

#### BIOGRAPHIES



**TIANA FARNSWORTH** grew up the in Colorado Springs, Colorado with her maiden name as Tiana Snow. She started training in ballet at Springs City Ballet, renamed to Springs City Dance Force, at the age of seven. She continued her training in ballet at twelve with Rachael Aragon at Rachael's School of Dance. Tiana expanded her dance training with ballet, pointe, lyrical, and jazz. Tiana started performing yearly in *The Nutcracker* and spring ballet performances including pointe variations. She was featured as the Sugar Plum Fairy in fall of 2012. In the beginning of 2013, Tiana began studying at Ballet Society of Colorado Springs, renamed Colorado Ballet Society in 2017. Tiana studied under Patricia Hoffman among others through summer of 2015.

Tiana began her formal dance education at Pikes Peak Community College (PPCC) where she earned her Associates of Arts with an emphasis in dance. She danced under Stephanie Kobes-Newcomb, dance director, with Aoi Koenig and Kerry O'Brien as adjunct professors. Tiana trained in intermediate/advanced modern technique and jazz then a summer of intermediate ballet. Stephanie Kobes-Newcomb taught all dance classes except intermediate ballet from Aoi Koenig and one advanced jazz class by Kerry O'Brien. During all four semesters, Tiana was a member of the High Altitude Dance Ensemble (HADE) performing in the fall concerts and in spring with the class showcase. HADE performed "Under Surveillance" by Stephanie Kobes-Newcomb at the Annual Heart Ball by the American Heart Association of Southern Colorado hosted by the Broadmoor Hotel in spring of 2014. HADE also performed at CoDEO at Colorado State University with "Alternate Ending" in fall of 2014. Tiana continued to be a member of the Colorado Youth Ballet through the Ballet Society of Colorado Springs where she performed yearly in The Nutcracker and in rotating ballets each spring. Tiana continued her dance education at Colorado State University (CSU) in Fort Collins while pursuing a B.A. in Dance and a B.S. in Health and Exercise Science: Health Promotion. She studied movement through dance and health through other exercise forms, diet, and mental and social health. She studied under Judy Bejarano, Chung-Fu Chang, Madeline Harvey, Amber Mazurana, Lisa Morgan, Lindsay Pierce, Carol Roderick, Jane Slusarski-Harris, and James Wallace. Tiana trained in a mixture of styles including: Martha Graham, Horton, Limón, Post-Modern, Vaganova Ballet Methodology, and Balanchine while studying modern and ballet. In the Le Corsaire Suite adapted by Madeline Harvey for the Ballet Reparatory Ensemble, Tiana was a featured dancer in the "Pas De Trois Des Odalisque" as the first soloist.

Tiana created works for MacKinnon Royal Dance Institute. The choreography included: "Hoedown" for intermediate ballet, "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" for ballet/ tap combo, and "Princess Things" for pre-ballet and tap. She is currently creating works for her classes at Canyon Concert Ballet. At CSU, Tiana was a student director for the Spring Dance Concert in 2017 and achieved the Deans' List in spring of 2015 and 2017 and fall of 2016 and 2017.

Tiana Snow married in her second year at CSU and changed her name to Tiana Farnsworth. She is excited to share her life with her husband as she continues to pursue her career. She desires to become a professional dance teacher and educator while performing modern dance. She currently is working on becoming a personal trainer and a group fitness instructor to help a variety of people be happy and healthy. Tiana loves to send a huge thank you to her husband, David, and all of her family and friends who have supported her throughout this journey.



HANNAH FINNEGAN Originally from St. Louis, Missouri, Hannah began dancing at age three, and studied ballet, jazz, tap, musical theatre, contemporary, and hip-hop. She regularly trained and performed with Krupinski Academy of Dance and American Dance Troupe until she graduated high school. Throughout her time at Krupinski's, she worked closely with the following teachers: Tess Boyer, Brandon Fink, Marcus Johnson, Paige Johnson, Mark Krupinski, Ashley Krupinski, Traci Soule, and Debbie Wood. Although Hannah focused on concert dance rather than competitive dance, she attended many conventions, such as NYCDA, JUMP, Velocity, DanceMakers, and Monsters. At DanceMakers Nashville 2014, Kathryn McCorrmick, who placed third

on SYTYCD and starred in Step Up 3D, was asked to present one dancer in the senior age group with a scholarship to attend their national intensive. She chose Hannah. Hannah attended the DanceMakers Summer Intensive as well as the Webster University Summer Intensive in 2013.

After finishing high school, Hannah began studying dance at Colorado State University. She studied with faculty such as Judy Bejarano, Chung-Fu Chang, Melissa Corr, Madeline Harvey, Matthew Harvey, Amber Mazurana, Lisa Morgan, Lindsay Pierce, Carol Roderick, Jane Slusarski-Harris, and James Wallace. She has also had the opportunity to take master classes taught by Martha Graham Dance Company, Ormao Dance Company, Impact Dance Company, Momix, Complexions, Verb Ballets, Rennie-Harris Grass-Roots, and more. Outside of CSU, Hannah also attended master classes taught by Ashley-Liane Dance Company, Backbone and Co., Hamilton Evans, Kenya Clay, and more. She also attended intensives hosted by the Big Muddy Dance Company and Entity Contemporary Dance. Hannah was the first person to receive her B.A. in Dance from Colorado State in three years rather than four. Storytelling is Hannah's favorite part of dance; therefore, she loves to perform. Hannah took advantage of the many opportunities she received to perform. She performed and was featured in "Ubuntu" by Madeline Harvey, "Of Breath, Wind and Skyline" by Judy Bejarano, "Love Shouldn't Hurt" by Danielle Cardon, "American Lullaby" by Judy Bejarano, "A Place Where..." by Devon DeSpain, "Querer" by Chloe Milton, "Freaks and Weirdos" by Ashley Shute, "In a Soldier's Mind by Aminta Remisosky, "Salem" by Lauren Kotre, "Nightlight" by Ashley Shute, "Quintessence" by Devon DeSpain, "Cloudless" by Chung-Fu Chang, "In the Land of Magic Cake" by Judy Bejarano, "Ombré Crossroads" by Jane Slusarski-Harris, "Set" by Megan Adams, "We're Only Humans" by Shannon Henderson, and "Phoenix" by Alex Ader.

On the other hand, Hannah also really enjoys to teach and choreograph. She has taught ballet, jazz, contemporary, tap, and hip-hop for three years now. Since her first improvisation class taught by Jane Slusarski-Harris, Hannah has loved to choreograph. Two of her pieces, "Weathering", and "Eventuality" were selected by the faculty to be in the fall and spring dance concerts. She also choreographed a solo and group piece for her senior capstone. Outside of CSU, she has also choreographed smaller works with her friends. Hannah also has administrative experience. She wrote the first Dance Undergraduate Student Handbook for her program, and founded and served as president for the Dance Student Advisory Committee.

Upon graduating Hannah aspires to dance professionally, either within the concert or commercial realm. She plans to continue choreographing and teaching in hopes to one day start her own contemporary/hip-hop company. Through her dancing, choreographing, teaching, and more, Hannah works to inspire young dancers to stay motivated in the pursuit of their goals.



**EMILY LACOURSE** is originally from Columbus, Texas. She began her training in classical dance at the age of three at a small ballet school, Live Oak Dance Center, under the direction of Gladysue Hovis. Emily also had the opportunity to study ballet with Ballet Austin, Texas Ballet Theatre, and Houston Ballet under the artistic direction of Stephen Mills and Ben Stevenson. Some of her dance educators include John Grensbeck, Lauren Anderson, and Tony Bravo. She has had the opportunity to perform in many classical ballets including *La Bayadere, La Fille Mal Gardee,* and *Coppelia* and has had the privilege to be featured as Swanilda in *Coppelia*. Emily is a three-year graduate

of Columbus High School and she was belle at Festival Hill Institute in Round Top, Texas; Emily participated in their finishing school where she hosted orchestras and musicians from around the world. Here, she learned traditions passed down from noble courts such as etiquette, language, and the arts. She began her college career at Blinn Community College in Brenham, Texas as a Liberal Arts major. Here she learned valuable skills in costuming, English with an emphasis in creative writing, and theatre. Emily began her teaching career at Live Oak Dance Center where she taught creative movement, pre-pointe, and multiple levels of classical ballet. While at Live Oak Dance Center, Emily set her first short ballet *The Circus*. This was her first time to write, direct, and choreograph a contemporary ballet. She continued her teaching at Saltare Studio and Fine Arts Center where she was able to write, direct, and choreograph her second full length ballet, *Alice in Wonderland*. She also ran a musical theatre program for low income rural area students called *Children Off Broadway* through the First United Methodist Church. This allowed her to produce two musicals per semester for the community and celebrate children with varying talents ages kindergarten through fifth grade.

Once a dance major at CSU, Emily studied with the department's faculty: Amber Mazaruna, Carol Roderick, Chung-Fu Chang, Jane Slursarski-Harris, Judy Bejarano, Madeline Harvey, and Melissa Corr; as well as, perform original works choreographed by Judy Bejarano and Madeline Harvey's setting of *Le Corsaire*. She had the privilege of performing the pas de duex in this setting of *Le Corsaire*. Emily was also able to represent CSU at the National Dance Education Organization's national conference in 2016 and 2017. Here she explored her passion of dance education and returned with information to better her own students and to share with her peers in the dance department. While living in Colorado, she taught ballet levels one through three at Canyon Concert Ballet in a pursuit to refine her pedagogical studies in classical ballet. As Emily continued learning under the trusted teachers at Canyon Concert Ballet, she taught classical ballet variations at Immersion Dance Center. Here she set variations from *Swan Lake, The Nutcracker, Giselle, Le Corsaire,* and *Coppelia* on students ages ten through eighteen.

After graduation, Emily will return to teach public education in Houston's struggling communities. Her dream is to bring the values of a classical dance education to every child regardless of class, ethnicity, religion, or race. Emily would like to thank her family and the people who have become like family over the years; nothing would have been possible without this support system. She would also like to thank all the educators in her life that inspired her to touch other students' lives. Most of all Emily would like to thank her granny, Patty LaCourse, who gifted Emily her first ballet lessons, never missed a show, and loved with her whole heart.
