In this comic opera, La Périchole, a poor street singer, and her fiancé Piquillo find themselves in tough times and are unable to come up with the money for their marriage certificate. While Piquillo is off trying to drum up some funds, the Viceroy, Don Andres, comes across the sleeping Périchole and enchanted by her beauty, offers her a place in his court as a Lady in Waiting. The catch is that she must be married. Lured by the prospect of finally having enough to eat, she writes a farewell letter to Piquillo believing she will never see him again.

In the Act II finale, Périchole is waiting to get married but unbeknownst to her, the man the Viceroy has found to marry her is none other than Piquillo himself. Don Andres has plied the two with liquor hoping to expedite the process. When Piquillo discovers that the mysterious wife he is about to marry is La Périchole, he becomes furious about the letter and pushes her to the ground. In Act III, we find Piquillo in prison because of his actions against La Périchole. She comes to confess her continued love for him and to rescue him, but when she tries to bribe the jailor, they discover that it is the Viceroy in disguise. The opera ends happily when Don Andres is convinced to allow the two to marry.
