# STORING TEXTILES ...from The Smithsonian Institution

1. Textiles should be stored perfectly clean. With years dirt particles can actually cut fibers through friction and abrasion.

2. Store textiles flat. If folding is necessary, avoid sharp folds by padding at the points of folds with strips of washed unbleached muslin or old sheets. They can then be wrapped in clean white cotton cloth such as an old sheet or pillowcase, or in muslin. Textiles should not be sealed in airtight plastic bags or containers.

3. Stored textiles should not be exposed to the light as natural fibers are damaged by light rays from the sun and indoor fixtures.

4. Textiles should be removed from storage periodically and aired. If the item has been folded, refold it carefully changing the position of the folds so that the same fibers are not subjected to the tension of folding which can cause fiber breakage over a long period of time.
