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PROGRAM NOTES AND TEXTS

Sara Teasdale's poem, *May Night*, takes an interesting perspective on the liveliness of spring even when absent of sunlight, and *Fresh and Fearless* attempts to represent the dynamic combination of life and darkness that lies within these verses. Using a trance-like ostinato, the piano accompaniment inserts a nearly unrelenting electric charge into the choir's lyrics, giving these lines a sense of vigor reminiscent of the spring Teasdale envisions. Most importantly, *Fresh and Fearless* depicts the joy experienced within as nature blossoms to life around oneself–hence the title's focus on this particular phrase; a sense of invincible elation.

Written in 1938, **Sure on this Shining Night** is one of Samuel Barber's most famous and oft-performed art songs. He later arranged is for SATB choir, and it has become a popular choice for ensembles all over the world. The version presented this evening is arranged for TBB choir by Jacob Narverud. Using text by American poet, James Agee (1909–1995), Barber writes music that is sublime and reverent as it reflects the poetry.

Sure on this shining night Of starmade shadows round, Kindness must watch for me This side the ground.

The late year lies down the north. All is healed, all is health. High summer holds the earth, Hearts all whole.

Sure on this shining night I weep for wonder Wand'ring far alone Of shadows on the stars.

Composed in 1723, *Jesus bleibet meine Freude* (*Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring*) is the final chorale from J.S. Bach's *Cantata no. 147* and is one of his most beloved and recognized melodies.

Vidi Aquam is an exciting and uplifting piece with Latin text borrowed from the Catholic Easter ceremony. This festive setting accompanied by four-hand piano was written by Denver-based composer, Kevin Padworski. We are honored to have him join us this evening, playing the *piano primo* part.

Vidi aquam egredientem de templo, a latere dextro, alleluia: et omnes, ad quos pervenit aqua ista salvi facti sunt, et dicent: alleluia! I saw water flowing from the temple, on the right side, alleluia: and all to whom that water came have been saved, and they will say: alleluia! Arranged for three-part treble choir by Barbara Baker in 1996, *The Storm is Passing Over* was originally published as a hymn by Charles Albert Tindley in 1905. Tindley was a noted composer of gospel hymns, and he is often given the distinction of being one of the founding fathers of American gospel music. The poignant text tells the listener to have courage through dark times.

Have courage my soul and let us journey on. Though the night is dark and I am far from home.

It resembles the style of *Isicathamiya* (a cappella singing with close harmonies) that originated among the Zulu mine workers during the Apartheid years. This dramatic and powerful arrangement by Michael Barrett builds to an exciting and rhythmic middle section before settling back down to a reverent conclusion.

True Light is an original composition by Dr. Keith Hampton, a specialist in the field of Gospel Music. This exuberant work begins with the opening phrase of "The Little Light of Mine" and drives forward with a central theme of letting the light within us shine for all to see. The piece features two soloists singing the text of tenth-century poet, Grigor Narekatzi (951–1003), from the "Book of Mournful Chants."
