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

#### Notes

The Locomotive Geryon (2002) by James M. David Composer's Notes:

The piece is a representation of an amalgamated image that formed during the early stages of the work's conception. One source of the image is Dante's Geryon: a monstrous creature with the head of a man, the body of a snake, and the tail of a scorpion. The beast moves with terrific speed as he transports Dante and Virgil further into the depths of the abyss. This terror is then transformed into a massive machine that is agile yet menacing, not unlike a large V-twin motorcycle. The bizarre creation then takes the listener past a strange gallery of psychological images, each attempting to evoke both the beauty and fear that is felt in the presence of a powerful machine.

# **Performer Biographies**

Peter Sommer, saxophonist and composer, is in demand as a performer, clinician and recording artist throughout the state of Colorado and across the nation. Since establishing himself among the Denver area's elite jazz musicians, Peter has contributed his muscular tenor playing and creative spirit to a wide variety of musical projects ranging from mainstream bebop to avant garde and beyond.

Mr. Sommer has released two albums as a leader – Sioux County (2006) on Tapestry Records, featuring his original compositions in duo with jazz piano legend Art lande, and Crossroads (2008) on Capri Records, featuring a two-tenor frontline with the great NYC saxophonist Rich Perry.

Mr. Sommer has performed with the Colorado Symphony Orchestra and the Colorado Music Festival Orchestra, and has appeared at many jazz festivals throughout the state including the Telluride Jazz Celebration, Jazz in the Sangres and the Vail Jazz Festival. Peter has been a featured jazz soloist at North American Saxophone Alliance Regional and Biennial Conferences and has also performed at IAJE International Conferences in Anaheim and Toronto, Canada, and has performed at World Saxophone Congresses in Valencia, Spain and Bangkok, Thailand.

Mr. Sommer is Assistant Professor of Jazz Studies and Saxophone at Colorado State University in Ft. Collins.

Kim Joyce is a piano teacher and an accompanist. She received her BS degree in Zoology and her BA degree in Music from Iowa State University, and her MM degree in Piano Performance and Accompanying from Northwestern University. Along with performing at local universities, she and her husband (and page turner), Steve, host concerts at their home.
