NEW! College Preparatory Music Academy

Highlands Presbyterian Camp & Retreat Center, Allenspark, CO final performance at the University Center for the Arts

The new College Preparatory Music Academy is a training ground for advanced high school students seeking a high-level music experience. The academy is replacing the CSU Summer Music Camp and builds upon the Advanced High School Institute program.

The academy is an opportunity for one-on-one rehearsal, performance, and interaction with CSU faculty as the group explores the world of chamber music and challenging ensemble repertoire; sessions on successful auditions, instrument specific ensemble techniques, and overcoming performance anxiety prepare students for entrance into major university programs. Students perform side-byside with faculty in a chamber orchestra conducted by Professor Wes Kenney, director of orchestras at CSU.

Acceptance is by audition only with materials due by April 1, 2013. The 2013 academy will be accepting string, woodwind and brass performers only.

Ilya Sinaisky joined CSU faculty in the Fall' 2012 as an Assistant Professor of Collaborative Piano. Prior to this appointment, he was an active performer and a teacher in Washington, DC area. Born in Ukraine, he immigrated to Israel in 1990. Following his undergraduate studies at the Jerusalem Academy of Music and Dance, he received his Master of Music in Piano Performance from the Tel Aviv University. In 2002 he came to the USA to continue his studies in solo piano and accompanying at the Cleveland Institute of Music and received his Doctoral degree in Collaborative Piano from the University of Maryland School of Music.

Ilya attended the Music Academy of the West and the Cleveland Art Song Festival. He participated in master classes with Warren Jones, Marilyn Horne, Elly Ameling, Gil Shaham, Peter Salaff, William Preucil, the Emerson, Guarneri and Cavani Quartets. His teachers include Isser Slonim, Vadim Monastyrsky, Pnina Zalzman, Natasha Tadson, Anita Pontremoli and Rita Sloan. Ilya has received numerous honors and awards including a second prize at the Darius Milhaud Performance Competition in Cleveland and the Rosa Lobe Memorial Award for Accompanying at the Cleveland Institute of Music. At the University of Maryland he was awarded the Robert McCoy prize for excellence in collaborative piano.

Ilya has been a collaborative piano faculty member at the Cleveland Music School Settlement, Heifetz International Institute for Strings and the Aspen Music Festival and School. From 2006—2012, Ilya served on the piano faculty of the Washington Conservatory. His recent engagements include recitals and master classes at Morgan State University, University of Maryland, University of California at Santa Barbara and Tulane University. This summer Ilya was invited to join International Vocal Arts Institute program in Israel.

A native of New Jersey, **Dr. Joel Bacon** holds degrees in mathematics and organ performance from Baylor University in Waco, TX, where he was a student of Joyce Jones, and an artist diploma in organ from the Konservatorium der Stadt Wien (Vienna, Austria), where he studied with Michael Gailit. With a dissertation on the use of organ in selected orchestral works, he earned his PhD in historical musicology through a joint degree program of Vienna's University of Music and Performing Arts and the University of Vienna.

Joel Bacon has a growing reputation as a performer, teacher and scholar in North America and Europe. He has been heard in recital in Germany, Austria, France, Switzerland, Canada, and the US, and live performances have been broadcast on Austrian Radio (Ö1) and Public Radio International. He has taught at the prestigious Oundle International Festival (Cambridge, UK), at several "Pipe Organ Encounters" of the American Guild of Organists, and at other courses in the US and Canada. With the principal violist of the Munich Philharmonic, Albrecht Rohde, he has recorded a CD of music for viola and organ.

Joel Bacon currently holds the newly established Stewart and Sheron Golden Chair in Organ and Liturgical Studies, the first endowed chair in the College of Liberal Arts. Before coming to CSU, he was assistant organist of St. Thomas Lutheran Church, Munich-Grünwald, and served as frequent guest organist at the former Hapsburg imperial church, St. Augustine, Vienna.

Bios, ctd.

A native of Detroit, **Margaret Miller** received her degrees from Indiana University and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee where she also received a Certificate from the Institute for Chamber Music founded by the Fine Arts Quartet. For eighteen years she was violist of the Da Vinci Quartet; during that time the Quartet toured throughout the U.S. and were prizewinners in both the Naumburg and Shostakovich Quartet Competitions. The Quartet recorded the chamber music of Arthur Foote and Charles Martin Loeffler for Naxos American Classics. The Da Vinci Quartet was in residence at the University of Denver and Colorado College, and had visiting residencies throughout the country. An important aspect of the Quartet's work was to perform for underserved audiences, which lead to the HeartStrings program that was featured on the NewsHour on PBS.

Soprano Susan Hochmiller is a versatile artist with performance experience in chamber music, art song, oratorio, opera, musical theater, and jazz. In addition to numerous recitals, performance highlights include singing at Carnegie Hall with the Susquehanna University Masterworks Chorus and Orchestra, in the Mozart 101 Series with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, Bach's St. John Passion with the Music, Gettysburg! series, and Don Giovanni with the Opera Theatre and Music Festival of Lucca, Italy. She was also featured in Eastman Opera Theater's productions of L'Enfant et les Sortileges, Dialogues of the Carmelites, and the premiere of Charles Strouse's East and West. Dr. Hochmiller has served on the voice faculty at the Sunderman Conservatory at Gettysburg College, Dickinson College, and the New York State Summer School of the Arts, School of Choral Studies. Dedicated to the promotion of chamber music for voice, flute and piano, she was a founding member of the Blue Ridge Trio which performed and presented at conferences regionally and nationally. Dr. Hochmiller is active as a clinician and has given presentations on the aging voice and healthy vocal technique to the American Guild of Organists York Chapter, the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association District 8 Choral Festival and the CMENC Student Chapter at Gettysburg College. In the summer of 2012, Dr. Hochmiller was one of twelve voice teachers from the United States and Canada selected to participate in the prestigious National Association of Teachers of Singing Intern Program. This summer, she will be instructing Orvieto Musica's Art of Song program in Orvieto, Italy.

Professor Hochmiller earned a Doctor of Musical Arts and a Master of Music in Voice Performance and Literature from the Eastman School of Music and a Bachelor of Music from Susquehanna University. She has performed in master classes with notable artists George Shirley, Benita Valente and Richard Hundley. Distinguished teachers have included Joan Boytim, Jeffrey Fahnestock, Constance Haas and Nina Tober. Also an active member of the National Association of Teachers of Singing and College Music Society, Dr. Hochmiller is currently on faculty at Colorado State University.

Barbara Thiem is an internationally acclaimed cellist who combines teaching cello and coaching chamber music with her active schedule of performances in Europe and the United States, playing recitals, solo with orchestra, and chamber music. She is a member of the Mendelssohn Trio and in the summers administers the International Summer Academy of Schloss Ort, Austria. She holds degrees from Cologne, Germany where she studied with avant-garde cellist Siegfried Palm, and from Indiana University where she was assistant to Janos Starker and was awarded the coveted Performer's Certificate. In addition to concertizing, she has recorded for many radio stations and has produced several cds among them a set of Bach Suites for cello solo, Complete Works by Felix Draeseke for cello and piano with pianist Wolfgang Mueller-Steinbach, Works for Cello and Organ with organist Robert Cavarra, and Cello/Bass duets with Gary Karr. She has published the translation of Gerhard Mantel's Cello Technique as well as a number of articles on good postural and practicing habits which appeared in the ASTA and Suzuki Journals. She has also been involved in research as part of the Center for Biomedical Research in Music Therapy at CSU.

Presently she is teaching and performing at Colorado State University. In addition to studio teaching of cello and chamber music she is a three semester course of cello pedagogy, as well as organizing the Pre-College Chamber Music Program.





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
