Program Notes

Written in 1892, **Edward Elgar's** *String Serenade* provides a unique look into inner workings of a young English genius, hoping to break into a select field of excellent composers prevalent in England at the time. With its youthful exuberance, the Serenade has a light feel in all three movements, enjoying reoccurring themes and seemingly revolving rhythms which bring out a certain simple but elegant English charm. Notable is the second movement, slow in its progression yet brilliantly drawn to focus the listener's ear into the meandering, melancholy and sometimes haunting melody first portrayed in the first violin section.

George Gershwin is famous for producing such masterworks as Rhapsody in Blue for Piano and Orchestra and Porgy and Bess, his American Opera. Many of Gershwin's works are easily recognizable for their melodic tunes, depth of message, and distinctly American charm. His *Lullaby*, however, is not widely known, nor performed very frequently. It was first premiered in 1967 by the Juilliard quartet, and now more widely performed in its string orchestra rendition. The soft-spoken Lullaby is a gentle reminder of the subtle syncopations that signified Gershwin's knack for writing for strings. Listen for the simple rise and fall of the melody within the upper strings, accompanied by the tango-like outline carried by the cello and bass sections.

George Frideric Handel is as well-known as perhaps any Baroque composer. Along with Johann Sebastian Bach, his music has withstood easily the test of time. Producing such great works as the great Oratorio *The Messiah* and *Music for the Royal Fireworks,* Handel's name is consistently appearing in concert halls worldwide. Among the most amazing works for chamber orchestra from the Baroque period (1600-1750), Handel's Concerti Grossis remain both accessible and wonderful examples of the best of Baroque music for orchestra. As we know, this *Concerto Grosso Opus 6 No. 1* (a piace written for three soloists with orchestra) was written in five movements by Handel in 1739, containing varied speeds, keys, and melodies; to highlight the beauty and heart of the orchestral sound. Robert (Bob) Kreutz, a native of Colo., has educated for 35 years in Loveland, Greeley, and Fort Collins, Colo. at the collegiate, high school, middle school, and elementary levels in the orchestral field.

As a violinist, Bob has performed for more than 25 years frequently with the Fort Collins Symphony Orchestra, and is often found in the string sections accompanying local performing groups such as the Larimer Chorale, Laudamus Chorale, Loveland Opera Theatre, and String Quartet Con Brio.

Bob is active as a clinician and adjudicator throughout Colo., Wyo., and beyond, conducting rehearsals, master classes, clinics and performances in Denver, Boulder, Fort Collins, Fort Morgan, Grand Junction, Jefferson County, Longmont, Thornton, Cheyenne, Wyo., and nationally in Salem, Oregon and Maryville, Missouri.

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
