Directions To The Property:

From US 287 and Hwy 14 "Ted's Place", go west on Hwy 14 about 7 mi. to the wooden bridge on the west side of "My Camp" Subdivision. Cross the bridge to the two lots immediately north of the bridge. The neighbor's lot is the third lot north with the large house.

Purpose:

- 1. Inspect alleged riparian damage by neighbor under the guise of "fire mitigation."
- 2. Site visit was in response to a phone call (1 1/2 hrs.) received from Mr. Stack at 11:00 09FEB2004.

Findings:

- Trees and shrubbery (willow, cottonwood, plumb, etc.) were sawn off along the Poudre River bank for a distance of about 200 feet, thus removing riparian habitat and highway screening from Mr. Stack's property.
- 2. Cutting was done on a buffer strip of community property, only in front of Mr. Stack's property.
- ✓ 3. Cutting seems to be in reprisal for Mr. Stack installing a (legal) well near (over 75ft.) the neighbor's well.
- √ 4. The neighbor is alleged to have been paid some \$500.00 and three 5-gal containers of fire foam concentrate with applicator fittings for the work.
 - 5. The neighbor is alleged to have been paid by the Poudre Canyon Fire Dept.

6. Inspection of receipts in our files indicates that we may have reimbursed Poudre Canyon Fire Dept. for this work.

Neighbor "clear cut" trees and vegetation along Poudre River, in

front of Mr. Stack's property.

Chronology:

- Mr. Stack owns two lots in "My Camp" Subdivision.

- He has 200 ft. river front with a community property strip between his property and the river.

- He has a neighbor (Dan Carlson) on the north side of his property, and another neighbor (Jon Schneider) on the south.
- Mr. Carlson recently moved in from Texas.
- Both Dan and Jon are on the Poudre Canyon Fire Dept.
- Dan Carlson has 10 ac, with 1000 ft of river frontage.
- Last Fall Mr. Stack was locating a well on his property and Mr. Carlson came over and protested.
- In November Mr. Stack had his well drilled and installed.
 - The next day Dan and Jon sawed down all the trees and riparian vegetation along the river front, in the community property area, in front of Mr. Stack's property, leaving only Ponderosa Pines.
 - They did this in the name of "fire mitigation."
- They did not remove vegetation in front of Mr. Carlson's or Jon's property.
 - According to Mr. Stack, the men were paid \$500 and three or more 5 gal. containers of fire foam and spray fittings for the work.
 - The Poudre Canyon Fire Dept. paid them under a fire mitigation program with grant money.
 - Mr. Stack said that there was no mitigation needed as this strip borders the Poudre River.
 - He said that Dan claims to be protecting a "structure", which is a storage shed located on the river's edge (possibly illegal) and is surrounded with vegetation.
- ^- All the other property owners were not consulted before this work was done.

- Has lived in the area for eight years.
- Has a B.S. Degree in Geology.
- Has an E.E. Degree.
- Studied Forestry in Montana.

- Was on the Helena Hot Shots in 1988 and "knows something about fire."
- Works at Agilent.





Subject:

- Status of activity concerning issue with neighbor's cutting along river and poisoning two pine trees.

Discussion:

- Mr. Stack inquired about activity toward resolving the issues.
- He said that he had talked with Tony Simon and was told that it was a Colorado State Forest Service issue.
- He said that Denise had said that the two pine trees in question had been poisoned. Denise did NOT say that, and I explained that Denise had found no definitive evidence of agents (e.g. insects, disease, etc.) that would cause the trees death. There could be other agents such as root disease that were involved.
- He asked that Mr. Babler call him at about 1430, as he works nights and would be up by then.

6. What was accomplished?

We developed a newsletter and distributed it along with the following flyers from the Colorado State Forest Service:

- "Home Fire Protection in the Wildland Urban Interface"
- "Insects and Diseases Associated with Forest Fires"
- "Grass Seed Mixes to Reduce Wildfire Hazard"
- "Fire-Resistant Landscaping"
- "Creating Wildfire-Defensible Zones"
- "Forest Home Fire Safety"

This informational packet was mailed to landowners in the district, given to renters and distributed at community meetings. We have been encouraging residents to develop fire mitigation plans for their property.

We have started the assessment of urban/wildland hazardous area. We are developing a map with these areas and adding GPS coordinates for the district. The area around Stations 3 and 4 are completed. The areas around Station 1 and 2 are a work in progress which probably will not be completed until next year when the snow is gone. There have been several meetings on developing an evacuation plan for the different areas.

We purchased two chipper that residents of the district can use to chip slash. Residents are working to remove the chip piles. Some of these piles need to dryout and won't be removed until next year. Three slash piles have been burnt so far this winter. We also purchased the barricade systems and have provided training on the systems at all four station locations.

We contracted with tree removal companies to help 18 residents (most were elderly) remove trees from around their homes. Approximately 160 cubic yards of slash was removed from these residences. This work is completed. In addition, many of our fire volunteers assisted 24 additional residents with fire mitigation work around their homes. Sixty homeowners signed up for Barricade systems. These homeowners have agreed to develop a fire mitigation plan for their property, attend training on the barricade system and Firewise and implement their mitigation plan. We also provide home inspections of 12 properties.

We held two training at campgrounds in the area on how visitors to the area can be firewise. Approximate 120 visitors were in attendance at these presentations.

Attached are some of the before and after pictures of various sites. However, some of the after shots were taken after the snow arrived and you can't see all those stumps! Also attached are reports from each of the Stations.

Poudre Canyon Fire Protection District Station 1 Fire Mitigation Report

12 residents performed fire mitigation. They had property inspections and then proceeded to start work on removing slash, trimming trees up 10 feet, removing cedars that were near residences. They also cut fine fuels and dug firelines that were 20 feet wide around residences. There were cutting and chipping done to remove dead trees near houses. We also hired Timberscape to remove larger trees and slash piles that were bigger than we could handle. We distributed 12 free barricade systems and sold 2 units. We placed 2 units on our fire department trucks and have 4 units left to sell.

Station 1 staff is preparing a fire safety plan on all the side roads (which are private). This would include recommendations on when we would respond and what would make these structures ones that would be considered undefendable. We are then going to provide this information to all homeowners that fall in that category with recommendations on how to change their status if possible.

We have provided training and education to local residents about the fire barricade system and the availability of it to homeowners at a community meeting.


We have put in over 600 hours in mitigation work. Cleaned up 11 slash piles removing approximately 120 cubic yards of slash and treated 6 acres.





Station 2 Report

Station 2 had 9 people participate in the fire mitigation work. Over 38 trees were removed from around homes. For example: Steve Hummel -1.5 acres worked - 5 Cu. yards of slash and 10 trees removed. Steve Dearborn - 2+ acres - 18/20 Cu. yards of slash and 11 large trees removed; Mike Picket - 1 acre (trees very close to house) - 5 Cu. yards of slash and 5 cotton woods removed. Another 6 residents have had home inspections, have done slash chipping and tree removal. Some have also enclosed under their decks for another 20+ trees removed and 50 cubic yards of slash. Our residents have invested approximated 1,000 hours in mitigation work.

Station 3 Report PROFESSIONAL FIRE MITIGATION EFFORT

The Station 3 area had 5 landowners participate with Timberscapes and the PCFPD in an effort to improve their properties resistance to a wildfire. Approximately 8 acres of land were treated next to these 5 residences removing 20 cu. Yards of chipped slash, 15 cords of firewood, and an additional 28 tree stumps. In addition, approximately ¼ mile of access road was treated to allow for fire department access to 4 properties in case of wildfire. These five landowner groups contributed 450 man-hours of labor in addition to the professional efforts listed above.

INDIVIDUAL LANDOWNER EFFORT


The Station 3 area had an additional 9 landowners participate in the fire mitigation process by one or all of the following: treating their own property, developing a fire mitigation plan and purchasing fire control equipment or retardant. These 9 landowners treated approximately 68 acres of land and have another 120 acres of land planned for future mitigation. These efforts produced approximately 60 cu yards of slash, 20 cords of firewood and assorted trash. These landowner groups provided approximately 1440 man-hours of labor.

SUMMATION

Thanks to the efforts of the Colorado State Forest Service, Poudre Canyon Fire Protection District and the Landowners in the Station 3 district our area is less susceptible to wildfire. Over \$7000.00 was spent on professional efforts and the landowner groups provided an additional 1,990 hours of labor in this district. The numbers listed are from landowners actively participating with the fire department, numerous other landowners are now taking steps toward fire mitigation that have not reported their hours. The effect of the grants from the CSFS and participation of the PCFPD is now clearly being seen in our area. Any efforts that could be made by the CSFS, USFS, Larimer County, PCFPD and local landowners to provide public slash piles located throughout mountain districts would be a major help in promoting fire mitigation and removing fuel from our forests. Most winters would allow local fire departments to burn these slash piles.












Station 4 Report

Station 4 had 7 landowners and one not-for-profit business participate in fire mitigation efforts. Approximately 25 acres of land were treated. Five medium size slash piles were developed (two have been burnt) and many smaller piles were chipped by landowners. Approximately 120 cubic yards of slash was removed. One home owner went to the expense (\$2,200) of installing a metal roof on his home. By working with Timberscapes one home owner was able to remove over 20 large trees from next to her home. Landowners contributed 400 hours of labor and the not-for-profit contributed another 400 hours of labor in fire mitigation efforts in this area.

The fire department has trained on the Barracde system and they are working on an evacuation plan, even to the point of being able to evacuate horses and pets from the area. We have had a request several request from landowners to assist with grass burns to lessen the amount of this fine fuels. Hopefully, this winter we will be able to accommodate them.

Dear Poudre Canyon Fire Protection District,

We want to thank the Poudre Canyon Fire Protection District for providing funds to property owners for wildland fire risk reduction. We could not have undertaken the cost of this important but expensive work without your help.

With your funds, several hazardous trees near our home have been removed. Four large trees were leaning toward the house and two trees were constricting the driveway to a width of ten and a half feet, making fire truck accessibility difficult. Several smaller trees were cut down due to their proximity to the house and for easier removal of the large trees. Watching the Timberscape loggers as they worked was incredible! They were precise, dropping limbs and sections of trees to the ground without touching the house, propane tank, or the camper. They worked quickly and efficiently, completing the job in two separate days. We helped remove branches to a brush pile, where we later chipped everything into mulch, using the chipper provided by the fire department. Removal of one driveway stump was accomplished this fall, with plans for a spring removal of the other stump.

We plan to continue thinning trees on our property as needed; we thank you for helping us with the trees we could not cut down by ourselves. With the added protection of the Barricade foam which we can spray onto our house if there is imminent danger of forest fire, we feel a little less vulnerable to the whims of nature.

Thank you again for the logging, the use of the chipper, and the Barricade System. We could not have paid for all of this without your assistance!





6. What was accomplished?

We developed a newsletter and distributed it along with the following flyers from the Colorado State Forest Service:

"Home Fire Protection in the Wildland Urban Interface"

"Insects and Diseases Associated with Forest Fires"

"Grass Seed Mixes to Reduce Wildfire Hazard"

"Fire-Resistant Landscaping"

"Creating Wildfire-Defensible Zones"

"Forest Home Fire Safety"

This informational packet was mailed to landowners in the district, given to renters and distributed at community meetings. We have been encouraging residents to develop fire mitigation plans for their property.

We have started the assessment of urban/wildland hazardous area. We are developing a map with these areas and adding GPS coordinates for the district.

We purchased two chipper that residents of the district can use to chip slash. We have a long waiting list from folks requesting to use the chippers (32 currently). We also purchased the barricade systems.

We contracted with tree removal companies to help 18 residents (most were elderly) remove trees from around their homes. Approximately 160 cubic yards of slash was removed from these residences. This work is nearing completion. In addition, many of our fire volunteers assisted 24 additional residents with fire mitigation work around their homes. Sixty homeowners signed up for Barricade systems. These homeowners have agreed to develop a fire mitigation plan for their property, attend training on the barricade system and Firewise and implement their mitigation plan. We also provide home inspections of 12 properties.

We held two training at campgrounds in the area on how visitors to the area can be firewise. Approximate 120 visitors were in attendance at these presentations.

What we still need to do:

Complete the assessment of urban/wildland hazardous areas.

Complete the evacuation plan.

Residents need to chip, chip, chip, and chip the slash.

We will need to burn some slash piles when the weather permits.

Provide training on the Barricade systems & Fire Wise.

Contractors still have some properties where they need to remove trees and chip slash.

Gather up pictures taken of the various sites where mitigation work was done and get the final number of hours spent on the work.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

How will you mitigate the threats checked in Block 3?

We will be working with residents to implement fire mitigation efforts. Because of the size of the district (50 miles x 15 miles) and the location of the structures, the district will be divided into three community areas: lower Poudre Canyon, upper Poudre Canyon and Road 68C. We will establish community slash piles in these areas and encourage residents to remove and reduce vegetation around their structures. Because this district has a large number of elderly residents unable to physically do removal, we will contract to provide assistance for these residents. In addition, we will be providing education through mailings to residents and at community meetings encouraging residents to implement Fire Wise Give a brief description of the project steps and activities to achieve objectives.

The first step is establishing the slash pile sites and informing residents of when and where they can put slash. Second, work with elderly for slash removal. Third, develop on-going educational effort in areas of fire prevention and reduction. Provide training on use of Barricade system. Develop and implement a Fire Wise education program for people visiting the area. Assess and mapping the area and developing Time-line for meeting the steps listed above. Include major milestones, accomplishments and completion date.

Month 1 - Outline steps and establish who is responsible of implementation. Establish slash pile sites. Month 2 - Send out newsletter and inform residents and contract with contractors. Develop Fire Wise materials for visitors. Start development of fire and evacuation plans. Assess wildland/urban hazardous areas. Additional Comments

Last year we started our community cleanup. We established three sites for people to bring slash and remove old construction materials, etc. It was a huge success. We want to continue to build on this effort and encourage residents to build defensible spaces and reduce fuels around their residences. This year we want to expand to encourage residents to create conditions around their homes that will limit the trasmission of fire from wildland to structures to reduce fire hazards in the Interface. We will be encouraging residents to have available the Barricade system at their home and train them on how to use the system if wildland fire threaten. In addition, we discovered that educating visitors to our area was also an important part of our wildland fire prevention program. We also need to develop a fire and evacuation plan and map the area for wildland/urban interface hazards.
