# **Urban and Community Forestry**

Hire an ISA Certified Arborist: As the days warm up and the days get longer, thoughts turn to working outside. This is the perfect time of year for pruning trees because the cold days are behind us and leaf buds have not broken yet. Armed with a sharp set of bypass pruners and a small pruning saw, a lot of pruning can be done in the spring months. Eliminating deadwood, removing conflicting branches, thinning, and developing scaffold branches are all excellent reasons to prune.

However, pruning large branches (e.g. greater than six inches in diameter) and removing branches that require either climbing the tree or the use of a ladder alters the job complexity. When these complex pruning jobs show up, one should seriously consider hiring a professional *International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) Certified Arborist* for the job. Here is why you should consider hiring a professional arborist:



- 1. They have the training and experience to do what is best for the tree in a manner that is safe for the tree worker and preserves the integrity of the site.
- 2. They have invested in the proper equipment and know how to use it. Steer clear of the so-called tree expert who shows up with a pickup and a chainsaw.
- 3. They usually carry insurance that covers personal and property damage, as well as workers compensation insurance. Be sure to ask for proof of insurance before hiring a tree company.
- 4. They have demonstrated their commitment to their profession by taking and passing an exam that covers the following aspects of tree care: biology, identification, maintenance, installation, nutrition, pest diagnosis, tree worker safety, risk management, and most importantly industry accepted proper pruning practices.
- 5. Once certified by the ISA, an arborist must continue to add to their education base by attending classes or workshops. Over a three year period they must accumulate thirty continuing education units (CEU) to show that they are adding to their knowledge base.
- 6. Mature trees are an investment and asset to the property. It makes sense to put their care in the hands of a knowledgeable professional. Visit <a href="https://www.treesaregood.org">www.treesaregood.org</a> for more tree information.
