

First presented in Moscow's Bolshoi Theatre in 1877, *Swan Lake* received the most withering reviews of any Tchaikovsky ballet. Yet today, it is considered to be the most beloved and recognizable icon of the classical ballet repertoire. The version of *Swan Lake* which we are most familiar with today is largely based on the 1895 première at the Maryinsky Theatre in St. Petersburg. This production was directed by the great Marius Petipa, but Acts II and IV were choreographed by his very able—but often overlooked—assistant, Lev Ivanov. Particularly Ivanov's Act II was a ground-breaking choreographic triumph at its première, and even today it remains one of the most treasured moments in classical ballet performance. Petipa and Ivanov's production was also revived and restaged by Agrippina Vaganova for the Maryinski Theatre in 1935. Her delineation of the highlights of Act II have remained substantially intact to this day.

Swan Lake is always changing. Each production varies with the tastes and artistic vision of artistic directors, choreographers, dancers, costumers, etc. Dances are added, modified and even omitted completely in order to accommodate specific company casting, staging and technical considerations. But certain moments of the ballet have become imbedded in the narrative. They are much loved and anticipated by the audience. In this concert, you will see four of these moments: From Act II, the dances of the swans in the traditional versions by Lev Ivanov, performed by members of the Ballet Repertory class; From Act III, the Mazurka and Czardas, choreographed by Richard Wacko and danced by a large ensemble of CSU Dance Majors.

He also has taught as a guest artist at major dance companies, institutions and festivals throughout the U.S. and overseas. Chung-Fu also enjoys teaching Yoga, he has received YogaFit[®] Level One Certificate. His professorship biographical profile is selected and listed in Who's Who in America.



Carol Roderick has taught, coached, and trained teachers and dancers for professional companies, universities, and prestigious schools in the United States, Canada, Japan and Europe. She received her early training in Boston, and later at Butler and Indiana Universities. Her formal pedagogical training was received from the late Jürgen Schneider (Bolshoi Ballet, Stuttgart Ballet, American Ballet Theatre) and Gabriela Komleva (Kirov/Maryinsky Ballet). She was Principal Teacher at AIS International Ballet in Japan, and a member of the profes-

sional division faculties of Boston Ballet School and The Royal Winnipeg Ballet School. She directed the Colorado Ballet School, Tulsa Ballet School, and Academy of Ballet Idaho. She was the Program Manager for the Bolshoi Ballet at Vail, and also served as ballet mistress for the Cleo Parker Robinson New Dance Ensemble. For many years, she ran her own preprofessional training program in Denver: Classical Ballet Ensemble. She has coached and prepared students for the Prix de Lausanne, Japan Grand Prix, New York International Ballet Competition and the USA International Ballet Competition, as well as local and regional scholarship competitions throughout the USA. Many of her students have gone on to professional performance, choreographic, and teaching careers.

Jane Slusarski-Harris is a Professor at Colorado State University. Since 1988, she has been the Director of Dance at CSU where she teaches ballet and modern dance technique, history, pedagogy, and all levels of classical Pilates. Slusarski-Harris has choreographed and performed in numerous works for the concert stage, musical theatre, and opera and for a number of years danced with IMPACT DANCE. She received her MFA in dance from the University of Colorado.

Richard Wacko earned an MFA from the University of Utah, a B. Admin from Athabasca University and a Diploma in Marketing Management from the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology. Early studies began at the Ukrainian National Federal School of Dance and continued at the Alberta Ballet School. He received private instruction from Maria Bokor at the Dance Art Academy, and has studied in Kiev, USSR, at the

Virsky State Academy, and at Les Ballets Russes de Montreal. He has served as artistic director of the Cheremosh Ukrainian Dance Ensemble and the Volya Ukrainian Dance Ensemble. In addition to teaching master classes in character and classical folk dance, Rick has also been a guest choreographer for dance companies in Canada and the United States. He is the Artistic Director of the University of Utah's Character Dance Ensemble, and is the departmental Graduate Advisor. In addition to studio classes, Richard also instructs Ballet History, Technology-Multimedia and Portfolio Design. He recently published a CD ROM on Character Dance and co-published several audio CD's on Character Dance. Under his leadership, CDE has toured to Canada, England, Russia, Spain, Japan, Greece, Costa Rica and China.
