Colorado State University's Most Valuable Player for his outstanding play, competitive spirit, and team leadership. He was also selected as the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame's Collegiate Athlete of the Year, in 1977.

Coming into his senior season Bell was a confident young football player who had fire in his eyes. But Bell's senior year was cut short by a knee injury. Despite his shortened season, Bell was selected to several post-season teams, including the coaches' All-America team, the Kodak All-America team, and the Sporting News' All-America team. Even before the season began, Bell was named as a Playboy Preseason All-America pick.

Following his senior season, the hype about Bell being selected in the NFL Draft continued to grow. Rumors were flying that he would be a top draft pick in the first round. The Kansas City Chiefs made Bell the second selection in that draft, and he was the top player in the group to sign when No. 1 pick Tom Cousineau opted to instead play in the Canadian Football League.



Anthony Cesario

With a powerful pancake block and a 6-foot-6, 310-pound frame, opposing defensive linemen knew that they were in for a war when offensive guard Anthony Cesario took his three-point stance from across the line.

The offensive lineman from Pueblo, Colo., was destined for stardom even before he stepped on the

field as a Colorado State Ram. He was named first-team all-conference as a senior at Pueblo South High School, earned two varsity letters in football and three in track.

In his first two years as a Ram, Cesario first redshirted then played sparingly on the offensive line and special teams. As a sophomore in 1996, he started to blossom into one of the best offensive linemen in school history.

In his first year as a starter, he played in all 12 games and was named second-team all-Western Athletic Conference.

As the 1997 season approached, expectations were high for Cesario; not only from his teammates and coaches, but from the fans as well.

He didn't disappoint. Cesario was named the top offensive guard in the nation by The Sporting News as he led his team to an 11-2 record and a Holiday Bowl appearance, where he helped defeat the Missouri Tigers 35-24. As a starter in all 12 regular-season games, Cesario had a team-best 64 pancake blocks and graded out at 91.3 percent. In that same year he did not allow a single quarterback sack. Cesario was also named first-team all-conference and second-team All-America, and was a nominee for the Outland Trophy, which recognizes the best offensive lineman in the nation.

After such an amazing junior year, Cesario was named as a 1998 preseason nominee for the Lombardi Award, presented to the most outstanding offensive or defensive lineman in the country, and would later that year become one of 12 finalists for the award. In his final season as a Ram, Cesario once again started in all 12 games, bringing his total to 37 consecutive games as a starter. To opposing defenses, he was a brick wall that no one could seem to forge around for two straight years, as he allowed no quarterback sacks. Cesario was named first-team all-WAC for the second year in a row and was named first-team All-America for his position at offensive guard. He helped his team to an 8-5 record and recorded more than 70 "big blocks," breaking his own single-season record.

With three solid seasons at CSU, Cesario entered the 1998 NFL Draft with high expectations. He was selected in the third round by the Jacksonville Jaguars as the 88th pick overall.

Cesario was a member of the Jaguars team that advanced to the AFC title game in 1999.

Tragically, he passed away at age 34 on Sept. 25, 2010.

Rick Crowell

- >> Linebacker

Imagine, Rams head coach Sonny Lubick said before the 2000 season, how well Colorado State's defense could be with the return of star linebacker Rick Crowell.

Crowell, from Chula Vista, Calif., made dreams a reality in 2000 as a senior. He carried away from his last game as a Ram an armful of awards and honors.

Crowell was named Colorado State's defensive MVP in leading the Rams to a 22-17 win over Louisville in the AXA Liberty Bowl. He was credited with seven tackles in the game, including six unassisted, and helped force three turnovers in leading the Rams to a win over the Conference USA champions.

Crowell entered the bowl game having already been named the MWC Defensive Player of the Year after leading the league in total tackles with 125, 12.5 per contest, over the 10 games in which he played. He was a consensus all-conference selection as chosen by the conference's head coaches and media members who regularly follow the teams. Crowell was named to the all-league squad three times in his Colorado State career.

He concluded his Colorado State career with 370 tackles, the fifth-most in school history. Additionally, he was selected to play in the Hula Bowl all-star game when the Rams returned victoriously from Memphis, Tenn.; in the Hula, he made made four tackles and had an interception.



Eddie Hanna

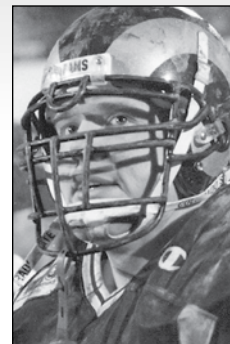
When Rams fans enter Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium, they see only two numbers retired in the illustrious history of the football program. One of those belongs to Thurman (Fum) McGraw (48) and the other belongs to Eddie Hanna (21), whose short time with Colorado A&M made a lasting impact.

From 1947-49, Kansas native Eddie "Twinkletoes" Hanna was an electric running back and track letterman, part of a dangerous backfield few teams could stop. After only two practices, Hanna ran 51 yards on three plays in his first game, against the Colorado School of Mines. Hanna was at the forefront of a resurgence.

Playing with legends such as McGraw and Jack Christiansen under then-head coach Bob Davis, Hanna and his "Cinderella Rams" put together an 8-2 regular season in 1948. The campaign was capped with a trip to the Raisin Bowl to play Occidental, the first bowl in program history. Hanna shined, and 50 years prior to Gartrell Johnson's record-setting performance in the New Mexico Bowl, Hanna had two long TDs. His first was a 71-yard dash for his first touchdown of the game to set a Raisin Bowl rushing record. His second, in the second half, was for 79 yards and another touchdown. Unfortunately, Occidental made an incredible comeback to beat Hanna's club, 21-20.

Sadly, Hanna would play in only one more game for the Rams. During the first game of the 1949 season against Colorado College, Hanna came to the sidelines in the first half with a shortness of breath and chest discomfort and team doctors sat Hanna for the rest of the game. On the train ride back from Colorado Springs, Hanna suffered a heart attack and died.

His number 21 will never be worn again at Colorado State, and his amazing career will never be forgotten.



Nate Kvamme

- >> Linebacker
- >> 1999 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship Recipient

During his stellar four-year playing career at Colorado State, Nate Kvamme established himself as one of the finest linebackers in school history.

Kvamme, from Windsor, Colo., concluded his Ram career fourth on the school's career tackles list with 385. The four-year starter was a two-time all-conference selection.

He was named the conference preseason Defensive Player of the Year in 1998 and was named to All-America teams by several publications.

Kvamme (pronounced QUAM-ee) in 1998 was also a Dick Butkus Award nominee for the honor presented annually to the nation's most outstanding linebacker.

What Kvamme accomplished on the field paled in comparison to his academic success. Kvamme was a three-time academic all-conference selection, and a three-time academic all-district pick by the College Sports Information Directors of America. In 1998, he was also honorable mention Academic All-America.

A Civil Engineering major, Kvamme had a 3.77 grade-point average. At the conclusion of his playing career, Kvamme was awarded a \$5,000 scholarship for post-graduate study by the NCAA. Kvamme used the scholarship to continue his studies and pursue a career in college coaching.

Kevin McDougal

- >> Running Back
- >> 1999 MWC Offensive Player of the Year

Running back Kevin McDougal provided a glimpse of what was to come during the Rams' opening game of 1999 at Mile High Stadium in Denver.

He rushed for 189 yards and scored two touchdowns in leading the Rams to a 41-14 win over in-state rival Colorado before a sellout crowd and national television audience.

McDougal five times in 1999 rushed for more than 100 yards, finishing the season with 1,223 yards. He enjoyed one of the most impressive seasons in school history, finishing with what is now CSU's seventh-highest rushing total all-time.

McDougal had a total of 13 career 100-yard rushing games and led the league in rushing while ranking among the national leaders as well. He finished his career with 3,067 yards, CSU's fourth-highest career total ever.

Following the season, the league's coaches named McDougal the MWC Offensive Player of the Year and he was also selected to first-team all-league. McDougal picked up an additional award when the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame named him the MWC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

McDougal spent his rookie season in 2000 as a member of the Indianapolis Colts organization.



"Fum" McGraw

- >> Offensive Tackle

The most recognized name in Colorado State football history is that of the school's initial first-team All-American, Thurman "Fum" McGraw.

McGraw was a two-time All-American for the Rams in 1948 and '49. McGraw led Colorado State, then known as the Colorado A&M Aggies, to the first bowl game in school history. McGraw and his teammates played Occidental in the 1949 Raisin

Bowl on New Year's Day in Fresno, Calif. A year later, McGraw was again named All-American.

McGraw had a five-decade love affair with his alma mater, where he was a standout athlete and athletic administrator.

Besides his success on the football field, he attained similar honors in wrestling and track.

Following his career in Fort Collins, McGraw played professionally for the Detroit Lions from 1950-54, helping the team to three world championships and earning All-Pro honors three times.

He returned to Colorado State when his playing career ended, as the school's wrestling coach and an assistant with the football and track teams from 1955-58. He was later an assistant coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1958-62, then returned to campus as an administrator from 1962-65, when he became an assistant athletic director.

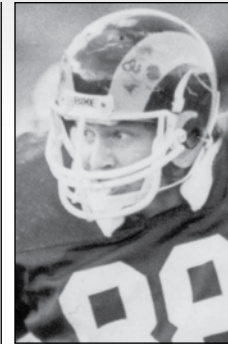
McGraw's influence at Colorado State continued, as he played a prominent role in the construction of Hughes Stadium and Moby Arena.

From 1970-76, he was an NFL scout until returning to his alma mater as the school's athletic director, a position he held until 1986.

He was inducted into the state's Sports Hall of Fame in 1971, and received similar honors at Colorado State in 1988. He is also a member of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame as well as the National Association of College Directors of Athletics Hall of Fame.

The school's athletic center, which opened in May of 1999, is named in his honor.

Every winter, the Rams hold a football banquet and name their MVP in McGraw's name. His No. 48 jersey hangs in the Rams' locker room during every game, home and road.



Keli McGregor

- >> Tight End
- >> 1984 All-American
- >> Third-Round selection in 1999 NFL Draft

All-American tight end Keli McGregor learned a valuable lesson a long time ago: Hard work pays off.

One of the most prolific players to ever compete at Colorado State, McGregor was an All-American football player and an All-American person.

McGregor came to Colorado State as a walk-on in 1981, and used his work ethic to become the starting tight end for the Rams by the end of his freshman season. After an impressive first year with the Rams, McGregor was one of the first CSU players to meet new coach Leon Fuller, who took over the coaching duties in Fort Collins prior to the 1982 season. With hard work in his first season, McGregor shed his walk-on tag in 1982. He responded with a breakthrough campaign: 36 catches for 393 yards and three touchdowns.

Used as a wingback in Colorado State's single-back offensive attack, McGregor flourished for the Rams in the next two seasons. In 1983, McGregor continued to impress his coaches and Colorado State fans.

He concluded his finest season at Colorado State by catching a school-record 69 passes for 717 yards and a pair of touchdowns while earning second-team all-WAC honors.

A remarkable senior season was in the future for McGregor, as he was named to the pre-season All-America teams as selected by several national publications. McGregor went on to catch 47 passes for 479 yards and three touchdowns, leading the Rams for a second straight season in receptions.

McGregor also had two of his best games as a Ram in 1984 as he caught seven passes for 105 yards against Wyoming, and one week later had eight receptions for 62 yards and a touchdown at Utah. He was named to second-team all-WAC for a second straight season and he received second-team All-America honors as selected by United Press International. McGregor also played in the East-West Shrine and Japan Bowl all-star games following the completion of his collegiate career.

After the best career by a tight end at Colorado State, McGregor went on to the National Football League Draft, where he was selected by the Denver Broncos in the fourth round. He later played for the Indianapolis Colts until the 1986 season, and also played for the Seattle Seahawks.

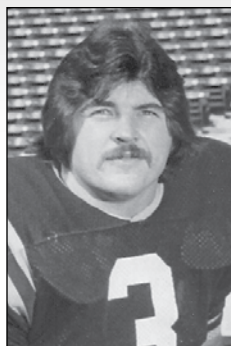
Following his professional playing career, McGregor entered sports administration, first at the University of Florida and later at the University of Arkansas. He served as an associate athletics director at each institution.

His ties to Colorado led him back home in 1993, when he joined the staff of the Colorado Rockies Baseball Club. McGregor supervised the construction of Coors Field, the team's current playing facility, considered among the finest venues in professional sports. He ascended to president of the franchise, which won the NL pennant in 2007 and brought the World Series to his hometown.

In 1997, he was accorded another honor from his Rams' playing career, when he was inducted into the Colorado State Hall of Fame.

Sadly, McGregor passed away unexpectedly on April 20, 2010. To preserve his legacy, the CSU athletic department created the Keli S. McGregor Memorial Scholarship Endowment, and in his name awards the scholarship to a deserving walk-on player.

Kevin McLain

- >> Linebacker
- >> 1974-75 All-American
- >> No. 26 Pick in 1976 NFL Draft

He had speed, agility, size, quickness, leadership and intellect. The perfect football machine?

No, but he was a coach's dream. He was Kevin McLain.

A former middle linebacker for the Rams from Anaheim, Calif., and a junior-college All-American from Fullerton College, McLain was called by Colorado

State coaches and players the best linebacker they had ever seen, and a once-in-a-lifetime player.

McLain was one of the most highly-sought after linebackers, not only by Colorado State but nationally as well.

While at Fullerton he set a school record in 1973 with 124 unassisted tackles in 11 games on a team that was ranked third nationally. In 1974, McLain picked Colorado State as the school for whom he wanted to play, choosing the Rams over schools such as UCLA.

McLain proved his coaches' prediction for success to be correct.

Selected as one of four captains for the 1974 season, McLain led the team in tackles with 195 total stops and was named to all-Western Athletic Conference. He had 93 unassisted tackles, with 12 for losses totaling 48 yards.

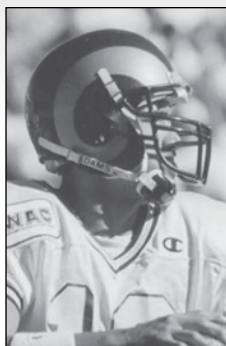
His finest game came against UTEP, when he recorded 10 unassisted tackles, forced a pair of fumbles and deflected one pass.

With such a phenomenal first season as a Ram, McLain was a bright light for the following year's team.

McLain started out the 1975 season with the same fire he had displayed the previous season. He was named to the preseason All-America team for his position at middle linebacker, then went on to garner all-league and All-America honors.

Although he only played in the first nine games due to a knee injury, he was credited with 84 unassisted tackles, including 11 tackles for 53 lost yards. In the Rams' 27-16 win over New Mexico, he compiled 11 unassisted tackles, 11 assisted tackles, and two interceptions, one a 53-yard return, and another for a touchdown. This game earned McLain National Lineman of the Week recognition from the Associated Press. He was also named the Colorado Sportlight Athlete of the Month, and was a projected top choice in the 1976 National Football League Draft.

McLain was a first-round draft choice by the Los Angeles Rams, and played several seasons in the NFL and later in the World League.



Moses Moreno

Screenwriters could not have written a better script than the season former all-star quarterback Moses Moreno enjoyed in 1997.

Moreno, a native of Chula Vista, Calif., returned home in leading the Rams to their third Holiday Bowl appearance in four seasons, when Colorado State travelled to San Diego's Qualcomm Stadium in 1997.

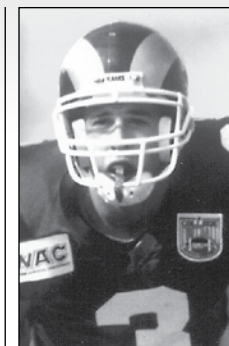
Moreno, in his senior season, guided Colorado State to the highest win total in school history when the Rams finished the year with an 11-2 record. Colorado State defeated Missouri, 35-24, to win the Holiday Bowl and end the season ranked as high as 16th nationally.

For his efforts in the bowl game, Moreno was joined by teammate Darran Hall as the game's co-MVP. That came on the heels of Moreno's record-shattering career.

In 1996, Moreno threw for 2,921 yards, the fifth-highest total in school annals. A year later, he nearly matched that total and finished his career with 6,986 yards, the third-highest total in school history.

Moreno was named first-team all-conference as a senior, and was named Western Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year.

Following his collegiate career, Moreno played for the Chicago Bears and the San Diego Chargers.



Greg Myers

- >> Safety
- >> 1994-95 All-American
- >> 1995 Jim Thorpe Award Recipient

Greg Myers was something special from the moment he set foot on Colorado State's campus.

The only four-time all-Western Athletic Conference selection in league history — and the only player so honored in school history — Myers is regarded as one of the finest players in the history of Colorado State's football program.

The native of nearby Windsor, Colo., earned the respect of his teammates, coaches and opponents with his spirited play throughout an illustrious four-year career wearing the Green and Gold of Colorado State.

Twice, in 1994 and again in '95, he was named first-team All-America. He was also a two-time academic All-American, while majoring in biological sciences with plans to become a physician.

In 1992, Myers became one of only two players in WAC history to be named first-team all-conference as a freshman. He repeated that honor again in 1993, and in 1994 set the stage for achieving national prominence when he was placed among the best in the Jim Thorpe Award balloting for the nation's most outstanding defensive back.

Myers helped the Rams to a 10-2 record and No. 15 national ranking as the team won its first-ever WAC championship and played in the Holiday Bowl in 1994.

A year later, the Rams again won the conference title and played in the Holiday Bowl.

Myers, meanwhile, became the first Colorado State player to ever win a national award when he was named the winner of the Thorpe Award in 1995. He was honored during ESPN's College Football Awards Show at Disney World in Orlando, Fla. Myers' national distinction didn't stop there.

On the same night he walked onto the national stage in the limelight of winning the Thorpe Award, Myers was also named the Honda Scholar Athlete of the Year for his academic prominence. He was also named the winner of a National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame post-graduate scholarship.

Myers concluded his Colorado State career among the school's all-time leaders in pass interceptions and total tackles. He also set the school and WAC records for career punt-return yardage.

Following the completion of his Colorado State playing career, Myers was selected by the Cincinnati Bengals in the NFL Draft, then proceeded to start in the team's secondary. He went on to play for the Dallas Cowboys.

While Myers was one of the finest football players in Colorado State history, he was just as successful in the classroom, balancing the athletic and academic demands that face today's student-athlete.

"When I came to Colorado State," Myers said as a senior, "I had two goals in mind: To work as hard as I possibly could to become the finest student I could, and to work to be the finest athlete that I could become. I've been fortunate to be involved in athletics. Athletics has taught me many things about life, and has given me many friendships and memories that will last forever."

Mike Newell

- >> Center
- >> 1998 Academic All-American

Just prior to the 1994 season, Mike Newell arrived in Fort Collins on the Colorado State University campus, set to begin his Rams football journey.

Two years later, as Newell entered his sophomore season in 1996, head coach Sonny Lubick mused that Newell would be the top center in the country by the time his career concluded.

Lubick was right.

Newell concluded his Colorado State career in 1998 as one of the top offensive linemen in school history on his way to a host of individual honors regionally and nationally.

Newell started nearly 40 games at center for the Rams during his career. Over that span, the Rams won more league games than any other conference team and were among the national leaders in total victories.

Newell, a former all-state performer at Littleton (Colo.) High School, helped Colorado State to three conference titles, and three Holiday Bowl appearances, including a 1997 win over Missouri.

He was named first-team all-conference in 1998, and earned honorable mention All-America honors. Newell was also a Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy nominee.

Newell, 6-foot-3 and 290 pounds, combined speed, power, quickness, and overall athletic ability from his center position.

He was so talented and so agile, the Rams installed several pass and run plays during his career in which he "pulled" to lead the blocking from his center position — truly a rarity at any level of football competition.

Newell earned the respect of his teammates and coaches with his tremendous work ethic. He was a team leader from the time he stepped onto the field, not with his words as much as his actions.

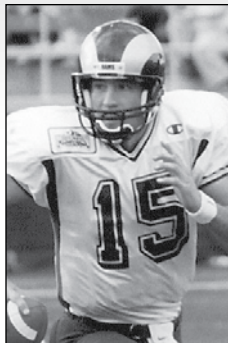
How much did his teammates respect him?

At the conclusion of each season, Colorado State's players and coaches are honored at the team banquet. Coach Sonny Lubick and his staff handed out many awards for various achievements. But players vote on the team's most valuable player.

In 1998, Newell was named the team's MVP, capping a long list of individual achievements in 1998. Newell's prowess wasn't limited to the playing field. He boasted a 3.77 grade-point average while majoring in horticulture with an emphasis in turfgrass management.

Three times, Newell earned academic all-conference honors for his success in the classroom. In 1997 and again in '98, he was selected academic all-district by the College Sports Information Directors of America and GTE. In 1998, he was an honorable mention academic All-American.

After the 1998 season, Newell also was named by the Burger King Corporation as a national scholar-athlete. Burger King named scholarship winners during the 1998 season, and each was then a finalist for an end-of-season scholarship award.



Matt Newton

- >> Quarterback
- >> 2000 MWC Offensive Player of the Year

Matt Newton did a number of things during his illustrious career as quarterback at Colorado State.

But first and foremost, he was a winner. Often.

Newton, from Englewood, Colo., was named the 2000 Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Year after leading the Rams to a 10-2 record, a conference title, and a win over Louisville in the

Liberty Bowl.

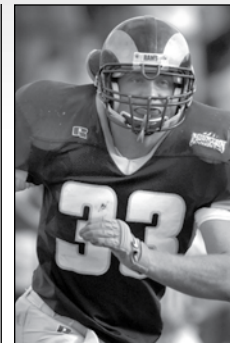
Newton became the second Ram in as many years to win the offensive award, following the trail set by Kevin McDougal, the 1999 winner.

In two seasons as the Rams' starter, Newton led Colorado State to 18 victories in 24 games, the second highest win total by a two-year starter in school history.

He also helped the Rams to back-to-back MWC titles and Liberty Bowl appearances in Memphis, Tenn., where CSU in 2000 concluded one of the most successful seasons in school history with a win over Louisville. The Rams finished No. 14 in the final polls.

Newton finished his career as one of the top passers in school history (currently eighth) with 5,634 career yards. He also is among the leaders in career touchdown passes and total offense.

In 2000, his 2,767 yards passing ranks as the Rams' eighth-highest total ever.



Eric Pauly

- >> Linebacker
- >> 2002 Academic All-American

Eric Pauly will always be regarded as the epitome of a student-athlete in the truest sense of the term.

Pauly completed his playing eligibility in 2003 and also earned his undergraduate degree with a double major in computer information systems and business management. Pauly concluded his playing career with a 3.8 grade-point average and was the speaker for the College of Business fall semes-

ter commencement exercise.

The native of Conway Springs, Kan., earned first-team Academic All-America honors in 2002 and was a second-team selection in 2003 as chosen by the College Sports Information Directors of America, despite playing only half the season after a knee injury cut short his career. Pauly was honorable mention in 2001.

He made his mark on the field during a four-year career as a linebacker for the Rams. As a sophomore in 2001, Pauly led the Mountain West Conference in tackles on his way to first-team all-league honors.

In the classroom, he was named to the academic all-district team and was honorable mention Academic All-America.

A year later in 2002, he finished among the top three players in tackles and was a first-team all-league selection once again, and was named first-team Academic All-American.

Pauly's senior year was unfortunately cut short by a knee injury in the fifth game of the season. He was so dominant on the field to that point in the season that his tackles total was still atop the league's statistical charts for two weeks after he had been sidelined by the injury.

Conference coaches and media members voted Pauly honorable mention all-conference and he was named second team Academic All-American.

Pauly made 288 career tackles during his career, including 15 behind the line of scrimmage, and he had five quarterback sacks and two pass interceptions. Seventeen times during his career, Pauly had 10 or more tackles in a game.

All four years during his varsity career, Pauly was named academic all-MWC.

His success in the classroom and on the field combined to make Pauly one of the finest student-athletes to have ever performed at Colorado State.

Ambassadors of the Rams' Legacy



Cecil Sapp

- >> Single-Season Rushing Record Holder
- >> 2000 Liberty Bowl MVP

Running back Cecil Sapp made a statement of national proportions during Colorado State's 22-17 win over Louisville in the 2000 AXA Liberty Bowl game.

Sapp, a native of Miami, Fla., rushed for 160 yards on 36 carries and scored a touchdown in helping the Rams vault to the school's highest-ever end-of-season national ranking, No. 14 in the Associated Press poll.

Sapp's performance was impressive in every regard. He ran inside. He ran outside. And he ran more times with the football than any other rusher in the storied tradition of 42 Liberty Bowl games. His 160 yards were the most ever by a Rams player in bowl competition until Gartrell Johnson's 2008 New Mexico Bowl, and Sapp set another record with 36 carries.

Rewarded for his 1,601 yards, which broke Steve Bartalo's single-season CSU rushing record, Sapp was named Colorado State's offensive MVP. And following the bowl, Sapp added another honor to his resume. Media members attending the game named him the Liberty Bowl MVP.

Sapp's list of honors didn't stop with the MVP award. He was named to the All-Bowl Team selected by CBS.Sportsline.com as one of the most prominent postseason performers.

Following his career with the Rams, Sapp was signed as a free agent with the Denver Broncos, where he started several games. He also played with the Houston Texans.



Brady Smith

- >> Defensive End
- >> 1995 WAC Defensive Player of the Year

Sonny Lubick took little time in placing his footprint on Colorado State's program. Since his arrival, Lubick had preached the virtues of stellar defensive play.

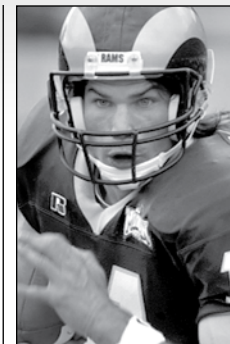
No one took his teachings more to heart than former Ram all-star Brady Smith, who in 1995 was named the Western Athletic Conference's Defensive Player of the Year.

Smith in 1994 had burst onto the regional scene by making 9½ quarterback sacks, still one of the top 10 performances in school history. He played a vital role in Colorado State's 10-2 season and miracle run to the league title and a berth in the Holiday Bowl against Michigan — ironically, the school for which his father played years before.

Smith was back in full force one year later, eclipsing his sacks total of a year before by finishing with 16 - still the top single-season mark in school history.

He concluded his career with 28½ career quarterback sacks, now the second most in school history but a record at the time Smith finished his collegiate career in 1995.

He followed in the footsteps of his father, Steve, who played in the NFL for more than a decade. Brady, following the conclusion of his career at Colorado State, played first for the New Orleans Saints and then for the Atlanta Falcons.



Bradlee Van Pelt

- >> Quarterback
- >> 2002 & 2003 MWC Offensive Player of the Year

Quarterback Bradlee Van Pelt will long be remembered as one of the most prolific players in Colorado State football history. Van Pelt earned the distinction of becoming the first player in school history to earn back-to-back conference Offensive Player of the Year honors, in 2002 and 2003.

He closed his career honored in voting by the Mountain West Conference coaches and media covering the league with the offensive award for the second year in a row, and was named the first-team quarterback for a second time, prior to being selected in the NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos.

Van Pelt earned the back-to-back honors by leading CSU in 2003 with 909 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns, and throwing for 2,845 yards and 19 touchdowns. He led the Rams to a school-record fifth consecutive bowl appearance and also received postseason all-star game invitations to the East-West Shrine Game and the Hula Bowl.

Van Pelt ended his Colorado State eligibility as only the fourth quarterback in NCAA Division I-A history to throw for at least 5,000 career yards (6,271) and rush for more than 2,000 career yards (2,308).

He left CSU as the school's career total offense leader, with 8,579 yards, and set a single-season record with 3,754 total yards in 2003 including a single-game record 416 yards in the team's opening game of the season against Colorado.

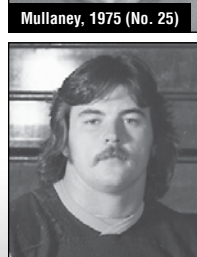
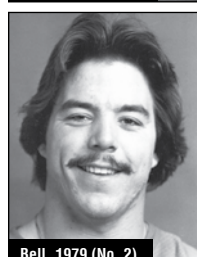
Van Pelt set another school record for rushing yards in a season by a quarterback, 909 in 2003. He concluded his career with eight 100-yard rushing games, easily the highest total in school history by a quarterback.

In 2002, in his second season as the Rams' starting quarterback, Van Pelt led Colorado State to a 10-4 record and the team's third Mountain West Conference football title in four seasons.

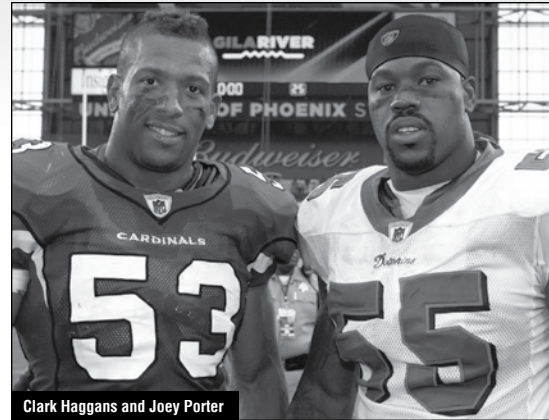
The native of Santa Barbara, Calif., in 2002, rushed for 819 yards and threw for 2,073 yards.

Colorado State — at the time known as the Colorado A&M Aggies — made its first trip to a postseason football season, capping one of the most successful years in school history.

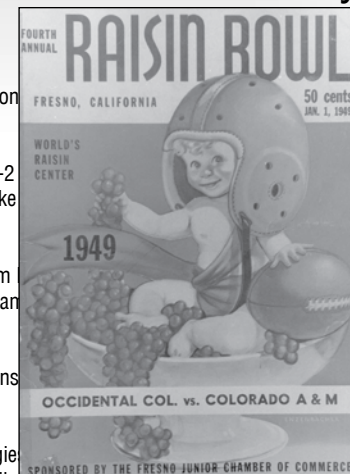
Coached by Bob Davis, Colorado A&M played on New Year's Day against Occidental College, after an 8-2 over in-state rival Colorado in Boulder. The only two regular-season losses came at the hands of Drake trip to postseason play.

It was a star-studded Colorado A&M lineup that took the field that day in Fresno. Four players — Fum Jack Christiansen — were team mainstays and now occupy spots in Colorado State's Sports Hall of Fame. Tragically would pass away after the opening game of the following season.

McGraw, the school's first consensus All-American, later played with the Detroit Lions, as did Christiansen and the Steelers.

Colorado A&M led 13-0 at halftime behind the play of Hanna. He scored on a 71-yard run after the Aggie line hit Keith Thompson with a 5-yard scoring pass. But Occidental scored 21 second-half points to rally for the victory.

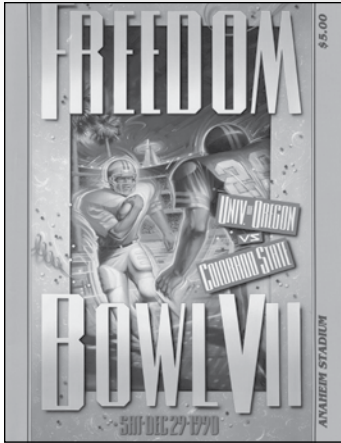
Hanna gave the Aggies their final touchdown of the game on a 79-yard run.

1990 FREEDOM BOWL

Colorado State's football squad opened the 1990 season with dreams higher than many observers felt possible. Those dreams included a postseason bowl berth.

Having not been invited to a postseason game in 42 years, Colorado State earned a trip to the Freedom Bowl in 1990.

Colorado State's 8-4 regular-season record drew bowl attention and thrust the team into the national limelight in Freedom Bowl VII.

The Rams were matched against PAC-10 member Oregon in what would turn out to be one of the season's most exciting bowl games.

Colorado State scored first, opening the game with a 75-yard, 15-play drive on Mike Gimenez's 1-yard plunge. Oregon later led 17-14, setting the stage for a dramatic fourth quarter.

Trailing 25-19, the Rams took the lead on Gimenez's 49-yard pass to Greg Primus, then added insurance on Todd Yert's 52-yard scoring run to lead 32-25 with minutes remaining. But Oregon made one last grasp at victory behind quarterback Bill Musgrave, who led his team on a 79-yard scoring drive. The Rams' Selwyn Jones then thwarted the Ducks' two-point conversion pass attempt, an amazing play, to seal the win.

Yert was named the game's Offensive MVP, while teammate Robert Chirico earned defensive honors.

Colorado State's miraculous dream season in 1994 concluded on the turf of San Diego's Jack Murphy Stadium.

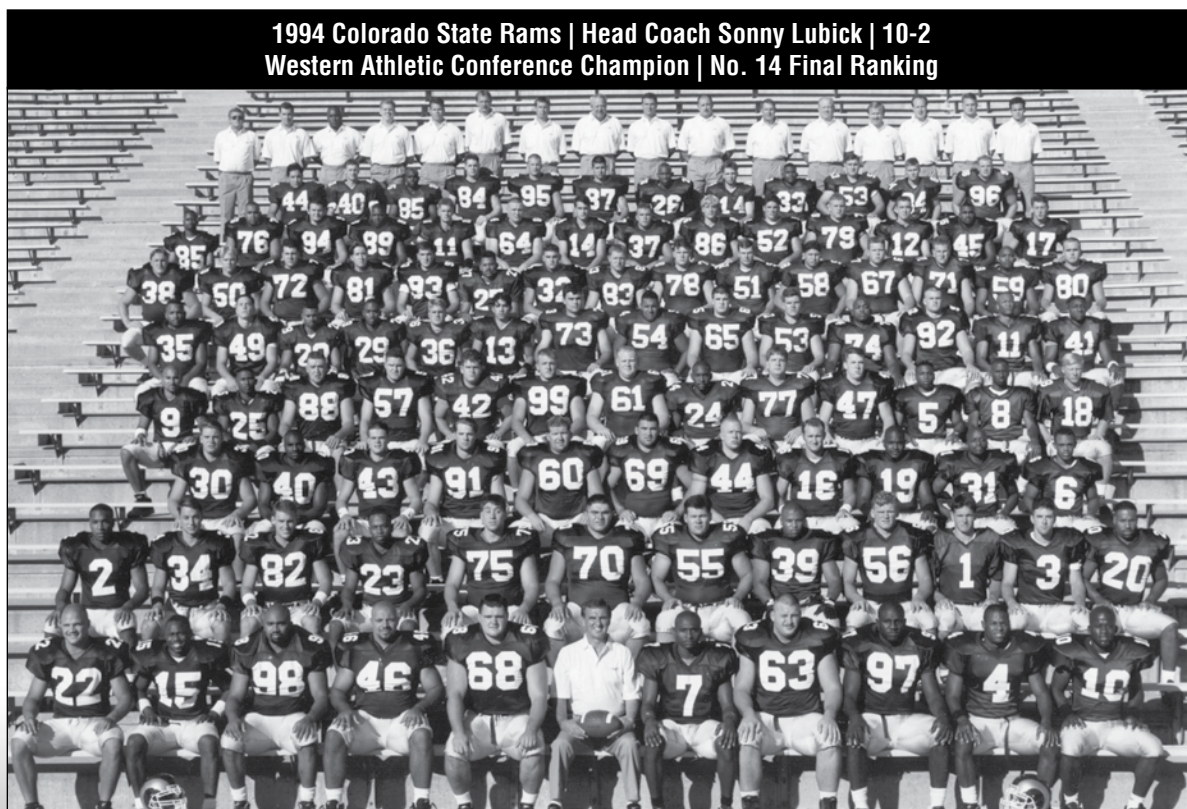
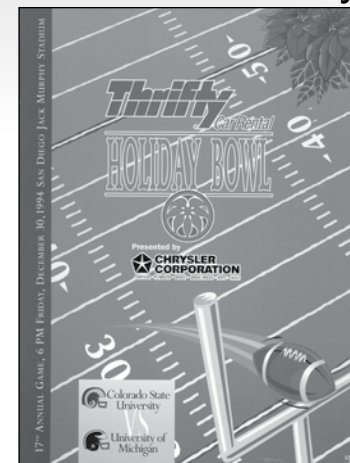
Holiday Bowl 17 featured the young and enthusiastic upstart Rams, representing the Western Athletic Conference for the first time ever in the postseason event, against the Big Ten's Michigan Wolverines, long a bastion of college football tradition.

Colorado State served notice on the night in San Diego that the Rams' program would be a force in coming years. Following a Michigan touchdown on the Wolverines' initial drive of the game, Colorado State answered.

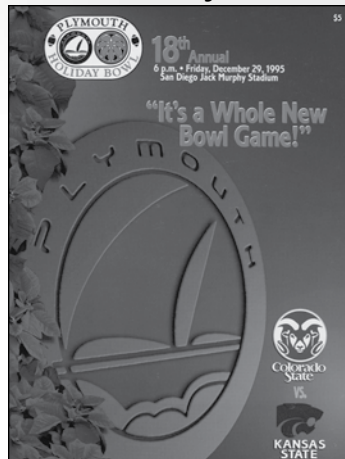
Quarterback Anthony Hill drove the Rams 66 yards in nine plays for the tying touchdown, hitting receiver Paul Turner on a 32-yard scoring play. Hill, a native of San Diego, later would be honored as Colorado State's Offensive MVP in the game.

The Rams put their final touchdown on the scoreboard late in the game when Hill found receiver Jeremy Burkett down the right sideline for an 18-yard touchdown pass.

By the end of the game, which was played before the eighth-largest crowd in Holiday Bowl history, statistics reflected the closeness of the contest. Michigan had gained 341 total yards, only 1 more than the Rams had managed.

1995 HOLIDAY BOWL

The Rams, having earned the right to represent the WAC in the final game of the season by virtue of a victory over San Diego State, joined Brigham Young and Wyoming as the only three schools to have appeared in the Holiday Bowl in consecutive years since the bowl's inception.

Colorado State entered the game with an 8-3 record after finishing 10-2 in the previous year, the school's first-ever trip to the Holiday Bowl. Colorado State returned to Jack Murphy Stadium, the site of its league-title clinching win over SDSU, for a date with Kansas State.

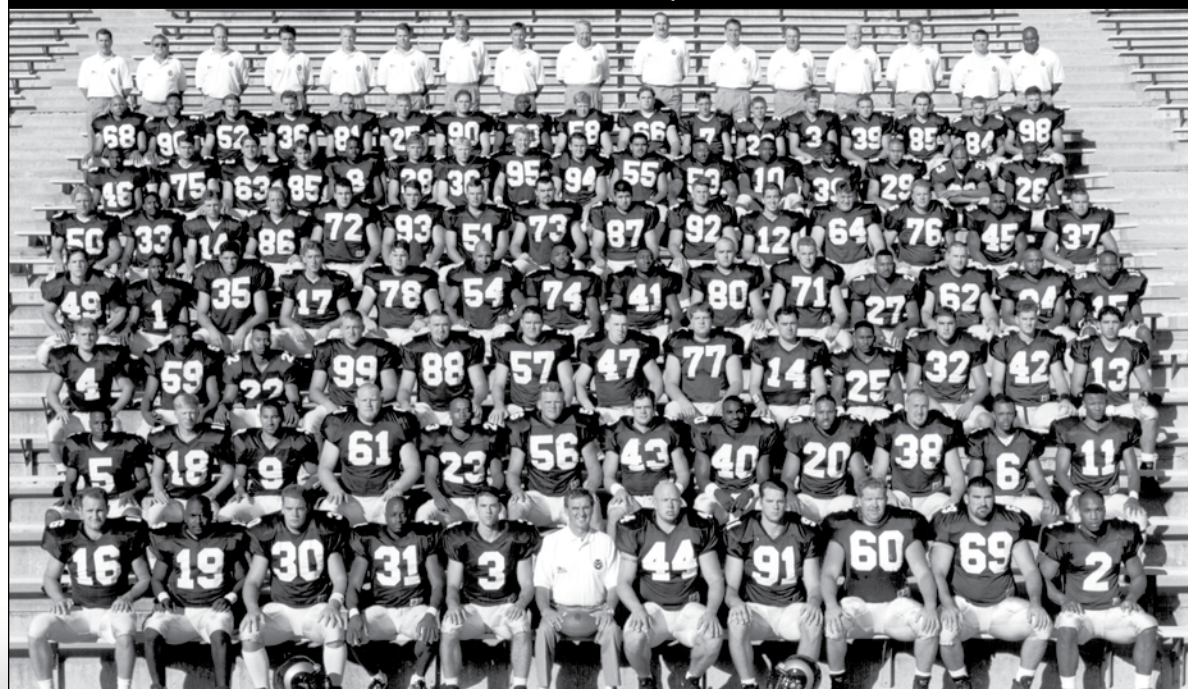
Kansas State entered the game ranked among the top 10 teams nationally after finishing in a tie for second in the Big Eight Conference.

The teams were tied, 7-7, at the end of the first quarter before an interception and a partially blocked punt led to K-State's 19 second-quarter points.

The Rams were led offensively by freshman running back Damon Washington. Playing before a hometown crowd, Washington stung Kansas State's defense for 101 yards on just 10 carries, scoring one touchdown.

Defensively, Colorado State cornerback Ray Jackson intercepted a pass and returned it 60 yards for a touchdown on a play that was nullified by an official's inadvertent whistle.

1997 HOLIDAY BOWL

Colorado State served notice on the game's first drive that it was a team bent on making history. The Rams secured a spot in the laurels of school annals with a ninth win in a row, a 35-24 win over Missouri in a celebration of the 20th anniversary of the Holiday Bowl.

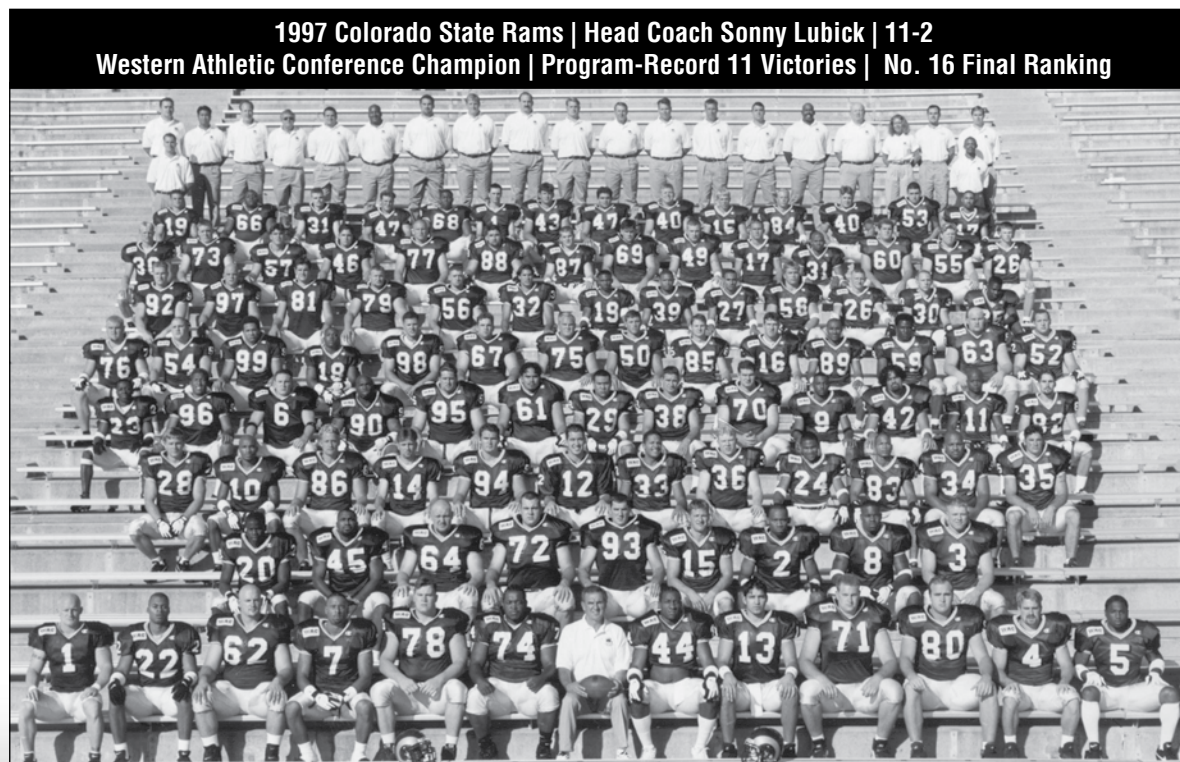
Colorado State made its intentions known from the outset, taking the first drive on a crisp evening in San Diego 85 yards in 13 plays for a touchdown. Wide receiver Darran Hall — a San Diego native — capped the drive, scoring on a 14-yard reverse.

Hall played a major role in the game, taking a punt early in the third quarter and returning it 85 yards for a touchdown, the longest such return in the bowl's history.

He and teammate Moses Moreno — another San Diego-area native — were the game's co-MVPs. Moreno, despite a sore foot injured during the game, completed 18-of-24 passes for 206 yards and two touchdowns. Running back Kevin McDougal gained 110 yards on 18 carries.

Colorado State's defense was equally as impressive. The Rams limited Missouri to just 68 passing yards. Linebacker Willie Taylor and safety Myron Terry led the way with eight tackles apiece, while Eric Vaughn had seven stops.

One of the game's many highlights came with 10:44 to play and the Rams nursing a 28-24 lead. Reserve quarterback Ryan Eslinger, lined up as the holder in a field goal formation, faked that play and instead ran up the middle for a 23-yard touchdown to seal the victory.

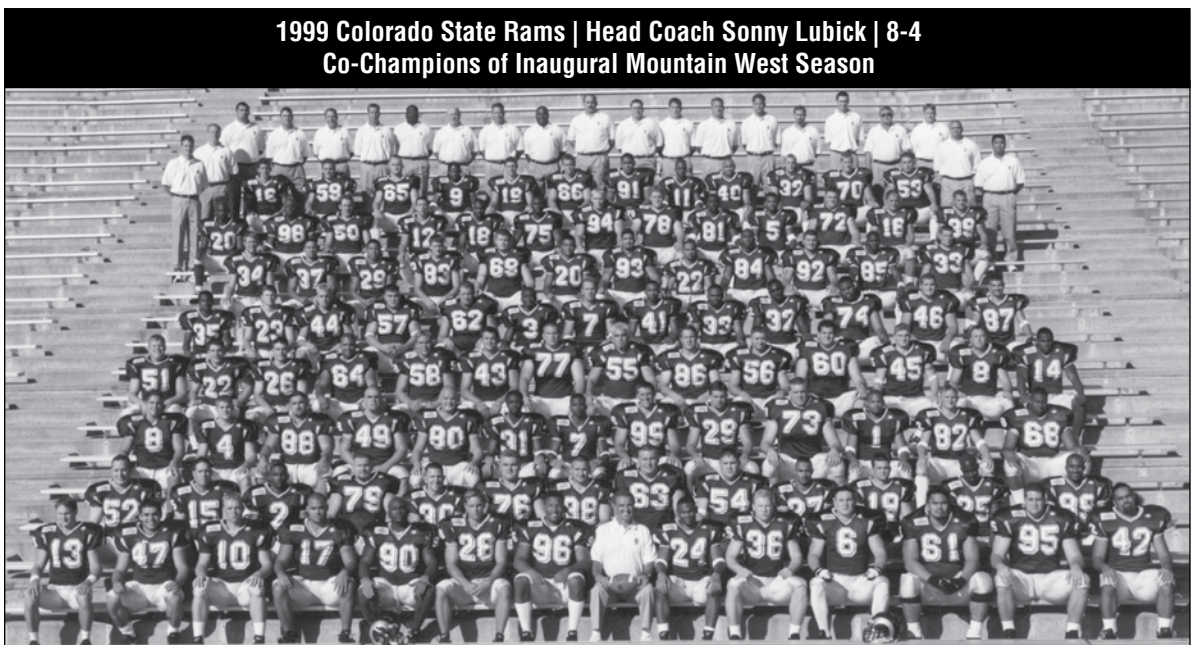
1999 LIBERTY BOWL

The game featured a myriad of unusual plays. USM's first touchdown came on a fumble return. Following a field goal by the Rams' C.W. Hurst, USM scored on a blocked punt. Later in the first half, Rams wide receiver Frank Rice ran 2 yards on a reverse, a touchdown set up by CSU's blocked punt.

Colorado State's final touchdown of the game came on a 38-yard scoring pass from quarterback Matt Newton to H-Back Cory Woolstenhulme.

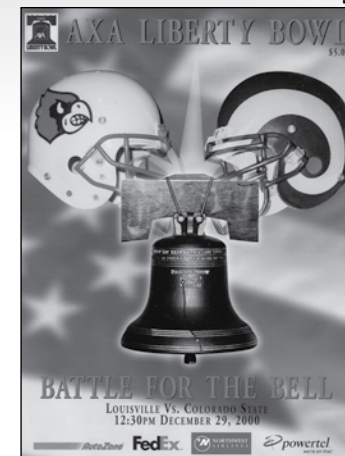

Colorado State entered the game having won a second straight Mountain West Conference title. Coach Sonny Lubick's Rams featured eight players — the most in school history — who were named first-team all-league. Included in that group were quarterback Matt Newton and linebacker Rick Crowell, named the league's offensive and defensive players of the year, respectively. For the fourth time in seven seasons, Lubick was named the league's coach of the year.

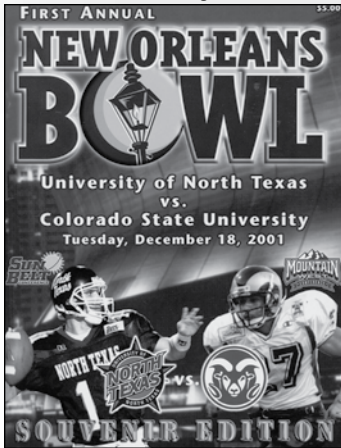
Running back Cecil Sapp's 2-yard scoring run in the second quarter tied the game, and wide receiver Frank Rice's 16-yard reverse late in the first half put the Rams ahead to stay, 16-10.

Sapp set a bowl and school bowl game record with 36 rushes, and his 160 yards.

Colorado State was later voted 14th by the Associated Press, the highest end-of-season AP ranking in school history.

Colorado State's football squad in 2001 made school history, playing in a third consecutive bowl game. CSU won the first-ever New Orleans Bowl played at the Louisiana Superdome, home to Super Bowl XXXVI just seven weeks later. And, the win marked the first time in school history that Colorado State had won back-to-back bowl games.

Colorado State coach Sonny Lubick guided the Rams to five wins in the team's final six games, including the team's sixth bowl game since 1994.

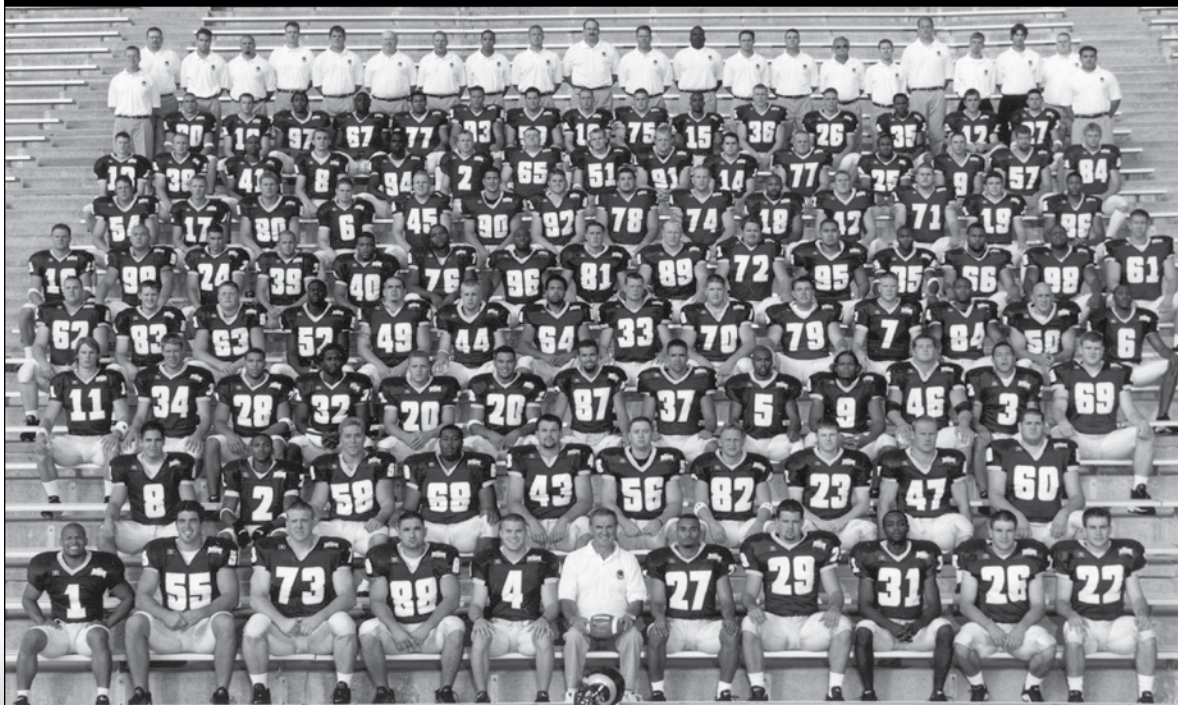
The Rams took control of the game early, scoring 17 points in the first quarter and 24 by halftime. Senior receiver Brad Svoboda scored the first touchdown of his career, a 2-yard reverse, on the game's first drive, set up by a 56-yard catch-and-run play by Pete Rebstock on a pass from Bradlee Van Pelt.

Colorado State sealed the win in the third quarter when the game's MVP, Justin Gallimore, blocked a punt and recovered it for a touchdown to put the Rams up, 31-14. The Rams' defense, which allowed only 329 yards, was led by linebacker Eric Pauly's 10 tackles, while safety Aaron Sprague

also had 10 stops.

Offensively, running back Henri Childs led the way with 97 rushing yards. Backup Chad Dixon, a senior playing in his first game as a Ram, scored a touchdown in the fourth quarter on a 2-yard run.

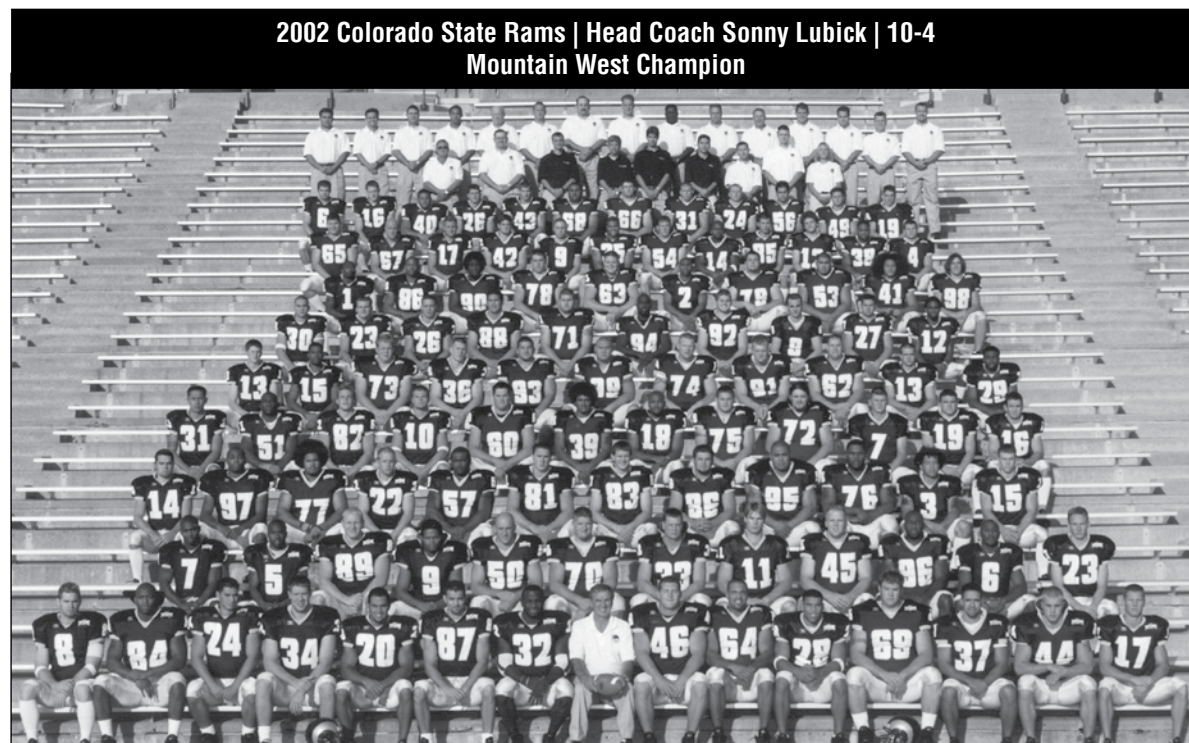
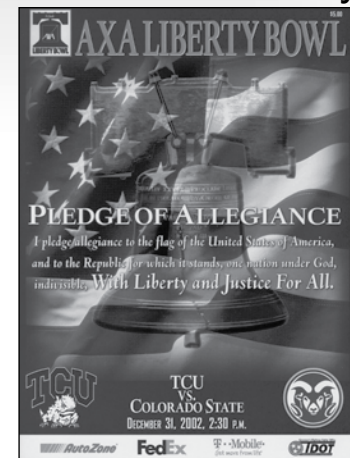
Colorado State concluded a successful 2002 season with the program's third trip in four seasons to the Liberty Bowl as the Mountain West Conference champion.

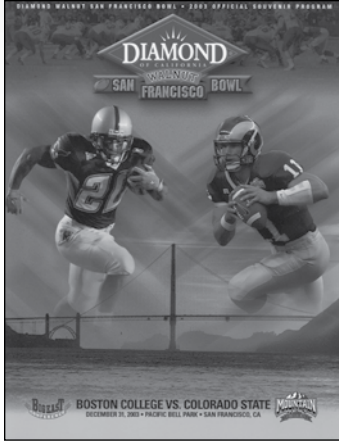
Colorado State entered the game with a 10-3 record, the fourth time in Sonny Lubick's career at Colorado State the Rams had won 10 or more games in a season.

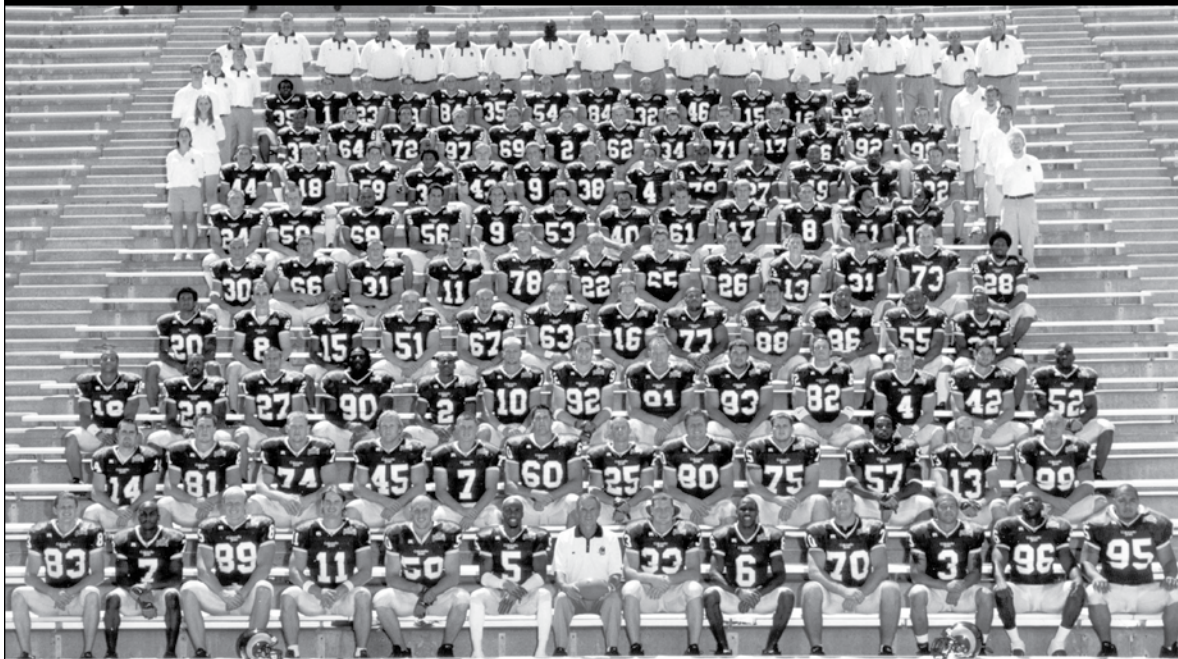

Colorado State made its fifth consecutive bowl appearance, facing Boston College in the second annual Diamond Walnut San Francisco Bowl. Colorado State continued its bowl-game streak by winning five of the team's final seven games, including a 24-23 win over UNLV on the Rams' final drive of the game to ensure another postseason trip.

Colorado State battled back from a first-quarter deficit to close within a touchdown when WR David Anderson caught a 40-yard toss from QB Bradlee Van Pelt to draw the Rams within 21-14. Anderson was impressive in the game with 10 receptions for 134 yards and a touchdown, both CSU bowl game records for catches and receiving yards.

Van Pelt threw for 163 yards and passed for one touchdown and rushed for another. Running back Jimmy Green rushed for a team-most 74 yards and scored a touchdown. LB Jeff Flora led the Rams defense, which limited BC to 361 yards, with nine tackles, while LB Drew Wood and DB Lukas Davis each had six stops. The Rams also were credited with three quarterback sacks in the game. The game was played in SBC Park, home of the San Francisco Giants baseball team.

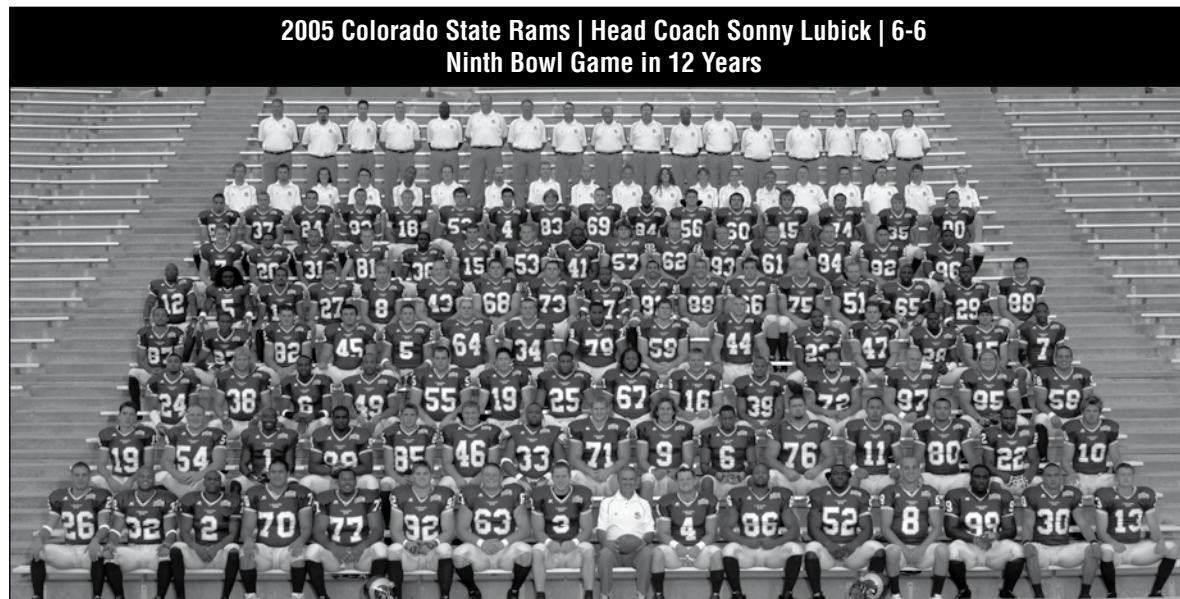
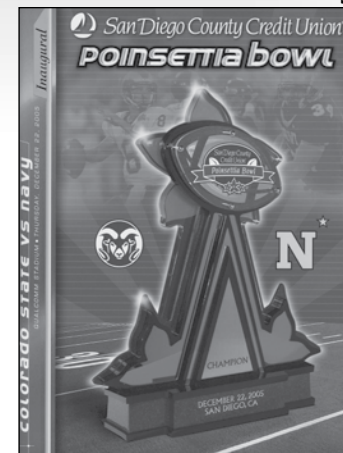

Despite throwing for 381 yards on a 26-for-33 evening, senior Justin Holland and the Rams could not overcome the Navy offense in the inaugural Poinsettia Bowl. The Rams ended their season with a 6-6 record, the 11th time in Sonny Lubick's 13-year career the Rams had ended the year with a non-losing record.

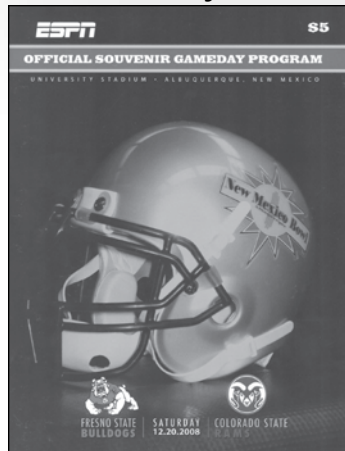
Navy slotback Reggie Campbell led the team, tying the NCAA bowl record with five touchdowns, and had 290 all-purpose yards. The Midshipmen notched 611 total yards in the game, with 467 coming on the rush. The Rams netted 571 yards on offense themselves, with 431 net passing yards for the game.

Colorado State sophomore Kory Sperry caught a career-high eight passes for a career-high 117 yards, including four for 54 yards in the opening drive. Senior David Anderson had a game-high 126 yards receiving, second most in a Colorado State bowl game.

Kyle Bell rushed for 122 yards in the game. It was the sixth time that season Bell had surpassed 100 yards.

Gartrell Johnson rushed for a career-high 285 yards and scored two touchdowns as Colorado State rallied for a 40-35 victory over Fresno State.

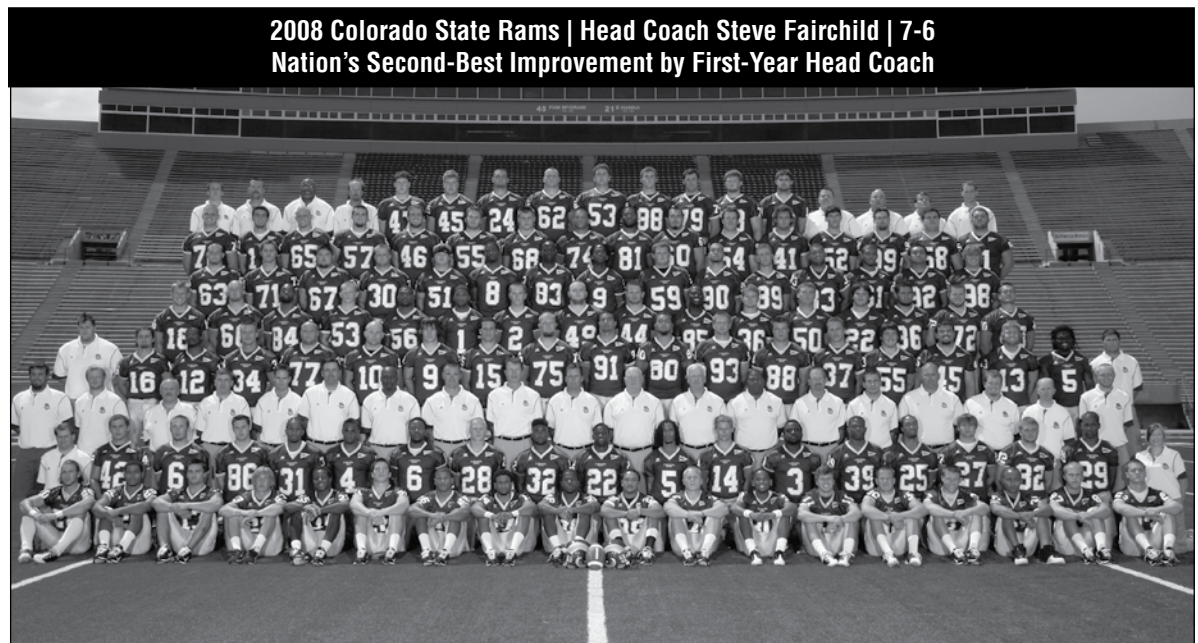
Johnson sealed Colorado State's first bowl victory since 2001 on a 77-yard touchdown with 1:46 remaining, igniting a celebration by fans who made the 7-hour drive from Fort Collins, Colo. Johnson added 90 yards receiving for 375 combined rushing and receiving yards, the most by any NCAA player ever in a bowl game.

The Rams (7-6) took their first lead at 33-28 when Billy Farris threw a 69-yard TD to Rashaun Greer with 7 minutes left. Fresno State cornerback Sharrod Davis took a big chance but whiffed on his attempt to bat the ball. Greer made the catch at the 30 and went untouched into the end zone.

Fresno State got within 40-35 with 55 seconds to go, but CSU's Kyle Bell secured the ensuing on-side kick. Fans came out of the stands as the final seconds ticked off, capping a strong first season for Colorado State coach Steve Fairchild.

Johnson was named most valuable offensive player after he put on a show. He broke a 57-yard run in the first quarter and went another 57 yards on a shovel pass from Farris in the second, leaving defenders reaching for the dreadlocks tumbling out of his helmet.

CSU's Tommie Hill was named Defensive Player of the Game.

Stadium History



Durkee Field

Durkee Field (1899-1911)

While little is known about the program's home grounds in 1893 and '94, when the school's new college athletic organization resurrected football in 1899, the team's first official field was constructed in the spring of 1899.

In May 1899, the area between Agricultural Hall and the Chemical Building (where South College Gym sits today) was cleared of trees and drained of water. The ground was then graded to make a flat playing surface. With the railroad tracks on the west and South College Avenue on the east, this low-lying ground was actually a natural streambed, which is marked today by a tunnel under the railroad tracks. This stream becomes active when torrents of rain wash through the campus, such as the devastating flood of 1997.

The newly reformed football team of 1899 played the first games here on a playing surface made up of primarily dirt and rocks.

In 1901, a graduate from the Class of 1900 named Charles Durkee donated money for a tall wooden fence, erected on three sides of the field with the railroad tracks acting as a barrier for the fourth

side. The barriers helped keep non-paying fans out better than the military cadets (the previous system for chasing off freeloaders). In return for his fence, the college named the athletic grounds Durkee Field.

Bleachers were later added for spectators to watch games as well as military drills.

The facility was described by former players and head coach Harry Hughes as horrible to walk on, let alone play football. That stream would reappear during wet weather and ran through the playing field during some games.

Hughes' first football season of 1911 marked Durkee's last season of hosting football. When the rules of football changed to standardize the 100-yard field, Hughes used that opportunity to build a better field for his athletes.

The military continued to drill on Durkee for several years, and tennis courts were later added for women's athletics. But in 1925, ground was broken for a new gym and fieldhouse that opened in 1927 and still stands there today.



Colorado Field

Colorado Field (1912-67)

In 1910, the site of a college experiment station that grew potatoes was identified as the location where the future athletic field should be built. After two years of lobbying and with the support of college president Charles Lory, construction began on May 23, 1912.

Students and faculty, including Lory, removed rocks and planted seed to build the first college football field in Colorado with grass.

Play began in the fall of 1912, after 1,000-seat grandstands were added by the beginning of football season. A cinder track around the field was added in 1914, since Harry Hughes was also the track coach.

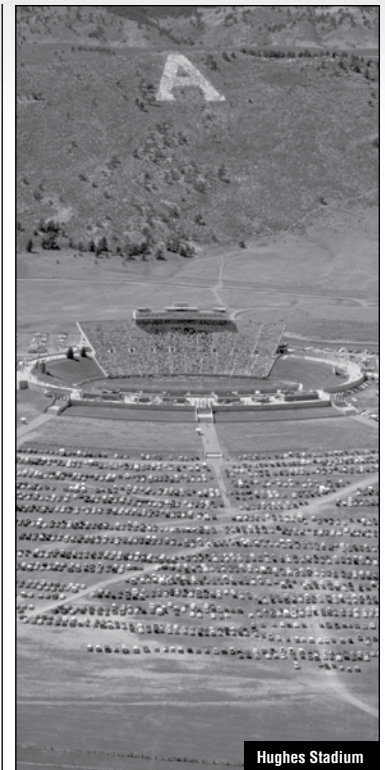
In September 1912, the school built a clubhouse just east of the railroad tracks on what is now University Avenue, providing locker rooms and showers for both the Aggies and visiting players. Coupled with the outstanding grass surface and clubhouse, the state-of-the-art football stadium was the envy of the region and helped the Ag-

gies to win eight conference championships over the next 25 years. The ninth and final conference championship team to play on Colorado Field was in 1955.

Over the 55 years Colorado Field served the Aggies, larger grandstands were built and bleachers were added on the east side and end zones. Today, Jack Christiansen Track, home to CSU's outdoor track and field squads and named after the Pro Football Hall of Famer, stands on the site where Colorado Field once graced the CSU campus.

In 1961 the university conducted a study to determine whether to turn Colorado Field into a major-college football stadium, or replace it with a new venue on the foothills campus. Because of traffic concerns and the facility's location in the center of Fort Collins, officials opted to construct a new stadium west of town, at the foothills.

The last varsity game played on Colorado Field was in 1967, shortly before its demolition.



Hughes Stadium

Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium (1968-Present)

Built at the base of the Hog Back Mountains in the shadow of the Aggie "A," Hughes Stadium has served Colorado State for more than 40 years.

The site of not just football, but also Rolling Stones and Beach Boys concerts, the 32,500-seat stadium was named after legendary coach Harry Hughes.

After great success in the 1990s, the stadium was expanded and the field renamed in honor of all-time great head coach Sonny Lubick.

WELCOME! The Colorado State athletic media relations office genuinely appreciates your coverage of CSU football, and looks forward to each and every time it can welcome you to Fort Collins. Members of the office, including director Paul Kirk, assistant directors Danny Mattie, Danielle Marshall and Nic Hallisey and several student assistants, are available to assist you with your coverage. The office is happy to help you however it can.

The media relations office is located on the third floor of the McGraw Athletic Center, on the west side of the main campus of Colorado State University, adjacent to Moby Arena.

Following are football program media policies jointly established by Head Coach Jim McElwain and the athletic media relations office. For your own benefit, please take a few minutes to read through the policies. Violations could result in revoked credentials. Please feel free to contact Paul Kirk via phone (970/491-4067) or e-mail (paul.kirk@colostate.edu) at any time with questions regarding the policy.

Media availability throughout the year

In general

- All interviews with any member of the football program, including Jim McElwain, the coaching and football staffs, and student-athletes, must be coordinated through the athletic media relations office and director Paul Kirk.
- True freshmen are not available for interviews at any time.
- Regarding unique subject matter, such as human-interest angles, members of the media are welcome to approach the media relations office at least 48 hours in advance with requests to interview any member of the program, provided the requested individual is not a true-freshman player. Approved requests will be granted.
- Members of the media are strictly prohibited from approaching any coach, staff member or student-athlete by any means, including text messages, e-mail, phone calls (cell, office or home) or social media, such as FaceBook and Twitter, without first approaching the athletic media relations office.

August preseason practice

- True freshmen are not available for interviews at any time.
- Designated student-athletes with at least one season in the program will be made available on designated days (see schedule).
- Head Coach Jim McElwain will be available following most practices during the spring and preseason camps.
- All interviews must take place at field level, either inside or outside the southwest Moby Arena doors, or on the practice field. Media are not permitted in the football office area, or in the training room or locker room, unless the media relations office has previously made such arrangements.
- The outdoors cold-tub rehabilitation area, in the shade near Moby Arena, is considered an extension of the training room. Photographs, videography, or interviews are not permitted in this area.

Regular-season game weeks

- On Mondays, Head Coach Jim McElwain will conduct a weekly press conference in the Hall of Fame Room on the south concourse of Moby Arena. McElwain will begin speaking at 12 p.m. and the session should conclude by 12:30 p.m. Designated players will be made available following Coach McElwain's press conference.
- On Tuesday, McElwain will conduct a morning Mountain West coaches conference call. That will represent his only media availability on Tuesday.
- On Tuesday following practice, designated student-athletes with at least one season in the program will be made available. Regarding unique subject matter, such as human-interest angles, members of the media are welcome to approach the media relations office at least 48 hours in advance with requests to interview any member of the program, provided the requested individual is not a true-freshman player. Approved requests will be granted, but those interviews need to take place on Tuesday following practice.
- On Wednesday, a designated assistant coach will be made available to the media at 12 p.m. The media relations office will provide in advance the names and dates of that coach availability. Those Wednesdays will represent the only assistant-coach availability of the week.
- On Wednesday, McElwain will be available following practice.
- Following Wednesday availability, there is no further access to members of the program until the end of the game Saturday, except for contractual broadcast obligations.

Gameday

- Every member of the program needs to report to the locker room before conducting interviews of any kind. Other than network obligations, CSU does not allow on-field interviews in the minutes following the final gun.
- Head Coach Jim McElwain will meet the media following a 10-minute cooling-off period in a designated area. The CSU locker room is closed. Designated student-athletes will be brought to the interview area. Assistant coaches or true freshmen are not available.

Recruiting period

- Access to Head Coach Jim McElwain will be limited during this time, from the end of the regular season through signing day, the first Wednesday in February, due to recruiting responsibilities. Assistant coaches are not available during this period.

All other times

- Head Coach Jim McElwain is available either in-person or by phone, by appointment through director of media relations Paul Kirk (paul.kirk@colostate.edu).
- All assistant coaches are unavailable other than designated sessions on Mondays during regular season game weeks.
- Phone calls (cell, office or home) to any coach, staff member, or student-athlete are strictly prohibited, unless previously arranged through the athletic media relations office.
- Media should contact the athletic media relations office, rather than the individual coaches and/or student-athletes, when needing personal contact information, such as phone numbers or e-mail addresses.

CSU Football Media Policies

Injuries

- At all times throughout the calendar year, including spring practice, Head Coach Jim McElwain will serve as the sole source for injury information. All questions related to injuries should be directed to McElwain, and not to any other member of the program, including athletic trainers, doctors, the injured student-athlete, or his teammates.
- If McElwain is unavailable, contact Paul Kirk in the media relations office.

Practice guidelines

- All outdoor Colorado State football practices are open for the first few periods, including the stretching and individual sessions, unless otherwise noted. At a designated time early in practice, the remainder of the session will be closed to the media.
- During the spring, scrimmages are open to the media. Fall scrimmages are not open.
- All media should remain on the sidelines, standing a safe distance from the boundary to prevent collisions. Also for safety reasons, media are asked to stand rather than sit or kneel, and should either hold personal bags or set them behind a barrier, so they are not a potential injury source for players or the media.

Photography guidelines

- Cameras are restricted from shooting/filming any 11-on-11 period, as well as selected other periods (athletic media relations staff will notify).
- Photographers and videographers are not allowed to bring tripods onto the practice field.
- Photographers and videographers should remain on the sidelines, or behind the end lines. They are not permitted in any drill at any time.
- Photographers should stand a safe distance from the boundary to prevent collisions. Also for safety reasons, photographers are asked to stand rather than sit or kneel, and should either hold personal bags and/or camera equipment, or set them behind a barrier, so they are not a potential injury source for players or the media.
- Media are not permitted within listening distance of the post-practice team huddle. Those wishing to shoot/film the huddle should remain on the sidelines. Audio/accounts from the huddle should not be recorded or made public in any way.
- All posed photo shoots must take place at times arranged prior to the beginning of practice, working through the athletic media relations office. Posed photo shoots are not permitted during any practice.

Telephone interviews

- Head Coach Jim McElwain is available for phone interviews as time permits. Media should call to make an appointment through director of media relations Paul Kirk (paul.kirk@colostate.edu).
- Phone calls (cell, office or home) to any coach or student-athlete are strictly prohibited, unless previously arranged through the athletic media relations office.
- Media should contact the athletic media relations office, rather than the individual coaches and/or student-athletes, when needing personal contact information, such as phone numbers or e-mail addresses.

CSURAMS.com

- The official Web site of Colorado State athletics is CSURams.com, featuring the latest news, information, statistics, and rosters for all of the Rams' 16 athletic programs. Rams fans worldwide can also listen to the live play-by-play coverage offered by the Colorado State Sports Network through the Internet site. Fans can click on www.CSURams.com, then click on the radio broadcast icon on the site's front page for football and men's and women's basketball live radio coverage.

Media credentials

- Credentials must be requested through director of media relations Paul Kirk in writing at least seven days in advance of an event. Approved requests will be mailed or can be picked up in the media relations office, or at the game.

Photographer credentials

- Photo credentials are issued only to accredited photographers. Passes must be displayed at all times. All photographers must remain outside the 25-yard lines on both sides of the field.

Game-day services

- A pregame luncheon is served 90 minutes prior to kickoff in the press box. In-game services include statistics and play-by-play information following each quarter and notes and statistics following the conclusion of the game.
- Hughes Stadium offers complimentary wireless Internet access. Check the seat-assignment label on press row for access information.
- The south tunnel contains a small photographer room with a table, chairs and several hard-line, high-speed Internet connections.

Parking

- Media parking is available at Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium in selected lots. Please contact the CSU media relations office to request a Hughes Stadium parking pass.
- Access to the parking lot immediately west of the McGraw Center will require an "A" permit from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays. A limited number of single-day passes are available through the media relations office. Annual permits can be purchased through the Office of Parking Management Web site: www.colostate.edu/depts/parking.
- The CSU media relations office will provide complimentary annual passes to this lot for select members of the press that demonstrate a consistent willingness to cover the Rams. Those passes are not replaceable and should be treated like cash.

Stadium directions/will call

- Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium is located two miles west of the central campus at the base of the Rocky Mountain foothills, underneath the "Aggie A." The stadium is just south of Prospect on Overland Trail. From I-25, media should take the Prospect exit west to the mountains, then turn left on Overland Trail. Press box access is on the west side of the stadium via elevator to the fourth level.
- Will call is located at the southwest corner of the south tunnel parking lot. There is no media will call. Provided arrangements are made in advance, passes will be left at this will-call location.

Brian Roth enters his third season as the Voice of the Rams for the CSU Radio Network. Again, Roth will call play-by-play action for each CSU football and men's basketball game.

During the football season, Roth also will host the Coors Light Jim McElwain Radio Show, as well as the Coors Light Basketball Coaches Show during the hoops season. Both shows air live from Old Town Fort Collins on the CSU Radio Network.

A versatile and accomplished professional, Roth worked three years alongside Jerry Schemmel (2009) and Rich Bircumshaw (2007-08) as the Rams' color man for football broadcasts. For six seasons before that, he served as the network's sideline reporter.

Roth, 37, debuted as the play-by-play man for CSU women's basketball in 2000-01, and held that role until shifting permanently to the men's side to replace Schemmel in 2010-11. During his 10-year tenure courtside at Moby Arena, Roth was behind the microphone for three NCAA tournament games, a regular-season MWC championship and an MWC tournament title.

Roth has also filled in as the play-by-play voice on many Colorado State men's basketball broadcasts, including 2007 when Tim Miles' squad captured the BP Top of the World Classic in Fairbanks, Alaska.

A Colorado native and 1993 graduate of Smoky Hill High School in Aurora, Colo., Roth resides in Denver.

The general manager of Ingrum Sports Production Network (ISPN), he oversees production of more than 125 events per year for Comcast Entertainment Television (CET). Roth manages a 14-employee production team for ISPN and brings an unparalleled knowledge of high-school sports in the state of Colorado to the broadcast booth. Roth has also called WCHA college hockey for Comcast and Big Sky basketball for Altitude Sports and Entertainment.

A 1998 graduate of the University of Colorado, Roth is married to Corinne Hofstetter, a Mountain West champion in the 200 Butterfly in 2003 and '04, who powered Colorado State to consecutive runner-up finishes at the MWC swimming & diving championships during those two seasons.

On June 1, 2011, Brian and Corinne had their first children, a set of twins, Trenton and Juliette.

Kevin McGlue is entering his 11th season on the CSU Radio Network, and his third season as the full-time color analyst in the CSU football broadcast booth.

In past years, McGlue has served in a variety of roles on the broadcast, including color commentary, sideline reporting and booth production. McGlue also has several years of experience on the CSU Radio Network calling women's basketball.

A native of Colorado, McGlue can also be heard as a member of the two-time CHL champion Colorado Eagles radio broadcasts, as the Voice of the Eagles and director of broadcasting for the team.

Comcast subscribers may also recognize McGlue from his work providing color commentary and play-by-play during the broadcasts of many high-school sporting events on CET. What's more, McGlue has served as a postgame television host for Colorado Avalanche and Colorado Eagles broadcasts on Altitude Sports and Entertainment.

Marty Cesario joins the Colorado State radio broadcast team for his first full season as Sideline Talent and host of the Rams Tailgate Show. He is neither a newcomer to the broadcast nor CSU, though. In

fact, Marty has been connected with CSU and its sports media community for quite a while.

In 2009, Cesario re-assumed creative production duties for football and basketball broadcasts for Nelligan Sports and the Colorado State Sports Network. (He also performed that role from 1999-2004 working with former play-by-play announcers, Wyatt Thompson, and the late Rich Bircumshaw.) Last year, Cesario filled in for color analyst, Kevin McGlue, for the games with Boise State and UTEP. So it's fair to say, this addition to the broadcast crew certainly has roots.

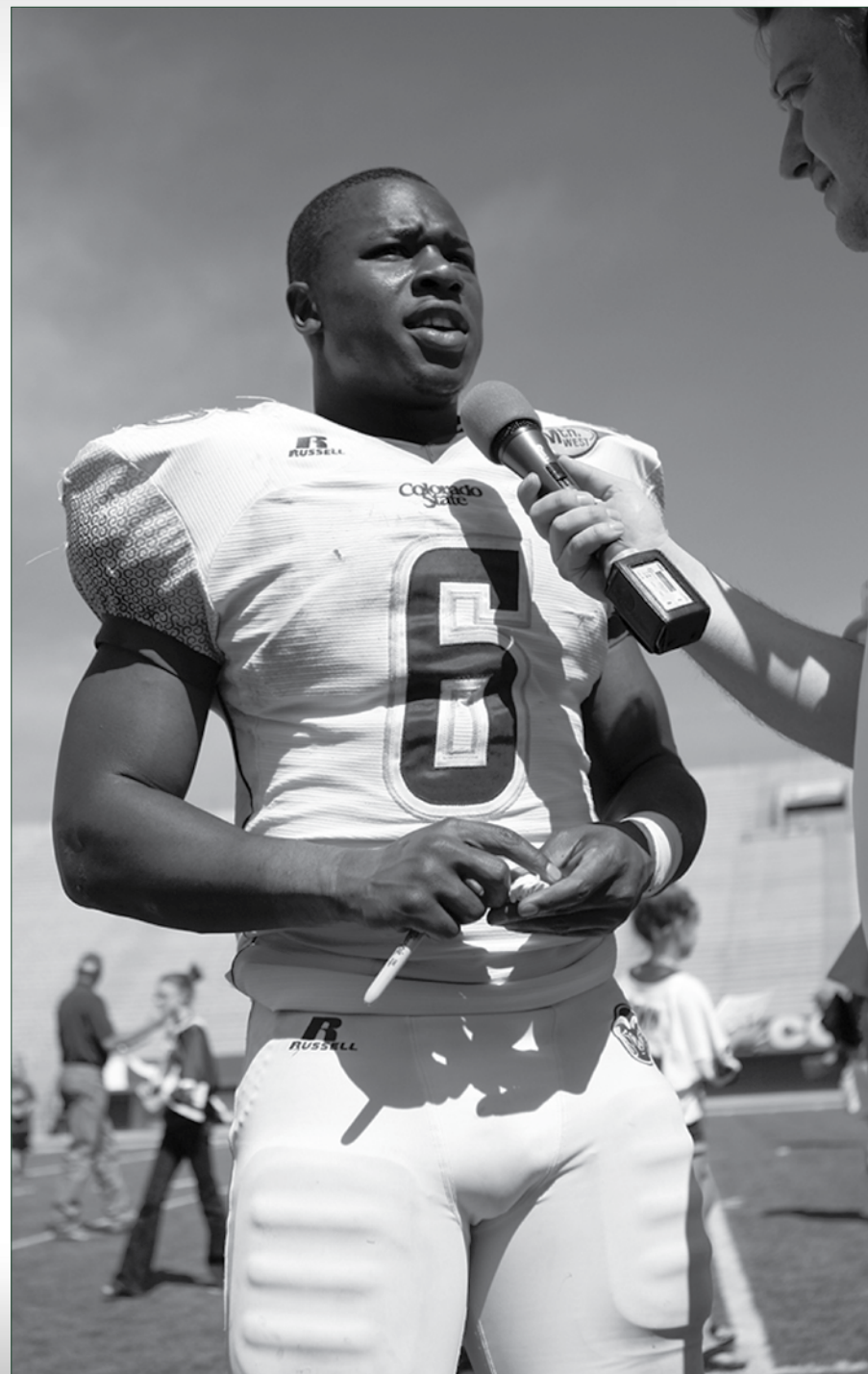
