Operation Noah

- 1958 1964
- Rupert Fothergill
- 6000 animals
- "take such measures as they thought necessary to save animals from the rising water."
- Necessity became the mother of invention
- First to use dart guns and drugs in Zimbabwe
- 1964 formation of Department of National Parks and Wildlife Management (formerly a division under Department of Mines since 1952).







Parks & Wildlife Act - 1975

- Gave authority to private landowners to manage, utilise and benefit from animals on their property.
- Massive expansion in wildlife industry.
- Basis for development of conservancies.
- ZPWMA sold wildlife to private land owners.
- Resulted in full time capture teams.
- Leaders in the field.
- WPA under CFU
- Pioneers in Elephant Translocation Clem Coetzee



Role of Parks & Wildlife Management Authority

- Apart from National Parks:
- Regulatory
 - Permits
 - Quotas
 - Scientific Department
- Monitoring
- Security/ Anti-poaching
- Joint Venture/ partnerships eg Gonarezhou Trust

Conservancies

From previous land used for cattle Eg: SAVE Valley Conservancy Used to be 3400sq km Bubye Valley Conservancy 3740 sq km 20% of country's lions Rhino Protection Area Nuanetsi Ranch / Malilangwe Food security / Exports

CAMPFIRE

- Image: 1982 the Act was amended to include communal areas, management of which was through Rural District Councils.
- CAMPFIRE –Communal Areas Management
 Program for Indigenous Resources
- Highly regarded
- To ensure local communities received benefit from wildlife on their land

Hunting/Guiding

 Zimbabwe renowned and respected for its "mentorship-based" training program.



Veterinary Department

- FMD policy to protect beef export market to EU
- Fences and "zones"
- Minimise contact between buffalo and cattle.
- Collaboration between PWMA and Vet Department
- Establishment of Wildlife Unit
