


International Poster Collection: Scanning Technology Will Increase Access

The library's poster collection will be ready for use in the fall semester, in time for the 8th Colorado International Invitational Poster Exhibition in mid-September. Since discussion first began with the Art Department in 1990, it has been the library's objective to make available the rich resources of this unique collection.

Currently, the bulk of the 300 posters in the collection come from the 7th international exhibit in 1991, while a few are included from previous shows. The growth of this collection is expected to be dynamic. As long as the renowned biennial shows continue at Colorado State, the library will receive and house all posters accepted for each exhibition.

The posters are fragile and must be handled sparingly under strict rules of conservation to ensure that they last for generations to

come. With improvements in multimedia imaging, the library staff electronically scans the slides onto compact disks. The image appears on a high resolution television monitor, and the viewer is able to telescope various parts of the image.

The poster room itself is located in the archives area of Morgan Library, and will be under the administration of the Special Collections Department. Since it is the library's aim to keep the posters in a pristine condition, unless special permission is granted, all initial viewing will be via eitherslides or the above mentioned compact disk technology. Downloading from CARL

Now you can download or print from CARL terminals located in room 100 of Morgan Library. This will make it even easier to record information you wish to keep.

CARL terminals provide access to a wealth of information, including the Libraries' online catalog, the catalog of other CARL libraries,

and journal indexes such as Expanded Academic Index, Business Periodicals Index and ERIC. CARL also allows you to browse table of contents of journals through its UnCover database. Instructions are available in room 100 of Morgan Library for both downloading and printing from CARL. (Currently the downloading program will not work for dial-up or telnet connections).

The Library's Ordering Cycle

Each July 1st the library begins a new ordering cycle for books, journals, and other materials. The Collection Development and Acquisitions Departments employ a variety of strategies to assure that all materials are received in a timely fashion.

In July and August, allocations are determined by subject fund so that each academic area in the University receives a given level of library support. Amounts allocated depend on a variety of factors. Enough money must be allocated to cover the cost of journals which typically consume 70% of the budget and have inflation rates exceeding 10% annually. Faculty recommendations are purchased from the free balance in September and throughout the fall. From March to June each year, the budget is essentially closed for new orders while

Liaison Librarians

Each academic department has a library liaison (see attached list). Liaisons will be sharing information about library services and collections throughout the year. Faculty can assist their liaison in many ways.

- Keep your liaison informed of departmental activities.
- Send your liaison documentation pertaining to research interests and instruction (course outlines, reading lists, etc.).
- Work with your liaison when developing library assignments for classes.

acquisitions staff receive the large shipments of books ordered during the fall. Small sums are reserved for urgent faculty requests and for books to be placed on reserve for the coming semester. Collection development staff, meanwhile, continue to accept orders from faculty and begin collecting orders for the next fiscal year.

The Libraries maintains an approval plan for newly published books from major trade and scholar publishers. Faculty and staff may review these weekly in the Acquisition Department (Room 120).

- Invite your liaison librarian to attend faculty meetings to increase awareness of departmental priorities impacting library collections and services.
- Encourage student organizations to invite the department's liaison to one of their meetings to discuss issues and concerns about the library.

20th Anniversary of Phi Beta Kappa

The Colorado State University chapter of Phi Beta Kappa marked its 20th anniversary this year. To honor this occasion, Colorado State's Morgan Library unveiled a plaque bearing names of this year's Phi Beta Kappa initiates. The name plate will be changed annually at the time new initiates are installed. The plaque is located on the second floor in Morgan Library.

Phi Beta Kappa is the oldest of the academic honor societies in the United States. Founded by a group of students at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia on December 15, 1776, Phi Beta Kappa has, for more than two centuries, bestowed membership on talented students who meet the demanding academic standards for initiation into the society. Membership is bestowed by local chapter; one cannot apply for membership in Phi Beta Kappa. At present, there are over 230 chapters in the U.S. The Colorado State chapter, Delta of Colorado, was installed on November 15, 1973, after a five-year planning effort.

Germans from Russia Collection Named for Heitman

The Germans from Russia Collection will be named for Dr. Sidney Heitman, who passed away earlier this year. Professor Heitman was a faculty member in the History Department for many years. During the 1970s he initiated the Germans from Russia in Colorado Study Project.

When Dr. Heitman began the project, "A research collection was part of his initial vision," according to Mark Gilderhus, Chair of the History Department. He said, "Sid was a distinguished bibliographer, so it is especially appropriate that the collection be named for him."

Although the active research stage of the project is completed, the collection continues to grow. It is very heavily used by scholars and genealogists. The Sidney Heitman Germans from Russia Collection is housed in the Libraries Special Collection Department.
