The Spring Dance Concert 2013 would not be possible without the countless efforts and enormous talents of the faculty, staff, and student

production staff. The Technical Production and Design Team at the University Center for the Arts started in January of this year and over the next three months removed, cleaned, rehabilitated, and repurposed the lighting fixtures/ instruments that are making tonight's concert possible. This collaborative effort of student, staff, and faculty took over 500 hours and involved over 250 lights and reduced cabling from 800-30 feet. All of the lighting, sound, projection, and special effects in the University Dance Theatre are controlled through the most up to date computerized systems which takes an additional 100 hours to prepare, program, and operate. A special thanks to Alex Ostwald, Master Electrician at the UCA, for spearheading these efforts.



The original Pas de Quatre was choreographed by Jules Perrot in 1845. The premier in London brought together four of the greatest ballerinas of the age to perform on the same stage for the first and last time. One of these performances was attended by Queen Victoria and Prince Albert. The event was a huge publicity sensation. Even to this day, the iconic lithograph of the opening tableau remains familiar to dancers and dance enthusiasts.

Nearly one hundred years later (1941), the ballet was reconstructed and restaged by Anton Dolin. The original cast of this revival were also the great dancers of their day: Nathalie Krassovska, Mia Slavenska, Alexandra Danilova, and Alicia Markova. It is this version which you will see performed tonight in its entirety.

The dancers in this performance are all students in the Ballet Repertory class. In this capacity, they have each learned all of the parts in the ballet, but were cast in individual rôles to best reflect the technique and personality of the great lady which they portray. This Romantic style, which preceded the great Classical era of Petipa and the Russian Ballet, is characterized by a lightness and precision of footwork in jumping and turning. The carriage of the arms (port de bras) is delicate, gracious and dignified. The illusion is one of grace and ease, but the choreography is actually very demanding, and mastering the style is even more challenging. Please imagine a time before electricity, softly illuminated by candlelight.

His solo performances and choreographic works have been showcased throughout the United States and abroad, and received over fifty choreographic commissions from both professional ballet and modern dance companies, educational institutions' dance program, choir and chamber music companies, and dance and film festivals nationally and internationally. Chung-Fu was a Chancellor's Fellowship recipient from the University of California, Irvine, where he completed his M.F.A. in Dance. He has taught as a guest artist at major dance companies, institutions and festivals throughout the U.S. and overseas. His professorship biographical profile is honored and listed in Who's Who in America.



Carol Roderick has taught, coached, and trained teachers and dancers for professional companies, universities, and prestigious schools in the United States, Canada, Japan and Europe. She received her early training in Boston, and later at Butler and Indiana Universities. Her formal pedagogical training was received from the late Jürgen Schneider (Bolshoi Ballet, Stuttgart Ballet, American Ballet Theatre) and Gabriela Komleva (Kirov/Maryinsky Ballet). She was Principal Teacher at AIS International Ballet in Japan, and a member of the profes-

sional division faculties of Boston Ballet School and The Royal Winnipeg Ballet School. She directed the Colorado Ballet School, Tulsa Ballet School, and Academy of Ballet Idaho. She was the Program Manager for the Bolshoi Ballet at Vail, and also served as ballet mistress for the Cleo Parker Robinson New Dance Ensemble. For many years, she ran her own preprofessional training program in Denver: Classical Ballet Ensemble. She has coached and prepared students for the Prix de Lausanne, Japan Grand Prix, New York International Ballet Competition and the USA International Ballet Competition, as well as local and regional scholarship competitions throughout the USA. Many of her students have gone on to professional performance, choreographic, and teaching careers.

Jane Slusarski-Harris is a Professor at Colorado State University. Since 1988, she has been the Director of Dance at CSU where she teaches ballet and modern dance technique, history, pedagogy, and all levels of classical Pilates. Slusarski-Harris has choreographed and performed in numerous works for the concert stage, musical theatre, and opera and for a number of years danced with IMPACT DANCE. She received her MFA in dance from the University of Colorado.
