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BIOGRAPHIES



SHANNON GERNEY Shannon has been dancing since she was 2.5 years old. Her ballet training was primarily Vaganova based at a small studio in North Carolina, Triangle Academy of Dance, where her primary ballet teacher was Tamara Manukovskaya. Here she was exposed to many styles of dance including tap, jazz, lyrical, contemporary, and character in addition to her ballet training. In the summers of 2010 and 2011, she attended Saratoga Summer Dance Intensive (SSDI) where she got to work with many prestigious teachers including, but not limited to; Roberto Munoz, Melinda Roy, Chad Schiro, Simon Ball, Francine Ball, Daniel Ulbricht, Dana Arey, Patricia Wilde and Jock Soto. Her sophomore year of high school she changed studios to International

Ballet Academy in Cary, NC where her ballet training had more of a Cuban/American base with teachers Miguel Campaneria and Rossana Nesta Gahagan. In the spring of 2013, Shannon participated in YAGP. In the summer of 2013, she attended the Vail Valley Dance Intensive, run by the same faculty as SSDI, where she trained with many of the same teachers. While she was in CO that summer, she toured CSU and decided to apply to their dance program.

Shannon chose to come to CSU's dance program because it was one of the few in the country to offer a Vaganova based ballet syllabus and the Advanced Ballet teacher was Carol Roderick. Throughout her first three years at CSU, she was lucky enough to work with teachers Carol Roderick, Chung-Fu Chang, Jane Slusarski-Harris, Judy Bejarano, Lisa Morgan, Amber Mazurana, Lindsay Pierce, and James Wallace and guest artist Hsin-Yu Kao. She also enjoyed attending master classes from companies like Koresh, Alvin Ailey II, and Complexions.

Between her freshman and sophomore years at CSU, Shannon attended the American Dance Festival in Durham, NC where she got to explore, more intensely, the core ideas of modern dance with teachers Rodger Belman, Pamela Pietro, and Gerald Casel. This is one of the largest modern dance intensives in the country and it opened up a whole new movement vocabulary for Shannon. Her sophomore year Shannon was asked to perform with the Contemporary Dance Academy of Fort Collins in their Nutcracker as a soloist in both the Snow and Arabian pieces.

As she looks to the future, Shannon is planning on attending a graduate program for physical therapy so that she can become a physical therapist with a specialty of working with dancers. The more she explored and learned about dance, movement and the human body's capacities/ capabilities, the more she became interested in pursuing a career that works with dancers to help them reach their full physical potential, as well as to help and support them through their injuries. Over this past summer she volunteered at various PT clinics and with Moving Through Parkinson's with CSU faculty member Lisa Morgan in Fort Collins. Next summer, she is hoping to attend a study abroad program at the Trinity Laban School in London, a leader in Dance Science study and research. She would also like to take a moment to thank all of those who have supported her throughout her journey including teachers, friends, and family. She would not be where she is today without them and she is truly grateful for each and every one of them!



EMILY KAISER was born and raised in the suburbs of Thornton, Colorado. Her interest in dance sparked when she began her early dance training at Premier School of Dance at age 4 under the direction of Karin Gritz and, later, Alexandra Fields. As a member of Premier's competition team, she attended regional and national competitions and conventions each year. Emily also had the opportunity to showcase a piece of her choreography, "A Light Within," in the Fall Dance Concert 2015. Since beginning her dance degree at CSU, Emily has performed in many of the Dance Division shows, taken part in various master classes, and attended performances by some of the best dance companies in the nation. Emily attended the American College Dance Association in the Spring of 2016, and plans to attend the conference again in the Spring of 2018.
