#### Redstone Canyon SFA Puma Gulch FORM 2: Project Accomplishments

The upper part of Puma Gulch Road in Redstone Canyon was heavily abutted by dense bands of mostly small diameter trees. Under that situation a wildfire approaching the road could very likely spot and carryover to the other side. Firefighting along that road would have created significant safety hazards to crews due to the inadequacies of the roadway as fuelbreak. Our project solved much of this problem along an approximately 0.4 mile stretch of the most heavily compromised road segment. It did this by removing the large majority of vegetative fuels along both sides of the road to a depth of about 150 feet. The project accomplished this goal while also mitigating a significant Dwarf Mistletoe infection in the existing Ponderosa Pine tree stands. At the conclusion of the cutting phase of this project a contractor was hired to chip and broadcast the cut material. Much of the larger diameter wood was distributed as firewood to the volunteers participating.

### Redstone Canyon State Fire Assistance WUI Project Final Closeout Report – June, 2017 Phil Kessler

#### **Project Description:**

The project improved the roadway fuelbreak on a portion of Puma Gulch Road in Larimer County. The volunteer group, Redstone Canyon Mitigation Group, in cooperation with the Redstone Canyon Association determined to execute the project. The Colorado State Forest Service helped with funding by awarding a cost-match grant from the 2014 State Fire Assistance WUI program. A total of \$8,000 was offered subject to cost-match contributions of labor and funds. The entire project occurred on privately owned land. The Project Account number is 5366950-2016-01.

The fundamental deliverable of this project, as defined in Exhibit A, was to improve the roadway fuelbreak on a 0.38 mile portion of Puma Gulch Road in Redstone Canyon in Larimer County. The methods and standards for this work were also defined. Basically the objective was to thin cut the heavily forested area extending 150 feet on either side of this dirt road.

#### Progress and completion of fuel-break improvements:

This project augmented approximately 110 acres of similar work done in 2010-16. Thinning took place 150 feet each side of 0.38 mile section of Puma Gulch Road, for an approximate total of 11 acres of area treated.

Thinning left 15 foot clearance between crowns in some areas; in other areas thinning followed consultant Dr. Rich Reynolds' of US Forest Service Rocky Mtn Research Station guidelines for ponderosa pine restoration for the Rocky Mountain area. Legacy trees were left, with a "groupy - clumpy" prescription being implemented, which mimics natural stand conditions for ponderosa pine. This means 8 to 12 trees per clump, with a tree length separation between clumps. Trees were also be pruned up to 5 feet, leaving at least 1/3 live crown on small trees. Trees and branches were manually hauled to the side of the road. On steeper ground, a contractor with a tractor and powerful skidding was used to skid trees up slope. Trees greater than 6" in diameter were bucked into firewood for residents to use. The material left was chipped and scattered by a contractor after completion of the thinning portion. Work by volunteers took place during the winter and spring months. \$4800 was used to contract the chipping; \$2880 was used to contract the tractor work.

#### **Financials:**

Total project cost, including reimbursements and contributions was \$15,779.52 Of that \$7,680 is reimbursable from the grant. The value of contributed volunteer labor was \$8,099.52. The match rate was just over 51%.

Reimbursable costs were strictly relevant to equipment rental and contract services. Redstone Canyon Association (HOA) floated the necessary fund outlays in expectation of direct reimbursement to that organization.

#### **Redstone Canyon Chipping Project**

#### Purpose:

The project has one primary objective:

• Reduce or remove the slash and woody materials as part of a fuels mitigation project

#### General Description of Work:

A mandatory site inspection is required for this project. Work involves broadcast chipping or complete removal of slash, limbs, and small diameter trees that are stacked along the roadside in two locations within Redstone Canyon.

#### Unit Description:

Location of units is within the Redstone Canyon subdivision located adjacent to Horsetooth Mountain Open Space, Lory State Park and the community of Masonville in Larimer County, Colorado. All work will take place directly on private lands along two roads in Redstone Canyon; Tawny Lynx and Roan Mountain. Materials consist of primarily ponderosa pine limbs and small diameter trees (<6 inches). Recent thinning activities have occurred in the months of November through February and materials have been drug and stacked alongside roads for easier access. Most materials should still be somewhat green; however, occasional trees that have been cut were previously dead. Unit 1 consists of approximately 3 acres worth of slash material; Unit 2 consists of approximately 7 acres. Unit 3 has 2 acres worth of slash, Unit 4 has 1 acre of slash, and Unit 5 is a large pile consisting of slash from approximately 4 acres.

- Unit 1: Tawny Lynx Fuelbreak (3 acres of slash) Unit 1 is located in the NW ¼ of the NW ¼ of Section 23, Township 7 North, Range 70 West, Larimer County, Colorado.
- Unit 2: Roan Mountain Fuelbreak (7 acres of slash) Unit 2 is located in the N ½ of the NE ¼ of Section 15, Township 7 North, Range 70 West, Larimer County, Colorado.
- Unit 3: DeFosse Property (2 acres of slash) Located adjacent (west) of Roan Mountain Fuelbreak.
- Unit 4: Steller Ridge Fuels (1 acre of slash) Located down the road on Steller Ridge from the Tawny Lynx fuelbreak. No turnaround exists on the spur road off of Steller Ridge so Contractor will need to back down onto road. This unit was added to utilize all available funds.
- Unit 5: Tawny Lynx Slash Pile (4 acres of slash) Unit 5 is located directly adjacent to Unit 1 (Tawny Lynx Fuelbreak). This unit was added to utilize all available funds. Contractor will chip as much slash from the pile as possible, at least 2 acres of slash or more but will not exceed a total project cost of \$4,700.

#### Project boundaries are described and/or marked as follows:

Only material stacked alongside roads will be required to be removed or chipped. All slash and larger diameter logs that are scattered in the interior of the project areas or stacks that are obvious firewood material will be left on site. Contractors are required to attend the mandatory site inspection to observe the amount and location of materials. Any questions about what must be chipped and what can be left will be clarified on site.

#### Management Treatments

- Use of equipment that chip, grind, or mulch materials and broadcast chips onto forest floor is specified for this project. The Contractor is responsible for determining the proper equipment mix necessary to achieve the desired results and to meet the requirements.
- 2. Chips will be broadcast onto the forest floor and kept clear of roads or may be removed completely by the Contractor. Significant accumulations of wood chips shall be removed from the roadway on a daily basis.
- 3. Chip depth will not exceed 3 inches.
- 4. Slash and material less than 6 inches in diameter will be thoroughly mulched to reduce the amount of woody fuels as much as possible. Any materials too large for specified chipping equipment will be left along roadside for community members to utilize as firewood.

#### Additional Performance Standards:

- 1. The Project Administrator may suspend or limit operations if excess damage is occurring due to mud, snow, extreme fire danger, etc., or due to the following situation(s): failure to meet contract specifications.
- 2. Any soil contaminated by loss of fuel, oil, grease, hydraulic fluid, coolant or other fluids shall be removed

and placed in covered drums or other acceptable containers for proper disposal by the contractor.

- 3. Adequate barricades or warning devices shall be placed as necessary for the safety of persons and vehicles.
- 4. Damaged gates, fences, structures or signs will be repaired or replaced by the Contractor, at the discretion of the Contract Administrator.
- 5. Neither trash nor litter will be left by the Contractor anywhere in Redstone Canyon. Daily hauling of any trash generated by the Contractor is the Contractor's responsibility.
- 6. The project site should be left in a safe manner at the end of every work day including safe storage of fuel containers and equipment parked off of main access roads.

#### **Contract Period and Operational Period:**

Project period runs from March 11, 2011 through June 1, 2011. The daily operational period is limited to 7:00 a.m. to dusk.

#### Administration:

- Contractor shall notify the Contract Administrator prior to moving any equipment into the project area and also
  prior to the start of work.
- The use of sub-contractors must be approved in writing by CSFS prior to contract signing and bid approval.

#### **Damage Penalty:**

The Contractor shall conduct all operations in a timely manner and in accordance with this contract. Penalties may be assessed for damages to soils, improvements or other elements of the forest stand. Determination of damage is at the sole discretion of the Project Administrator.

A Damage Deposit in the amount of \$250 shall be deposited by the Contractor upon signing of this contract. The deposit shall be in the form of cash or certified check. Any damage penalties and charges for damages to soils, improvements or other elements of the forest stand not repaired or corrected by the Contractor shall be deducted from the Damage Deposit. If at any time during the performance of this agreement the Damage Deposit balance falls below \$100.00, it shall be brought back to the original full amount through additional payments by Contractor.

Any remaining deposit balances will be released to Contractor promptly upon satisfactory completion of this agreement.



Diana,

The Redstone Canyon mitigation team has prepared a project definition for your approval. We are prepared to treat ten acres per our verbal agreement.

The basic concept of our proposal is to reinforce the roadside thinning work that Anchor Point Group is about to perform. Their project is well-defined at this time and about to go to bid, with working starting before mid-August. They will be treating 20 acres, including some of the worst buildup of crowded trees in strategic areas.

Our proposal has specific roadway segments identified that would connect with their work, and also pick up some of the remaining crowded regenerative roadside growth. The goals are the same: provide fuel-breaks to blunt the spread of wildland fire, provide better protection for wildland firefighting resources trying to gain road access, and to protect trees from disease by providing much greater tree-to-tree clearance in the canopy for landscape-scale strips.

I will send you a followup with maps and such, but I wanted to put this in your hands to reassure you that we have been working on this and have decided on a plan. There is some difficulty in estimating land area for these complicated strips, so we generated what is probably a slightly over-optimistic list. Perhaps with your help we could refine the selections to get us down to 10 acres. If you need mapping data immediately I do have Lat/Lon start and stop checkpoints for each road segment. Otherwise I will produce that map myself shortly.





Disposal of roadside tree slash will primarily be accomplished by chipping and broadcasting using contractor-supplied labor and equipment. Broadcast chips will not be permitted to accumulate past a depth of 3 inches. 7. We will provide public education on implementation of Firewise safety practices through newsletters, a community website, and talks. Describe all planned long-term maintenance (grant funded or other). The mission of the Redstone Canyon Wildfire Mitigation Group (RCWMG) is ongoing and will continue well beyond this grant. Our goal is to create a perpetual cycle of mitigation work within our community. This committee of permanent residents plans, organizes, and coordinates the activities including meetings, newsletters, public education, website development (http://redstonemitigation.org), updating the existing CWPP, implementing priorities of CWPP, enhancing defensible space, hauling slash, and clearing of road right-of-ways. This group will also engage and direct the work of hired contractors.

2. Poudre Fire Authority. They will participate in the development of the defensible space prescriptions, supply critical advice in the locating of fuelbreaks and piles for burning, and supervise and conduct large pile burns.

3. Larimer County Emergency Services. They will provide additional input in defensible space prescriptions.

4. Colorado State Forest Service. They will provide technical advice as needed.

5. Private contractor services. These resources will be engaged to provide services related to limbing, felling, hauling, piling, and chipping.

6. Redstone Canyon Association. They are the largest HOA in Redstone Canyon and maintain 20 miles of road; will be a key cooperator in allowing roadway fuelbreak improvements.


