


Figure 2: NoHomo Poster 1





Figure 3: NoHomo Poster 2




Figure 6: NoHomo Magazine Spread




Figure 9: Tablet Page Anastasia 2




Figure 11: Tablet Page Anastasia 4




Figure 12: Book Review Magazine Cover
