





Poudre Fire Authority Community Wildfire Protection Plan Justification and Outline

Executive Summary

Pre-fire planning for wildfires has long been recognized as a need within PFA's district. This is explicitly acknowledged in the 2004 Strategic Plan and in the guiding documents for the Wildland/Urban Interface (WUI) team. Pursuant to these needs, we propose the development of Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPP) in 2005 followed by Pre-Fire Plans for priority areas in 2006. These efforts combine elements of the operations and prevention divisions.

PFA and its constituents in the WUI can realize the following benefits:

CWPP

- Identification and prioritization of hazards and values at risk
- Public education and participation in the planning process
- Possible motivation of property owners to undertake mitigation efforts
- Increased interagency communication and coordination
- Establishment of an action plan for follow-up efforts
- An examination of the International Urban-Wildland Interface Code

Community Wildfire Protection Plans

Larimer County has rated seven subdivisions in PFA's district as high or severe for wildfire hazard. Further assessment is required to determine areas within Fort Collins city limits that are at high risk. Recent years have seen a number of significant wildfires within and adjacent to our district. A single wildfire has the potential to destroy more structures in a single day than PFA may loose to all fire incidents in an entire year. It is only a matter of time before large scale evacuations and loss of residences are seen within our district. While PFA has made significant strides in the area of wildland fire planning and preparedness, we must move forward on the issues identified by the Strategic Plan.

Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPP) are a way to set priorities, engage the community, coordinate cooperators, and ensure future funding in the area of wildland fire planning and mitigation.

CWPP's are identified by the Healthy Forests Restoration Act (HFRA) of 2003 as an initial step in WUI planning. They are designed to identify the wildland fire issues for a community and help determine solutions and priorities. The requirements of a CWPP are very general, but federal and state assistance are predicated on the existence of such a plan. While county wide plans may serve as an umbrella document, they may not substitute for a CWPP.

PFA is the logical coordinator for CWPP's. We function at a level that can provide specific guidance at the subdivision and community level while also coordinating activities across ownership boundaries. PFA has already completed much of the background work necessary for the CWPP's. By developing these plans we will encourage and facilitate work by our constituents and cooperators. The process requires the coordination of local, federal, and state stakeholders as well as buy-in from the community residents.

CWPP's must at a minimum:

- 1) Identify values at risk
- 2) Perform a community risk assessment
- 3) Establish hazard reduction priorities
- 4) Establish an action or implementation plan

Anticipated products:

- Identification and prioritization of hazards and values at risk
- Public education and participation in the planning process
- Possible motivation of property owners to undertake mitigation efforts
- Increased interagency communication and coordination
- Establishment of action plan for follow-up efforts
- An examination of the International Urban-Wildland Interface Code

CWPP Outline

While this outline is particular to the steps deemed appropriate within PFA's district, the eight steps set forth in official CWPP literature will be adhered to explicitly or through implicit inclusion. This outline is subject to revision.

I. Identify CWPP areas

- A general CWPP for all of PFA's district will be developed with more specific CWPP's being developed for individual communities and areas of concern.
- The focus will be on the western 1/3 of PFA's district.
- A distinct community or subdivision with a governing HOA may constitute a CWPP area.
- Where a governing board or HOA is absent, CWPP's may be organized along PFA fire station area boundaries

II. Coordinate efforts with stakeholders

- Stakeholders within PFA's district and governmental cooperators will be contacted or convened to establish priorities within PFA.
- CWPP procedures will be established.
- CWPP priorities will be identified.

III. Community Risk Assessments

- Improve the current working map.
- Conduct risk assessments.
- Identify future project needs.

IV. Develop an implementation plan with cooperators and stakeholders

- Present risk assessments and identified project needs to cooperators and stakeholders for input on an area by area basis for comment, modification, and prioritization.
- Formalize these project priorities in and implementation plan and strategy.

V. Public education and outreach

- Within each CWPP area, share the plan with the public.
- Conduct outreach to those citizens with particular needs or concerns.
- Provide the information and tools needed by the public to implement action items on their own property and within their communities.

Supporting Documentation

The following executive summary, table of contents, and maps are excerpts from the background document that is serving as a basis for much of the CWPP. The entire sixty-page paper is available upon request.

Executive Summary

Wildland-Urban Interface Issues in Poudre Fire Authority's Jurisdiction

Within Poudre Fire Authority's (PFA) jurisdiction a substantial number of structures intermix with fire adapted vegetation. Intense fires can occur in these ecosystems naturally and as a result of fire exclusion. PFA has a vital role in local wildland fire suppression, which is likely to grow with increased development in the wildland-urban interface.

This document serves as a situation size up, pulling together existing records, data, and observations, and applying standard tools of evaluation to PFA's specific situation. It is designed as a starting point, a basis for future planning and action. It is not, however, a fireline tactical document that can be handed to an incident commander on a wildfire.

Key points of this study include:

- 1.) Local Fire Regimes: Local wildland fuels can produce extreme fire behavior under historical conditions and as exacerbated by fire exclusion.
- 2.) **Fire Occurrence:** The majority of vegetation fires occur in developed areas illustrating both the association of fire occurrence to human activity and the significance of fires in the occluded interface. Fire occurrence is grouped into two distinct seasons peaking in March and July respectively.

- 3.) Fire Danger Rating: Local fire danger is more closely related to 10 hour fuel moisture and temperature than it is to the 1000 hour fuel moisture and Energy Release Component (ERC), frequently used by federal agencies as danger indicators. Building on this study, a fire danger index specific to Poudre Fire Authority's needs can be developed and applied to assist fire managers during periods of high danger.
- 4.) Values at Risk: While geographic fire occurrence is heaviest in PFA's developed areas, the potential for large fire growth and pronounced property loss demands that attention be focused on the west side of the district. To this end, increased consideration should be paid to pre-fire planning and mitigation efforts in this area. There is currently no comprehensive fuels management plan in PFA's urban interface.
- 5.) **Potential Fire Behavior:** Modeled and observed fire behavior illustrate the need for rapidly deployable engines, air resources, and indirect line construction during times of severe fire weather. This may impact pre-fire plans, response levels during times of high fire danger, and future training foci. There is potential for developing fire behavior models as valuable tools for PFA.






